They have also taken into their confiderations the disputes will that the full on solution of the states of Guelderland about the limits and bounds of the C unit of Creuer and Guelderland, have ordered another Efficient to be written to the faid Elector carneftly prefing him to admit of an amicable composition of that difference.

The Heet Brainines our Commissioners who has been for some time Refident from the States at Frankfort, is lately ordered to return home, and to give the States a perfect account by word of mouth, of the present posture of the alfairs of Germany.

The Province of Holland has nominated the Heer Jean de Witt, a kinsman of the Penfionary of that name to be fent Ambaflasor to the Gourt of France.

Ohe Montieur Volambiers a F eich man and Officer in, the Garriloh of Meeffricht having upon a quarrel with another Officer in the lame Garrilon been arrelted by Order from Montieur litter furnthe Commander of that place, making an elcape from his confinement, lought out the faid Commander litter furn as he was funting, and with his Piffol fhot him through the body and fled thence into the Country of Liege; The Commander is yerliving, rhough with little hopes of secovery : the States upon information of the Fact, have ordered a letter to be fent to the Chancellour and Council of Liege, defiring them to arreft the Taid Columbier s, that lo he may be proceeded again & according to juffice.

The Deputies of the Admiralty are yet here, and after fome confultations, have communicated to the States their opinions and advice for the advancement of Trace, and the belt management of their Marine aff irs.

The Republick of Venice hath by a Letter to the States-General, earnetHy reproducted to them the dangerous effate and condition of their affairs in Candias and the concernmient of all Chriftian Princes and States for the prefetvation of that plade out of the hands of the Turks, vigoroully prefing fot an affiltance, but as yet the States are not come to any refolution upon that point.

Bruffels, Mars. 22. The French intend a Rendezyous of a confiderable part of their forces near Acth, where is expected the Mirefhal de Turenne, and in the mean time ate every where repairing their Fortifications, and fupplying their Magazines within their late Conquet, with all forts of Provisions.

On Wedneiday last His Majesty went to Verfailles, where he intends to divert himself upon the Lake with feveral guilt boats which are there provided for him; where there are also Hiroquois with their Gondola's brought from the Indies, made of one entire piece of Bark, in which they Row with extraordinary livitines.

The forces defigned for *Candis* are drawing with all diligence towards *Thoulon* r pon their embarking on the *Saone*, two of the Boats which were over filled with foldiers and Officers, opened and funk; in the bigger.were caft away about Fifty Soldiers, but the Officers which were in the leffer happily elcaped to Land, only one En figge drowned.

• A Courier Extraordina y arriving here from Venice, tells us that fome French men difguiled and armed, eatred i...d the houle of the Refident of Mastua, where there was a more then ulual meeting of Ladies at a Ball, and with much rudenels took from them feveral of their Jewels, and after fome refiftance made against thems in which feveral perfons were hurt, efcaped out of the houle, but the people in the Streets taking the Allarum, got tumultuoully together and went to the French Amballadors house, whicher they fancied thole French anight have repaired for Protection, and endeavoured to force open the doors in fearch after thom, but fome of the Noble Venetians having notice of the tunult, came leafonably to the refcue of the Amballador, who might otherwile have ran much hazard amongft the incended multitude.

I armonth, March 15. Yesterday about 40 fail of ships belonging to Scarborongb, Hull, Linne, and this place, failed hence for the Thames, the fame day arrived one Vessel of this place from St. Maloes. This day passed thorow this Road, two Fleets, one of them confisting of light ships bound for Newcastle, the other laden from thence and Sunderland, intending for London, We are now informed that a Ketch of this place of 100 Tuns, laden with Herrings and Lead, is cast away off Majorka in the Mediteranean.

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
