Falmouth, March 18.

Ere are now in Fort about 40 fail of Merchant thip, fome intended for the Barbados, fome for New-found-land, fome for the Streightsr and there it for feveral Ports of France; all wind.

Plymouth, March 12. About 10 or 12 thips are detained in this Harbour by contrary winds, most of them bound for Spain and Portugal. Only one flip lately arrived from Bilboa with her lading of Lemmons and Opanges.

Vienna, Mart. 3. The N bility of Hungary having contulted with His Imperial Majerty and his Ministers about the Concernments of that Kingdom, and given in a Petition for the redrefs of leveral Grievances, went hence on Thurfday laft, but have left behind them fome of their Deputies to attend the Emperour for his Refolution. In the mean while His Imperial Majefty having frequent advia ces of feveral violences lately committed by the Turks within the Kingdome of Hungary tubject to his jurifdiction, and that they have a defign to march a confiderable part of their forces without leave, through his Dominions in that King lome, to make war upon the Republick of Vemice in Balmatia, has refolved to lend feveral Regiments of

orle and Foot into the *Upper Hungary*, and is ordering a confiderable fum of moneys to be provided for their pay and maintenance, that a good Difcipline may be kept up amongft them, that the people may not have any just caule given them of fa ther complaint; and Orders are lent to the Count Seriai to observe the motion of the Turks, and to oppose them if they shall endeavor a forcible psstage.

Yesterday their Imperial Majossies and the whole Court assisted at the Funerais of the young Princels of Inspruck, which were solerimized with much pomp in the Church of the bare soored Augustins.

The Courier lately dispatched hither from Configntinople, advises us, that all the hopes of a Peace upon the late Negotiations between the Venetians and the Turks are wholly vanished; the Turks infifting upon the demand of the giving up of Candia it felf and its Dependencies, or the full value thereof; which being refused, he has declared his resolution to fall upon the Venetians both by Sea and Land, and to profecuje the Siege afrefh.

Fiend, Mar. 9 The Emperour having confidered of the Propositions made to him by the G andees of Hungary, has refolved to have a farther (onference with them about the middle of Lant, to which the General of the Hyper Hungary, and these Deputies which made not now their appearance are cited. In the mean while His Imperial Majefty has ordered the Bar de Bety, the Lieutenant General of the Upper Hungary, and the Sieur Kochery, to repair to the 25 Commonstites of United Provinces there, to perfivade their a continue in their abedience, and to moderate their preferitions. About 1 4000 men are ordered to march towards those parts, carrying with them moneys for their pay, and preparations are making to oppose the Turks, if they continue in their defign to march through the Territories of Count Sering.

The Government of the Frontiers about Waradin is conferred upon the Markgrave Leopold of Baden.

From the Lower Hungary they tell us of a fudden Fire

which lately happened at *Qedenburgh*, which in little [pace confumed above an hundred Houles.

Stockholm, Mars, 6. The Count Tot Governour of Liefland, actigned Ambasilador from His Majelly of Sweden into Poland, is preparing his Train and Equipage in orcer to his journey, and may in few days for fourwords; having already concluded with an Hambourg Melchant for the fettlesment of his Bills of Exchange for the defraying of the expences of his Embassie. r

His Majefty has ditpatched his Orders to the Sieur Fouckel his Refident at Hambo rg, enjoyning him to pais thence immediately to be pre-ent and affifting at the Treaty of peace which is ftill negotiating between the Prince Elector Palatine and the Duke of Lorrain.

Dantfick, Mart. 10. The feveral Parties and Factions full continue with much heat to gain the Suffrages of those who are to have any part in the Election of a Succeffor to the Crown of Poland, and we are confident'y told that the Grand Chancellor of the Crown Letkinski, has lately propoled the Election of the Prince of Orange, of whom the generality of that Kingdom difcourfe much to his advantage. The Duke of Lorrain has fent his facton Recommendato y to the Primate and Senate of Poland in favour of the Prince his Nephew, but they have not thought fit to have it read till the Affembly of the States.

From Ukrania they write, that the Tarrats with their Sultan baying received everal defeats upon feveral encourters beyond the Dniper, were retired ; and that General Dorofensko with the Loyal Coffa ks, had spent some dayes in their pursuit, with hopes to have engaged them ; but not being able to joyn th m, had disposed of his forces into their Winter Quarters : but that the Poles had not yet any confidence in the faid General, who though he carries things with all feeming fairnefs and plaufibility to the Crown of Poland, and profetles much affection to its interest, yet is he more than fullpected to keep a Correspondency with the Enemies to that Kingdom ; in which inlpition they had been confirmed by Letters from Bialacierko, informing, that he the faid Dorofensko had been lately treating with the Tartars, but upou what Terms or Atticles was not yet known 3 and that he had called a general Affembly of the Collacks at Okechrin, in which he had expressed himself to this purpole, That the Collacks might fublish without any dependance upon Poland, but por without the affistance of the Tartary, and contequently it was not advisable for their interest to break with them : and farther , that the Gover-nour or Commander of Bialacier to had lent so the Genera ral Dorpfencko for a necestary fupply of provisions, with which h, had refuled to comply : whereupon the Governorhad by his Letters of the 9th of February last made his Complaints, and farther affi ming, that the place was reduced to fo great an extremity by reason of their want of neceflaries, that he fhould be forced to leave it, if he had not a supply sent him in three weeks. This day strived here the Deputies fent hither from the States of Zealand, in order to fome Negotiations with the States of Holland; The Prince of Orange has now began to reform his Honshold, and to make fome retrenchments in his most unnecessary expences, as also to moderate the allowances and wages of feveral Officers.
