For Gallantry.

Theodore Bogdanovitch, Trans-Mulazim Jordan Frontier Force.

On the 11th March, 1939, this officer was in charge of a mechanised troop despatched from Irbid to the Zemal area, to locate a reported armed band. Mulazim Bogdanovitch succeeded in finding the band, and "pinned" it in a Wadi, until the arrival of air and land reinforcements. He then, though under heavy fire, displayed outstanding powers of leadership in advancing to the attack under cover of his skilfully disposed Light Machine Guns. When Mr. Macadam was killed, he took charge of the situation, and gallantly led his men down the side of the steep Wadi, inflicting many casualties on the
