THE Term fixed by the Duke of Savoy's last Proclamation for the Rebels of *Montdovi* to surrender themselves, being expired, Orders were sent to the Governor of *Verceil*, who commands his Royal Highness's Forces in those Parts, to march against them; In the mean time, the Rebels being grown desperate, attacked the Regiment of *Chablais* commanded by the Count de *Nazaro*, which they put into disorder, killing the Colonel, and divers Soldiers. The Duke's Troops having received a Reinforcement, soon after fell upon the Rebels in three several Places near *Vico*, and forced them from thence; But while the Soldiers were busied in Plundering, a Party of the Rebels returned and Charged them, and killed and wounded several, and amongst others, the Count de *la Roche*, Colonel of the Regiment of *Montferrat*, received a Wound, of which 'tis thought he will hardly recover. The Duke's Troops were soon put into order again, and beat back the Rebels with great loss, who, to save themselves, retired to the Mountains, where as on one hand they are secured by posting themselves in Places that are inaccessible, so on the other they will not be able long to subsist. In the Actions before-mentioned divers of the Rebels were killed, and others taken Prisoners, and the chief of the latter have been executed.

Lemberg, Feb. 20. The *Tartars*, under the command of Sultan *Gerey*, have made an Inroad into this Country, and appeared on the 17th Instant within 5 Miles of this City, destroying all before them, and occasioning a great Consternation among the Inhabitants; The Crown-General, who is at present in this City, upon the first News he received of their March, sent out Orders for all the Troops quartered hereabouts to draw together; but before they could get into a Posture to make Head against the *Tartars*, they had done a great deal of Mischiefe, and were retired towards *Caminiec*.

Warsaw, March 7. On the 3d Instant the King went on Horseback, attended by divers Persons of Quality, to the Palace of the Palatine of *Plosko*, who entertained His Majesty and the whole Court at Dinner. In the Afternoon there was a Running at the Ring; For which purpose the King had named divers of the young Nobility, who were divided in four Squadrons, the first of which was led on by the King, who won the greatest Prize; and Prince *Alexander*, Prince *Constantine*, and Prince *Radziwil* Great-Chancellor of *Lithuania*, were at the Head of the other three.

On the 5th Instant, being the King's Birth-day, he was Complimented by the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Quality, and in the evening there was a very fine Firework. The Diversions of the Carnival being ended, the Princes *Alexander* and *Constantine* intend in a day or two to go to *Lublin* to meet Prince *James*, their Brother, in order to agree together about dividing the Estate left them by the late King their Father. The Circular Letters for the Meeting of the Little or Provincial Diets, in order to chuse their Deputies to be sent to the General Diet, which is to meet here on the 29th of *May*, are issued out. It's said, that the King intends in the mean time to make a Journey into *Prussia*. The Committee of the Senate, to whom the Consideration of the Affair of *Elbing* is referred, have frequent Meetings, and most of the Senators seem to be of opinion, not to begin the Treaty till the *Brandenburgh* Troops have evacuated *Elbing*, and left things in the condition they were before the Elector made himself Master of that Place. The Starost of *Ghebn* will set forward in few days on his Embassy to the Grand Signior; The more haste being made to dispatch him, because several Things are to be regulated with the Port concerning the Artillery, Ammunition, and Magazines at *Caminiec*, before that Place be delivered to the *Polanders*. The said Ambassador has Orders likewise to demand Satisfaction for the last Incurfion the *Tartars* have made into *Russland*, the Grand Signior having engaged by the late Treaty, That all such Hostilities and Depredations should cease from the day of signing the same. In the mean time we have Advice from *Lemberg*, that the *Tartars*, after having made great Spoil in the Country thereabouts, are returned home with their Booty.

Vienna, March 11. Count *Oting*, the Emperor's First Ambassador at the late Treaty at *Carlowitz*, arrived here yesterday from *Hungary*, in order to give his Imperial Majesty an Account of his Negotiation, and to prepare for his Embassy to the *Ottoman* Port; And Count *Marsigli*, one of his Collegues at the said Treaty, is daily expected, the Emperor having made choice of him to be one of the Commissioners to treat with the *Turkish* Commissioners about settling the Limits between the two Empires; who are to meet for this purpose at *Carlowitz* on the 20th of this Month. The Emperor has nominated the Count of *Sinzendorf* to go with the Character of Ambassador to the *French* Court. The Ambassador of *Muscovy* intends to take his Audience of Leave, and to return home in a short time; and we hear, the Czar has appointed one to succeed him, intending to have a Minister constantly residing at this

the Count. Count Arco, who lately came hither in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Saxony to notify the Death of the Elector Prince of Saxony, has had Audience of their Imperial Majesties, of the King and Queen of the Romans, and of the Arch-Duke and Arch-Duchess, and he designs to return home in few days. The Count de Hornac has enter'd upon the dispatching of Publick Business as one of the Emperor's Chief Ministers of State, in the room of the late Count K. It's not yet known who will be made Chancellor of Saxony. Our Letters from Hungary say, Count Schlick, one of the Emperor's Plenipotentiaries at the late Treaty with the Turks, was still at K. but intended to begin his Journey hither to soon as the Heer T. Secretary to the Embassy, was returned from Carowitz, to which Place he went on the 27th of the last Month, to exchange with the Secretary of the Turkish Ambassadors the Ratifications of the Treaty between the Emperor and the Port. The Roads about E. being very much infested by Robbers, who keep together in great Numbers, the Commander of that Garrison had sent out divers Parties in pursuit of them. The Germans have begun to demolish the Fortifications of Comau, Lipsa, Borsch, and such other Places as are to be restor'd to the Turks in pursuance of the late Treaty.

Brussel, March 22. The Elector of Saxony is expected here this evening from Mannheim. The Marquis de Prognan, Envoy from the Most Christian King, intends shortly to take his Audience of Leave of his Electoral Highness, and to return home. We hear, the French have begun to work on the Canal they intend to make from the Saale to the River Elbe, and that they design to finish it before Winter.

Hannover, March 24. The States of Saxony and W. are Adjourn'd for a fortnight. The Heer Von E. is returned hither from Golden-Land, and the Heer Von E. from North-Holland.

Rome, March 25. N. S. The Pope having published a Bull to confirm the Arch-Bishop of Cambray's See, and forbid the Reading of it on pain of Excommunication; the same was no sooner received here, but divers Persons who had the said Bull, and even some who are thought to favour the Opinions contained therein, took them to see Arch-Bishop. The Count de Arco was soon heard to say that he had been having a conference with the King's Leave to many Mathematicians at the College of Trinitaria. Don Juan de Austria, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Saxony, has had Audience of Leave, and will set out in a day or two for Brussel.
