Milan, Jan. 14. N. S.

Prince Charles of Vaudemont, Son to our Governor, is lately arrived here from Hungary, and is to go in a few days to Vienna, to assist at the Ceremony of the King of the Romans Marriage. Signior Busnelli, who resided here from the Republick of Venice, being made Great Chancellor of that State, took his Leave of this Court some days ago, and is gone for Venice to take Possession of that Employment; And Signior Bianchi is arrived here from Venice with the Character of Resident, and prepares for his Audience, which he will have in few days. Count Tarasconi, who has resided at the Court of Spain with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Mantua, passed this day through this City in his way home from Madrid. Signior Pagani, one of the Senate of Milan, is gone to Modena, being appointed by his Catholick Majesty to Compliment the Queen of the Romans on her Marriage. The Arch-Bishoprick of this Place is vacant by the Death of Cardinal Caccia, who died here yesterday. Don Simconi de Torres, Governor of Cremona, died last week, in the 80th Year of his Age; And it's believed, Don Emanuel Borda, Lieutenant-Governor of our Cittadel, will succeed him in that Government.

Turin, Jan. 17. The Duke of Savoy has appointed the Count de Prela to be his Ambassador Extraordinary to His Majesty of Great-Britain, who is accordingly preparing for his departure for England, which, it's said, will be towards the latter end of the next Month. The youngest Son of Count St. Thomas, First Minister and Secretary of State, is made Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber to his Royal Righness, who has likewise given him a Yearly Pension of 4000 Livres. We hear, that the Sedition of Mondovi is not yet wholly appeas'd, and that some of the Inhabitants of that Country have lately appeared in Arms, in opposition to the Duke of Savoy's Officers, whereupon two Regiments of Dragoons, which lay at Vercil, are ordered to march thither to suppress them.

Venice, Jan. 25. The Queen-Dowager of Poland continues in this City; She has been Complimented by four Deputies from the Senate, who have also sent her a Present of Refreshments, and the Patriarch of Venice, the Pope's Nuncio, and the French Ambassador, have visited her. We have received Advice, that the Queen of the Romans left Modena on the 17th Instant, and came to Ferrara, where she was splendidly entertained by the Duke of Modena, and from thence she went the 22d to Verona, and was received by Signior Foscarini, Ambassador Extraordinary from this Republick, who Complimented her on the part of the Senate. The Queen intended to set out from thence yesterday, and the Ambassador is to attend her as

far as Roveredo, on the Frontiers of the Territories of Austria, where she will arrive to-morrow, and from thence will continue her Journey to the Imperial Court. Signior Nicolo Sagredo, is made a Procurator of St. Mark, paying 25000 Crowns for that Honour. Signior Aluisio Pisani, who is appointed to go with the Character of Ambassador from this Republick to the Court of France, took his Leave yesterday, and prepares for his departure.

Vienna, Jan. 30. Count Straatman is arrived here from the Congress at Carlowitz, being dispatched by the Imperial Ambassadors, to acquaint the Emperor with the Conclusion and Signing of the Peace with the Turks on the 26th Instant. By these Treaties, as we are informed, the Emperor makes a Truce of 25 Years with the Gr. Signior, and restores to him the Towns of Lippa, Chonad, and some other small Places between the Maros and the Danube; The Germans are to keep all the Country on this side the Theysse and Maros; And a Line is to be drawn from the Place where the Theysse falls into the Danube to the Save, to make the Limits on that side. The Venetians are comprised in this Treaty, and 'tis stipulated, that they shall restore to the Turks the Fortress of Lepante, the Castle of Romelia, and Prevesa; the first in the Condition 'tis at present, and the other two demolished; The whole Morea is left to the Venetians, with all they are now possessed of in Dalmatia; And the Republick is allowed two Months time to accept these Conditions. The Poles have made a Perpetual Peace with the Turks; The City of Caminitic is to be restored to the Poles in its present Condition, and they are to keep all the Country of Podolia; In consideration whereof, they are to restore to the Turks several Castles and Fortresses in the Provinces of Moldavia and Walachia. The Muscovites have only made a Truce for two Years, during which they are to Treat further. This important Negotiation being thus happily finish'd, the Ambassadors of the Allies were preparing to remove to Knezemet, and the Mediators and the Turks to Belgrade, at which Places they intend to continue till the Ratifications are exchanged. The King of the Romans has been Complimented by the Persons of Quality at Court on his Marriage with the Princess of Hanouer, which was celebrated at Modena on the 15th of this Month; and on this occasion the Arch-Duke Charles has entertained the Court very splendidly.

Hamburg, Jan. 30. The Burghers of this City met again the 22d Instant, and after having had several Conferences with the Senate, they resolved not to submit to the Commission which the Emperor has granted to the Princes Directors of the Circle of Lower Saxony for enquiring into the Disorders that have lately happened here; And that Letters should be writ

by the Senate to the said Princes, to acquaint them, that the Matters in Difference between the Senate and Burghers were adjusted, so that there was no need of any other Authority to interpose therein. The said Letters were accordingly drawn up, and presented to the Burghers at another Meeting on the 27th. But they disliking some Expressions therein, desired the same might be altered, which the Senate consented to; And the Burghers are to meet again the next week, when a new Draught of the said Letters will be communicated to them. They write from *Copenhagen*, that the Elector of *Brandenburg's* Envoy has lately had divers Conferences with the Ministers at that Court concerning the Affair of *Elbing*; for the Accommodating of which, a Treaty is shortly to be set on foot at *Breslaw*, wherein the Emperor, the King of *Denmark*, and the States-General, will employ their Mediation as being Guarands of the Treaties of *Velau* and *Bidgoff*, according to which this Matter is to be decided. These Letters add, that Baron *Fewel* is return'd thither from *Stockholm*.

Paris, Feb. 11. N. S. The last Letters from *Neuf-Comtel* say, the Prince of *Conti* is still there, and that the Marquis of *Rotelin*, as Agent for the Dutchess of *Nemours*, continue to keep Possession of the Castle of that Place, and would not so much as permit the Prince of *Conty* to come and hear Mass in the Chapel of the said Castle. It's said, the Count of *Chamilly*, the *French* King's Ambassador at the Court of *Denmark*, has desired Leave to return home, on account of the ill state of his Health. There is a Project on foot for joining the *Rivers Saone* and *Loire* by a Canal.

Bristol, Feb. 4. On the 2d Instant arrived here the *Blossom Brigantine* of this Port from *Alexandria*, but last from *Cadiz*. Yesterday came in the *Squirrel Brigantine*, *Tho. Ward* Master, in 24 days from *Virginia*; And the *Levant Galley* of this Place, *Matthew Thomas* Commander, in three weeks from *Malaga*.

Deale, Feb. 6. His Majesty's Ships the *Loo* and *Swan* failed yesterday for the River. Yesterday came in here His Majesty's Ship the *Monmouth* from *Plimouth*, which failed this morning up the River.

Whitehall, Feb. 6. This being the Princess of *Denmark's* Birth-day, His Majesty came to visit her Royal Highness at *St. James's*, where there was a great Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Quality, to Compliment her Royal Highness on this Occasion; In the Evening his Highness the Duke of *Glocester* had a Firework, and the Court were entertained with a Consort of Musick, and a Ball.
