Cadiz, March 16. N. S.

THE Commerce have resolved, that the Flota bound to New-Spain shall sail about Midsummer next, of which, publick Notice has been given here in the usual manner, that the Merchants may get ready the Effects they design to send thither against that time. Two Men of War and a Petache bound for Carthagena, are now in this Port ready to sail with the first fair Wind. On the 8th Instant came in here the *Mary Galley*, *William Jeffreys* Master, from Ireland; as did likewise on the 13th, the *Golden-Lion*, *Andrew Cander* Master, and a Ketch; *Thomas Merriman* Commander. The Portugal Merchant, Captain *Thomas Say* Commander, sailed the 2d Instant for London. On the 9th sailed the Spanish Merchant, *Bernard Ludman* Master, for London; the *Mary*, *Edw. Mathews* Master, for Amsterdam; the *George Sloop*, *Warner Knap* Master, for Corke; and the *Elizabeth*, *John Marshall* Master, for Barnstable: And on the 13th, the *Canham Galley*, *John West* Master, for Bristol; and the *Golden Lion*, *James Kendall* Master, for Scotland.

Madrid, March 26. The Count de Monasterol, who lately came hither with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria, to notify the Death of the Electoral Prince, has had Audience of their Catholick Majesties. The King has appointed Don Berlipi to go to Vienna as his Envoy Extraordinary, to Compliment the King and Queen of the Romans upon their Marriage. The Council have been extraordinarily assembled, to consider of a Letter which the King received some days ago from the Emperor of Morocco, who therein expresses a Readiness to enter upon a Treaty of Peace, and desires that some fit Person may be appointed by this Court to Negociate the same. The Conde d'Adanero, President of the Council for the Affairs of the Indies, is lately dead; and it's thought, the King will give that Office to the Conde d'Aguilar, which in the mean time is Executed by the Marquis del Carpio. We have Advice from Cadiz of the 17th Instant, that Don Pimiento, whom the King has made Governor of Carthagena, sailed from thence that day with two Men of War and a Petache, which carry a Supply of Men and Ammunition for that Garrison. Our Letters from Ceuta say, the Moors continue before that Place, but seem to grow weary of the Siege, and are much less vigorous in their Attacks than formerly; The Belieged have received a Reinforcement of 260 Men, and

a fresh Supply of Provisions, and are making a new Ditch, and some other Works round the Place.

Rome, March 28. The Queen Dowager of Poland arrived here last Tuesday incognito, and is lodged in the Palace of Don Livio Odescalchi. The Pope being made acquainted with her arrival by the Baron Scarlatti, Resident from the Elector of Bavaria, ordered Signior Aquaviva, his Chamberlain, to go immediately and Compliment her in his Name, and sent her a Present of Refreshments. On Thursday the Queen made a private Visit to the Pope; She was received as she came out of her Coach by several of the Pope's Officers, and conducted into the Room, where the Pope was seated on a Throne under a Canopy. The Queen kissed his Feet, and then was placed at his right hand on a Velvet Chair embroider'd with Gold, being treated in the same manner as Queen Christina of Sweden was by Pope Alexander VII. The Differences between the Emperor and this Court about the Imperial Fiefs in the Ecclesiastical State, are in a very fair way of being accommodated through the Mediation of the King of Spain; And it's said, Count Martinitz, Ambassador from the Emperor, will shortly be again admitted to have Audience of the Pope. Cardinal Morigia is arrived here from Florence, and has received his Cap from the Pope. It's believed, there will shortly be another Promotion of Cardinals, and that Signior Archinto, at present the Pope's Nuncio at Madrid, will be advanced to that Dignity.

Venice, April 3. Signior Grimani, whom the Senate have appointed to be their Commissioner for settling the Limits between the Venetian and Turkish Territories, went from hence last Tuesday for Dalmatia, where he is to meet the Turkish Commissioners, and to confer with them for this purpose. Directions are given for Disbanding some of the Venetian Forces in the Levant, and the rest will be put into the Frontier Places, where the Senate intend to keep very strong Garrisons, as also in the Islands of Zant, Cefalonia, and Corfu. It's said, this State will have a Fleet of 12 Men of War, 2 Galeasses, and 26 Gallies, constantly at Sea to guard our Coasts, and secure our Trade. Count Francis Pelicoli of Bergamo offers to give 100000 Ducats to be made a Nobleman of Venice, which it's thought will be accepted. The Duke of Mantua, who has continued some time in this City, is returned home. The Margaret arrived here last week from Scotland, and the Mazarine Galley from Ireland. This week came in here the Unity, with Herrings from Ireland.

Vienna, April 4. The Dutcheß-Dowager of Hanover is on her departure for Modena, and the Ba-

Baton of *Gersdorf* is appointed to conduct her to the Frontiers of that Principality. The Meeting of the General Diet of the Kingdom of *Hungary* at *Presburg*, is put off till next June. The Emperor has made Count *Martinitz*, who now resides as his Ambassador at the Court of *Rome*, Captain of his Guard of Archers. The Bishop of *Passau*, who succeeds Prince *Lebesswitz* as the Emperor's Chief Commissioner at the Imperial Diet, is gone from hence to *Ratisbonne*.

Cologne, April 3. Prince *Charles of Lorraine*, Bishop of *Olmütz* and *Osnabrug*, arrived here last Tuesday from *Nancy*, having in his way made a Visit to the Elector of *Trier* at *Coblentz*, and to the Elector of *Cologne* at *Bonne*; He was Complimented at his Arrival here by our Magistrates, who made him the usual Present of Wine, and after having seen the Curiosities of this City, he went on yesterday for *Düsseldorf* to visit the Elector Palatine, and intends from thence to continue his Journey to *Osnabrug*.

Hague, April 17. Monsieur d'Opdam, Envoy from this State to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, has taken his Leave of the States-General, and will depart in few days for *Berlin*. Monsieur de Bonrepas, the French Ambassador, who is lately returned hither from *Paris*, has had Audience of the States. The Earl of *Athlone* is come hither from *Amerongen*, and General *Dopf* from *Mansfield*; and they have since been in Conference with the Deputies of the Council of State about changing of the Garrisons of our Frontier Towns, which is appointed to be next Month. It's said, the States intend to disband three Men out of each Company of Foot and each Troop of Dragoons, and to change two Regiments of Foot into Marines. The Count de *Frise* is arrived here from *Germany*, and intends to go in few days for *England*.

Paris, April 15. N. S. The Envoy of *Morocco* has had several Meetings with the Commissioners appointed by this Court to treat with him about the Redemption of the French Captives in *Barbary*, but hitherto there is very little likelihood of their coming to an Agreement. They write from *Neuf-Chatel*, that all Things continued in the same state, and that the Prince of *Couti* would stay there till the return of the Express he lately sent hither, to give the King an Account of the Declaration the States of that Principality have made concerning his Pretensions. The Ambassador of *Savoy* has acquainted this Court, that the Rebellion of *Mondovi* is quite suppressed. Monsieur *Tiquet*, a Counsellor of the Parliament of *Paris*, was set upon by several Persons two nights ago as he was coming home, and very much wounded, so that it's thought he will hardly recover.

Falmouth, April 8. Yesterday came in here the *Joseph* of *London*, *Christopher Marshall* Commander, bound home with Wine from *Barcelona*. The Spanish Expedition Pacquet-boat failed this afternoon with a fair Wind for the *Groyne*.

Plymouth, April 9. Yesterday came in here the *St. George* of *Diepe*, *Jacob Franc* Master, from *Nantz*, with Wine for *Ostend*; the *Gustavus* of *Stockholme*, *Hantz Santo* Master, from *St. Tubet*, and the *Sacres* of *Bristol*, *Wood Rogers* Master, both bound for *Stockholme*; which Ships failed again this day, as did also the *Mary* of *London*, *John Shepard* Ma-

ster, bound home from *Cadix*, and the *Restoration* of *London*, *James Thomas* Master, from *Fiall*, bound for *Rotterdam*.

Kingston, April 11. The King went from hence this day to *Newmarket*.
