**T**HE Congregation of Cardinals appointed by the Pope to regulate the Points of Ceremony touching the Queen of Poland's Reception and Entertainment at this Court, have settled the same, making for the most part the Treatment that was formerly given to Queen Christina of Sweden, their Precedent. Signior Zandedari, Nephew to Pope Alexander the Seventh, and Governor of Ancona, is chosen by the Pope to receive her as his Nuncio Extraordinary on the Frontiers of the Ecclesiastical State, and to conduct her hither, and Orders have been sent to him at Ancona, to repair for that purpose to Bologna; The Baron of Scarlati is likewise to attend her on the Frontiers, with an Answer to a Letter he delivered some days ago from her to the Pope; And Orders are sent to all the Governors of the Cities in the Ecclesiastical Territories through which she shall pass, to receive her with all the Honour and Respect due to her Quality. Signior Paulucci, who resided in Poland with the Character of Nuncio Extraordinary, is returned to this Court, and has had a long Audience of the Pope, in which he gave him an Account of his Negotiations, as well in that Kingdom as at the Court of Vienna, where he was ordered to call in his way hither; The Pope received him very kindly, and intends, as a Reward for his good Services, to make him a Cardinal at the next Promotion, which it's believed will be in a short time. The Pope has lately given Audience to all the Foreign Ministers, except the Emperor's Ambassador, the Differences between his Imperial Majesty and this Court, concerning the Imperial Fiefs in the Ecclesiastical State, not being yet adjusted; But it's probable, Cardinal Grimani, who was lately sent by the Pope to Vienna, will bring this Matter to an Accommodation. The Marquis of Lenoncour, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Lorraine, who was sent hither by that Prince to notify his Marriage with Mademoiselle the Duke of Orleans's Daughter, having performed that Commission, has taken his Audience of Leave, and is gone from hence to Florence, having Orders to make the same Notification to the Great Duke, and other Princes in Italy.

*Venice, Dec. 15.* The Senate being informed, that the Queen of Poland intends to pass through the Territories of this Republick in her way from Vienna to Rome, have sent Orders to the several Governors, to Treat her with all the Respect that is due to her Rank and Quality. She is expected on the 17th Instant at Trent, and from thence (it's said) will come hither incognito. The Che-

valier Spinola, who arrived here some days ago from Vienna, is preparing for his Departure for Malta, whither he is going to Command the Gallies of that Order. We have received an Account from the Morea, that that Province has of late been very much disturbed by Robbers, who were got together in great Numbers, and have plundered divers Houses; but the Proveditor-General, Signior Francisco Grimani, has taken a particular Care to disperse them, and has caused such as could be seized on, to be brought to Exemplary Punishment; and the Senate are now considering of the Means to prevent the like Disorders there for the future. By a Ship come in here from Corfou, we have received Advice of the Death of Signior Contarini, Governor-General of the Islands belonging to this State. Our Letters from Dalmatia say, all Things continue very quiet on that Frontier, and that the Venetian Forces, commanded by General Mocenigo, are gone into Winter Quarters.

*Peter-Waradin, Dec. 5.* The Conferences are continued at Carlowitz, and in all probability, the Treaty for a General Truce between the Emperor and his Allies on one part, and the Ottoman Port on the other, will be fully concluded in a few days. In the mean time the Weather grows so cold, that the Ministers at the Congress suffer a great deal of Inconveniency thereby, and will be obliged, in case these Negotiations continue longer than is expected, to remove from their Tents, to some more convenient Place. The Forces on all sides are marched into Winter Quarters. All the Artillery made use of the last Campaign in the Army commanded by Prince Eugene of Savoy, is brought back into the Magazines of this Place and Buda, except what was thought necessary to be left in the Fortress lately built near Arat; a Place that is looked upon to be of considerable Advantage in securing our Frontiers on that side, and which being within a very small distance of Temeswaer, will be a Curb to that Garrison; The Regiment of Solary is now in Garrison there, and in the Spring some more Forces will be sent thither to finish the Fortifications of that Place, which 'tis intended shall be of very great strength. All Things continue very quiet on every side, however the Troops commanded by General Rabutin in Transilvania, are still quartered close together on the Borders of that Province, there being yet no Account, that the Tartars, who were to pass that way in their march home, are gone by, and it being feared they might in their Passage make some IncurSIONS into the German Territories.

*Frankfort, Dec. 20.* The Imperial and French Commissioners, who are met here to adjust the Pretensions of the Dutchess of Orleans on the Palatinate, have had divers Conferences, in which several

Several Preliminary Articles relating to that Negotiation have been adjusted. The Bishop of Würzburg died on the 14th Instant at Würzburg, and 'tis said, the Elector of Mentz stands forth to be chosen by that Chapter to succeed him. The Garrison of Rhinfelds has been lately changed, the Troops of the Electors of Mentz and Triers, which were in that Place, being marched out, and some of the Emperor's Forces being come in their room. They write from Ratisbonne, that the Diet assembled there have at present under Consideration a Demand made by Prince Lewis of Baden, That the Fort of Keil be given up to him, as being situated within his Territories.

*Hamburg, Dec. 20. N.S.* We are now expecting to hear what Resolutions the Emperor and the Prince Directors of the Circle of Lower Saxony have taken, upon the Refusal of the Burghers of this City to submit to the Imperial Commission, for enquiring into the late Disorders and Disputes they have had with their Magistrates; In the mean time, the number of those who think this Commission very prejudicial to their Rights and Privileges, continues much the greater, there being at the last Meeting of the 7 Caspels or Parishes, into which this City is divided, but one that were of opinion that the same ought to be complied with. The Duke of Holstein Gottorp, the Duke of Mecklembourg, and Prince Christian of Mecklembourg, are come to this Place, intending to pass a few days here. The Conferences for settling the Succession of the Duchy of Gustraw, are continued. They write from Dantzick, that some Regiments of the Forces of Poland are come into the Neighbourhood of that Place; And we have Advice from Berlin, that a Body of the Troops of Brandenburg are ordered to march towards that Frontier; but it's hoped, that through the Emperor's Mediation, which is accepted by both Parties, the Affair of Elbing will be amicably adjusted. Our Letters from Lithuania say, the Senators of that Duchy, who are assembled at Grodno to endeavour a Reconciliation of the Houses of Sapieha and Oginsky, have made a good Progress therein, and hope to conclude the same before the meeting of the Great Council, which is appointed to be held at Brezza towards the middle of this month.

*Plimouth, Dec. 27.* Yesterday came in here His Majesty's Ship the Chatham from Jamaica; And the same day sailed the Hopewell of London, bound home with Wine from St. Sebastian.

*Kensington, Dec. 31.* The King returned this Evening from Windsor.
