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Venice, Dec. 5. N. S.

Signior Alvizio Mocenigo, who is appointed by this Republick to be their Ambassador to His Majesty of Great-Britain, was this week made a Senator, to qualifie him for that Employment; and he is preparing for his Journey to England. We have an Account from Napoli di Romania, that the Venetian Fleet, commanded by General Delfino, met with a very violent Storm in their return thither from the Archipelago, during which, 4 or 5 Men were killed on board the Admiral by a Clap of Thunder. Four of the Venetian Men of War which suffer'd most in the late Engagement with the Turks, were ordered to return home. They write from Dalmatia, that all Things continue very quiet on that Frontier, and that General Mocenigo had reinforced the Garrisons in those Parts, and sent his Troops into Winter Quarters. The Letters from Rome say, the Pope has appointed a Congregation, to Regulate several Points of Ceremony concerning the Queen-Dowager of Poland's Reception and Entertainment at that Court.

Warsaw, Dec. 7. Count Ledlinisky, the Emperor's Envoy here, has received an Answer from the King of Poland (now at Berza in Lithuania) to the Emperor's Letter, wherein he accepts the Mediation offered by his Imperial Majesty, for accommodating Matters between this Crown and the Elector of Brandenburg, in relation to the Business of Elbing, which it's hoped will at last be amicably adjusted. The Letters from Berza say, that the greatest part of the Senators of the Great Dutchy of Lithuania being assembled at Grodno, to endeavour a Reconciliation between the House of Sapieha and the Gentlemen of the contrary Party, who were come to that Place, and pretended to hold a General Diet, the King, upon his arrival at Berza, desired they would repair thither, that he might Advise with them concerning the most effectual Means to quiet the Disturbances of that Province; Whereupon the Treasurer of Lithuania, the Palatine of Wilna, and some others of the Senate, waited upon the King; But the rest excused themselves, and desired Leave to stay at Grodno to finish the Business they were engaged in, which he accordingly granted, and the Council appointed to meet at Berza, is for this Reason put off till the 9th Instant. Prince Sapieha has likewise wait to the King, to beg his Pardon for not having waited upon him, and to assure him of his Fidelity, offering, in case the opposite Party will send Deputies to His Majesty, to come himself and Treat with them, in order to put an end to these Differences. In the mean time the said General continues encamped with the Forces under his Command near Grodno, as the Sieur Oginsky does likewise with a great number of the Gentlemen of his Party, but they abstain from Hostilities. A Body of the King's German Troops are likewise come into the Neighbourhood of that Place.

Carlsruhe, Nov. 30. The Conferences which were begun here on the 13th Instant, have been

continued ever since with good Success; On the 28th past a Truce of 25 years was concluded between the Emperor and the Ottoman Port, each side keeping what they are in Possession of at present; 'Tis likewise agreed, that on the 22d of March next, Commissioners from each Empire shall meet on the Frontiers to settle the Limits, and that in the Month of May, the Emperor and the Grand Signior shall send an Ambassador to each other. The Imperialists demanded, that Count Teckelej should be delivered up to them, and that the Holy Sepulchre at Jerusalem be restored to the Christians; to which the Turks answered, That having no Instructions as to these Particulars, they would acquaint the Sultan therewith, and expect his further Orders; The Muscovites being contented to keep strictly to the Condition proposed for the Foundation of this Negotiation, viz. That each side keep what they have, their Treaty was settled on that foot; As to Poland, The Turks offer to leave to them all Podolia, as 'twas enjoy'd by that Crown in the year 1672, and to restore the City of Caminiec after having dismantled it, but the Poles insist upon the Restitution of Caminiec as 'tis at present, in consideration of which, they offer to quit to the Turks some Places in Moldavia and Walachia; For what concerns the Venetians, the Turks offer to leave to them the Morea, and the Fortrels of Lepanto, but would have this last Place demolished, which the Venetians seem unwilling to consent to, insinuating to keep Lepanto in the Condition 'tis now in; But 'tis believed, these Points relating both to the Poles and Venetians will be soon adjusted.

Vienna, Dec. 10. Count Martigli, one of the Emperor's Ministers for Treating a Peace with the Turks, arrived here the 8th Instant from the Congress at Carlowitz, from whence we have likewise Letters of the 2d, which bring an Account, That a Truce of 25 years was concluded between the Emperor and the Port; There remained still some Points in Dispute relating to our Allies, but such Progress was already made towards Adjusting them, that 'twas not doubted but the Truce would be signed by all Parties before the 17th of this Month. Prince Eugene of Savoy, who commanded the Imperial Army in Hungary, having left the new Fortrels near Arat in a good posture of Defence, and sent his Troops into Winter Quarters, is returned thither, with Prince Charles of Vaudemont, who served under him during the last Campaign. The Queen-Dowager of Poland, and the Cardinal d'Aiquien her Father, are set out from hence on their Journey to Rome. She has stay'd here about a fortnight, and during that time, has been entertained by their Imperial Majesties with a great deal of Respect and Kindness; The Venetian Ambassador waited on her before her Departure, and made her a Compliment upon her Intentions to pass through the Territories of the Republick of Venice. The Prince of Hanover, who is to be married to the King of the Romans, will depart from Modena, where she is at present, about the beginning of January next; She intends to make some stay at Trent or Inspruck, and is expected here about the 20th of February. The Prince of Dietrichstein, High-Steward to his Imperial Majesty, died some days ago; there are a great many Pretenders to this Office, among whom, those who seem to have the best Interest are, the old Count Harrach, who was lately Ambassador in Spain; Count Khinsky, and Count Aerneberg, Burgrave of Bohemia. Two of the Commissaries, who had Inspection over the Emperor's Magazines in Hungary, have lately been condemned to Die, and executed, for selling great quantities of Meal to the Turks, and otherwise embezzling the Stores they were entrusted with; They contended before their Death, That the burning of the great Magazine at Ratz about 3 years ago, which was generally thought to have happened accidentally, was occasioned by themselves, on purpose to conceal their having disposed of the Ammunition there to their own Profit.
