

## ARTICLE 4.

The present Convention shall be ratified. The ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible.

## ARTICLE 5.

The present Convention shall enter into force three months after the exchange of ratifications, and shall have the same duration as the Extradition Treaty of the 31st March, 1873.

In faith whereof the above-named plenipotentiaries have signed the present Convention and have affixed thereto their seals.

And whereas the ratifications of the said supplementary Convention were exchanged at London on the 15th day of June, 1939:

And whereas His Majesty has ratified the said supplementary convention in respect of, and the said Convention thereby extends to, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, Newfoundland, and British Colonies:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Him by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the 15th day of September, 1939, the said Acts shall apply in respect of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, Newfoundland, and British Colonies in the case of Iceland under and in accordance with the said Treaty of the 31st March, 1873, as modified by the supplementary Convention of the 25th October, 1938.

This Order may be cited as the Iceland (Extradition) Order in Council, 1939.

## PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 15th day of June, 1939, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District

Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Wilfrid, Halton, Leeds, situate in the Parish of Whitkirk, in the County of York and in the Diocese of Ripon:

“ Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Wilfrid, Halton, Leeds, situate as aforesaid:

“ Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Geoffrey, Bishop of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said Parish of Whitkirk which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Wilfrid, Halton, Leeds, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘ The District Chapelry of Saint Wilfrid, Halton, Leeds.’

“ And with the like consent of the said Geoffrey, Bishop of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Wilfrid, Halton, Leeds, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees or dues to be received in respect of the publication of banns and of the solemnization or performance of marriages, churchings and burials should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

“ THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“ The District Chapelry of Saint Wilfrid, Halton, Leeds, being:—

“ All that part of the Parish of Whitkirk, in the County of York and in the Diocese of Ripon, which is bounded upon the north by the New Parish of Manston, upon the west by the New Parish of Saint Philip, Osmondthorpe, both in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south and upon the east by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundaries of the said Parish of Whitkirk, of the said New Parish of Saint Philip, Osmondthorpe, and of the New Parish of Saint Hilda, Leeds, in the said County and Diocese, all meet in the middle of Halton Moor Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Halton Moor Road for a distance of 66½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Templenewsam Road and Plantation Avenue, and extending thence first eastward and thence south-eastward along the middle of Plantation Avenue for a distance of 8½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Grove Road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Grove Road for a distance of 2 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Temple Gate, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Temple Gate for a distance of 27 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Field End Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Field End Road for a distance of 26
