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Genova, Feb. 7. N. S.

**T**HE Prince of Monaco is shortly expected here from Paris in his way to Rome, with the Character of Ambassador from the Most Christian King to the Pope. They write from Milan, that the Duke of Savoy having lately made some Pretensions to the Sovereignty of the Lands about Final, the Council there had been extraordinarily assembled to consider thereof, and the Prince of Vaudemont, Governor of Milan, had appointed the Duke de Sesto to go and confer with the Duke of Savoy about this Affair; These Letters add, that several Regulations were published at Milan, enforced by very severe Penalties, for preventing the Disorders which usually happen during the Carnaval; And that the young Prince Charles of Vaudemont was gone from thence to Vienna. We hear from Mondovi, that the Disorders continue still in that Country, and the number of the Malecontents who have taken up Arms, seems to increase; That they Plunder the Houses of such of their Neighbours as will not join with them; That they have had several Rencounters with the Duke's Forces quarter'd in the Neighbourhood of Mondovi; And that his Royal Highness has thereupon ordered a greater number of his Troops to march thither, under the Command of the Governor of Verceil, to suppress them.

Warsaw, Feb. 28. On the 17th Instant was held here a Great Council, in which each Senator in his Place congratulated the King of Poland upon the Conclusion of an Advantageous Peace with the Turks, and the good Success he has had in restoring the Publick Tranquillity at home; Then they resolved, that for the settling of the Affairs of the Kingdom, it's necessary a General Diet be held, and they left it to the King to appoint the time, which he did for the 29th of May. As for the Business of Elbing, they appointed a Select Committee to consider thereof, that their Resolutions in this Matter may be kept secret. The Heer Malachewsky, late Plenipotentiary from this Crown at the Congress in Hungary, is daily expected here. The Starost of Chelm is appointed to go as the King's Envoy to the Grand Signior. The Emperor's Envoy has notified to the King, the Marriage of the King of the Romans with the Princess of Hanover, and on this occasion gave a very splendid Entertainment, at which were present, the Princes Alexander and Constantine, Sons to the late King of Poland, the Cardinal Primate, and others of Principal Quality.

Vienna, Feb. 28. The King of the Romans went from hence on the 18th Instant incognito, and lay that night at Burkensdorf; the next morning he made a Private Visit to the Queen at Tulln, and returned thither the same night. On the 20th, about noon, the Queen of the Romans came to Burke'sdorf, and the King made her another Visit; She was also visited there by the Arch-Duke Charles, and Prince Philip of Lorraine. The 21st her Majesty came to the Castle of Ebersdorf, and on the 22d the Emperor and Eraspus, the King of the Romans, the Arch-Duke, the

Four Arch-Duchesses, and the Prince of Lorraine, attended by a great number of Persons of Principal Quality, went to Ebersdorf; The Queen received their Imperial Majesties at their coming out of their Coach, and offered to kiss their hands, which they would not suffer, and embraced and saluted her; They went to the Queens Apartment, where they stayed some time; and in the afternoon the Emperor and the whole Court returned thither. The 23d was spent in preparing every thing for the Queen's Entry; Accordingly the 24th the Queen left Ebersdorf in the morning, and dined at the Palace of Favorita, being attended by Prince Lobkowitz, and the other Officers of her Household. At some distance from this City several Tents were pitched, under which the King of the Romans received her, the Cannon round the Town being fired at the same time, and their Majesties continued there till the Persons who were to attend them in the Entry were placed in order, after which they proceeded in this manner. First marched the Chief Harbinger, with his four Assistants; next Eight Troops of Gentlemen of Croatia and Hungary, making in all about 700 Men, Cloathed and Armed after the manner of their own Country, commanded by the Count of Bathiani Ban of Croatia, and Prince Esferhafi Palatine of Hungary, and under them by other Persons of the chiefest Quality, who had a great many Servants, and Led-Horses attending them. Then a Company of the Burghers of this City on Horseback, with White and Red Feathers on their Hats; The Company of Foreign Traders, consisting of about 80 Men besides their Officers, all in Coats laced with Gold, and with White Pea-hens in their Hats; The Burgher-master, with the Chief Inhabitants of this Place, making together about 160 Men, all cloathed in Black, with White Feathers on their Hats; The Eight Companies of Cavaliers raised by the States of the Lower Austria, making about 700 Men, and commanded by Count Trautson, Land-Marshal. After these came 18 Mules, belonging to the King of the Romans; 6 Led-Horses of the Arch-Duke's, 10 of the King of the Romans, and 12 of the Emperor's, all with Trappings of Black Velvet richly set with Pearls; Several Pages on Horseback, two of which bore a Crown, and other Marks of Sovereignty; The Lords of the Bedchamber to the Emperor and the King of the Romans, with the Ministers of State and Officers of the Court, all on Horseback, attended by their Servants; The Arch-Duke Charles on Horseback, with the Prince of Lichtenstein, his High-Seward, on his left hand, followed by the other Officers of the Household; Three Heralds at Arms in their proper Coats; And the Prince of Fundy, Count of Massfeld Marshal of the Emperor's Court, on Horseback, bearing the Sword of State. Then came the King of the Romans cloathed in White Silk upon a White Horse, under a Canopy born by Eight Councillors of State in their proper Habits. The Heer Rhyngrave, Captain of His Majesty's Guards, marched on the right side of the Canopy; Count Trautson, First Lord of his Bed-chamber, on the left; and the Prince of Dietrichstein, his Master of the Horse, behind it. Then came the Queen of the Romans dress'd likewise all in White, in a very Magnificent Coach drawn by six Horses; Over-against her sat the Dutchesse-Dowager of Hanover, her Mother; On one side of the Coach was on Horseback the Prince of Lichtenstein, High-Steward; and behind came the Emperor's Guards of Archers commanded by General Palsy, and those of the King of the Romans commanded by Count Martintz; The Queens Coaches, with her Ladies of Honour and her other Servants, closed the March. In this manner they proceeded to the Church of the Augustin Friars adjoining
