FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (INFECTED AREAS) ORDER OF 1938 (No. 108).

SUBJECT.

Declares the Area described in the First Schedule to be a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Area for the purposes of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas Restrictions) Order of 1925.

Includes in the Infected Area the Area described in the Schedule to Order No. 5769, and revokes the Orders specified in the Second Schedule.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

An Area comprising:

IN THE COUNTY OF BERKSHIRE.

The county borough of Reading.

The boroughs of Wokingham, New Windsor and Maidenhead.

The petty sessional division of Maidenhead (including its detached part).

In the petty sessional division of Windsor.

The parishes of Sunninghill and Old Windsor; and so much of the parish of Winkfield as lies to the north of the road running from Bagshot via Bagshot Park, Penny Hill and Red Lodge to Easthampstead.

In the petty sessional division of Forest.

The parishes of Wargrave, Waltham St. Lawrence, Binfield, Warfield, Ruscombe, Sonning Town, Twyford, Woodley and Sandford, Earley, Winnersh and St. Nicholas Hurst; and so much of the parishes of Easthampstead and Wokingham Without as lies to the north and east of the following boundary, namely:—the road running from Penny Hill via Red Lodge, Ninemile Ride and Heathlands Church as far as its junction with the Southern Railway line running from Sandhurst to Wokingham and thence along the said railway line to Wokingham.
