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Warsaw, Dec. 13. N. S.

Circular Letters are sent to the several Palatinates, containing the Points to be treated of at the General Diet, which is to meet here towards the latter end of January next. The King of Poland is still at Brezza in Lithuania, endeavouring to reconcile the two Parties of Sapicha and Oginsky; But in the mean time, here is a report of an Action that has happened between them near Grodno, in which 'tis said Prince Sapicha was wounded, and lost about 2000 Men.

Vienna, Dec. 27. Expresses arrive here very frequently from the Congress at Carlowitz, where the Treaty for a General Truce between the Emperor and his Allies on one side and the Turks on the other, advances very successfully; In some of the last Conferences the Turkish Ambassadors pressed very hard to have Caranib, demolished, and several places on the Save, now in the Hands of the Imperialists, restored to them and in such case seemed willing to deliver up Temeswaer, or at least to demolish it; but the Emperors Ambassadors considering the usefulness of Caransebes in covering of Transilvania, That the new Fortress the Germans are building at Arat makes Temeswaer of less consequence to them, and that 'tis absolutely necessary to preserve the Passes they have on the Save, They absolutely rejected these Proposals, and the Turks remained satisfied, That things should continue as they are at present. The Polanders have agreed to deliver up several Places in Moldavia, and in lieu thereof Caminiec is to be restored to them, which is the Great Point they were solicitous about. Matters are not yet agreed on between the Moscovites and the Turks, but 'tis believed Things will be left on the same foot they are now. The only material Point that remains in Dispute between the Turks and the Venetians, is about the Fortaces of Lepanto, which the Turks would have restored to them, because it would cover their Frontiers on that side, and offer, in consideration thereof, to give up to the Republick some Places in Dalmatia; And the Venetian Ambassador has dispatched a Courier to Venice, to receive further Instructions hereupon. The new Queen of the Romans is expected the 16th of the next Month at Trent, and will arrive here about the middle of February, against which time all Things are ordered to be in a readiness for her Reception. The Prince of Lobscowitz, who is to attend her as her High Steward, and the Count of Baar as her Master of the Horse, are gone to receive her on the Borders of the Country of Tyrol, and to conduct her to the Imperial Court; and the King of the Romans himself intends to go incognito, and meet her about a days Journey from hence.

Brussels, Jan. 7. The Regulation concerning the Forces to be kept on foot in the Spanish Netherlands, being sent back from Madrid with the King of Spain's Approbation; The Council of State here has been several times assembled, to consider of putting the same in Execution. The Count de Monasterol is made Captain of the Guards to the Electoral Prince of Bavaria.

Hague, Jan. 9. The Sieur Cleverskerke, Ambassador from the States-General to His Majesty of Great-Britain, is come back to this place from North Holland in order to his return to England. Monsieur Dyckveldt intends to set out from hence next Tuesday for Brussels, and will continue there some short time, before he goes on his Embassy to Spain. Don Quiros, the Spanish Ambassador, is returned from Amsterdam, where he has been some few days. The Duke of Wirtemberg is gone from hence to his Government of Sluce. The States-General have received a Letter from the Elector of Brandenburg concerning the Affair of Eibing, which he has writ to them on account of their being, jointly with the Emperor and the King of Denmark, the Guarantors of the Treaties of Velau and Bittost, on which his Electoral Highness's Pretensions are founded. We hear, the King of Denmark has offered his Mediation for adjusting this Affair.

Paris, Jan. 7. N. S. The 4th Infant being appointed for the Publick Entry of the Earl of Jersey, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great-Britain, his Excellency went in the morning, with the English Noblemen and Gentlemen at present here, who accompanied his Excellency on this Occasion to the Hotel de Rambouillet, the Place from whence Ambassadors make their Entry. His Excellency being arrived there, received the usual Compliments from the Ambassadors and Foreign Ministers, who for that purpose sent thither each a Gentleman in a Coach with 6 Horses, and these Gentlemen and Coaches (after having Complimented my Lord Ambassador) returned, according to Custom, without assisting at the Entry. The Princes of the Blood sent their Coaches, and a Gentleman with each to Compliment his Excellency; About One, the Mareschal de Catinat, who was sent by the King to receive and accompany his Excellency in his Entry, and the Baron de Breteuil, Introducer of Ambassadors, came with the King's Coach and the Dutchess of Burgundy's; And about Two of the Clock the Entry began in the manner following.

The Mareschal de Catinat's Coach with his Gentleman of the Horse, another Gentleman, and two Grooms before it, went first, at some distance, to guide the March; Then came three of His Majesty's Messengers, his Excellency's Gentleman of the Horse, and 6 Pages, all on Horseback, and 20 Footmen; The King's Coach, in which were my Lord Ambassador, Mareschal Catinat, the Introducer, and the Earl of Sandwich; the Dutchess of Burgundy's Coach with my Lord Hayes, my Lord North, and the Dutchess's Gentleman of the Horse; Monsieur's Coach with Mr. Prior Secretary of the Embassy, Master of Rosse, and Monsieur Ambert Introducer of Ambassadors to Monsieur; Madame's Coach, and the Coaches of the rest of the Princes and Princesses of the Blood in their order, and in them the rest of the English Gentlemen, and their Footmen walking by the side of their Coaches. Next came his Excellency's Body-Coach empty, drawn by eight Horses, preceded by a Gentleman and a Swift on Horseback, and two Footmen walking by the side of the Coach, his Excellency's Chariot drawn likewise by 8 Horses; a 3d Coach with 6 Horses, and a 4th with 6 Horses. In these Coaches were the Gentlemen who belong immediately to his Excellency's Family; and the Coaches of Monsieur de Torfy Secretary of State, and of the Baron de Breteuil Introducer of Ambassadors, closed the March. Being come to the House for the Entertainment of Ambassadors, the Mareschal de Catinat, after a short stay with his Excellency, took his Leave, and about 5 in the afternoon, the Marquis de Gevres came from the King with a Compliment to his Excellency; and soon after came the Count de Tefse with the like Compliments from the Dutchess of Burgundy, the Marquis

quis de Chartres from Monsieur, Monsieur de Lorraine from Madame, Monsieur de Cajen from the Duke de Chartres, and the Marquis de Castles from the Dutchess of Chartres.

Yesterday, early in the Morning, the Count de Brienne, eldest Son to the Count de Arnegnac, a Prince of the House of Lorraine, with the Introducer of Ambassadors, came with the King's Coach and the Dutchess of Burgundy's, to conduct his Excellency to his Audience; My Lord Ambassador's Coaches and Retinue which were sent before, joined these two Coaches near Versailles, and so they proceeded in the same manner as at the Entry. In the first Court, the Foot-Guards were drawn up, the French on one side, and the Swiss on the other, the Drums beating, and the Colours displayed, and the Officers saluted his Excellency with their Hats. In the second the Guards called Hoquetons were ranged in their Habits of Ceremony, his Excellency and his Retinue alighted at the Chamber of Ambassadors, where his Excellency found the English Gentlemen who were to accompany him; from thence his Excellency went to his Audience. The 100 Swiss-Guards were ranged from the foot to the top of the Great Stairs, having the Marquis de Courtenveaux, their Captain, at their Head. At the bottom of these Stairs, his Excellency was received by the Marquis de Blainville Great Master of the Ceremonies, and by Monsieur la Grange Master of the Ceremonies; and at the entry into the Guard-Chamber, by the Marechal de Noailles Captain of the Guards, then in waiting; and his Excellency was conducted into the King's Bed-chamber. The King was within the Rails with the Dukes of Burgundy, Anjou, and Berry, the Duke de Beauvilliers, and the Marquis de Torci Secretary of State. His Excellency entred within the Rails, and made his Speech to the King covered, and presented his Credential Letters, and the Letters from their Royal Highnesses the Princess and Prince of Denmark; The King answer'd him in very obliging Terms. My Lord Ambassador presented to His Majesty the English Noblemen and Gentlemen that were with him; after which, his Excellency had Audience of the Dauphin, of the three young Princes of France, of the Dutchess of Burgundy, of Monsieur and Madame, and of the Duke and Dutchess of Chartres, in the usual manner; And then my Lord Ambassador and his Retinue were entertained at Dinner at several Tables. After which, his Excellency returned to the House for the Entertainment of Ambassadors, the same Honours being paid him at his going out of the Courts of Versailles as at his entering; And the same evening his Excellency returned to his own House.

Paris, Jan. 10. N.S. Three Edicts have been successively published here, to bidding the Exportation of Corn; The first enjoins the Confiscation of the Corn, together with the Wagons, Horses, Carts, &c. used in Transporting it, and sets a Fine of 3000 Livres to be paid by the Exporter; by the second, such Offenders are condemned to the Gallies; And by the third, which bears Date the 22d of December, they are to be punished with Death; And four Frigates from Dunkirk are ordered to cruise on the Coasts of Normandy and Picardy, to hinder Vessels from going out with Corn from thence. The Envoy from the Emperor of Morocco, who arrived four days ago at Beil, is shortly expected here; 'Tis said, he has Power to Treat of a Peace between this Court and the Emperor his Master.
