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*Pentennis, March 15.*

**O**N Saturday last sailed hence about 20 ships French, Dutch, and some English, bound for the Bank, when 3 or 4 Londoners intended for *Smirna*, endeavored to proceed on their Voyage, but were again put back; these with several other ships which have for several weeks been confined to this Port by contrary winds and unreasonable weather, are still waiting a fit wind to invite them out to sea. On Friday last came in the *Morning Star* of London belonging to the *East-India* Company.

*Milford, March 15.* The 10th instant arrived at *Tinby* a small Vessel belonging to *Belfast* in *Ireland* from *St. Martins*, the Master informing, that the French are vigorously proceeding against those of the Reformed Religion amongst them; having ordered them by a time limited to leave that Town, upon pain of Imprisonment and Confiscation: which before his departure they were putting into execution.

*Rome, Mar. 9.* On Sunday last the Constable *Colonna*, Duke di *Nevers*, the Cavalier *Gio. Baptista Rospigliosi*, with the Marquis *Bentivoglio*, and others for an addition to the Diversions of the Carnival, appeared with an extraordinary Train and rich Liveries, and performed their Courses at the Ring, in presence of the Queen of *Sweden* and many of the Cardinals, Princes, Ladies, and Nobility of this place; where there sat as Judges for the Prize Segnior *Baylivo Fra. Vincenzo Rospigliosi*, the Marquis *Tossoni*, and Cavalier *Marescotti*.

In the mean time the Pope spends the greatest part of his time at his Devotions, and on Tuesday last came from *St. Sabina* to visit the Churches of *Jesus* and *St. Mary's the Great*; whereas in the rest of the Churches about *Rome*, he ordered the Sacrament to be exposed, and the Churches to be dressed up in the richest Ornaments, the better to draw the people thither from the sports of the Carnival; and the next morning rode with much solemnity in his Pontifical Habit, attended by the Colledge of Cardinals, the Ambassadors, Princes, Noblemen, and Prelates, to *St. Sabina*, where he performed the Ceremonies of the *Ash-Wednesday*, and in the afternoon returned to the *Vatican*.

From *Naples* they tell us, that the Vice Roy has this last week made sale of the Offices of Paymasters of the Militia of that City and Kingdom for the sum of 7500 Ducats, and ordered the moneys so raised to be employed for the beautifying of the Arsenal and making a new way to it.

*Vienna, March 10.* We are daily more and more apprehensive of the Turks intentions, especially since the more than usual Correspondencies held with *Michael Abassi* Prince of *Transylvania*, whose intentions to disturb the Peace of *Hungary* are of late much suspected.

Our Letters from the *Upper Hungary*, inform us, that the Turks have put an extraordinary Garrison into *Waradin*, and re-inforced all their Neighbouring Garrisons; leaving some jealousies amongst the Hungarians that they may have a design either upon *Tyrnav*, *Cassovie*, or *Tramheim*.

They farther affirm, that the Tartars employed in the Turkish Service have committed several disorders about the Fort of *Tockay*.

Besides the Regiments which His Imperial Majesty has ordered to draw towards the *Upper Hungary* for preservation of the peace of those parts, new levies are ordered to be made in *Moravia* and in all the Hereditary Countries, and the Count *Esterhazy* by the Emperour nominated to command

as General of those Forces which are ordered for the security of the Frontiers. A Courier extraordinary is also dispatched to the Baron di *Casa nova* the Emperours Resident in the Grand Segnions Court, by whom 'tis believed the Emperour may receive some light and farther discovery of the intentions of the Turks; who has also a strict command to use his utmost diligence upon the way, and to return with what speed he is able.

Our Letters from the *Levant* inform us, that the Grand Segnior intended speedily to leave *Larissa*, and to pass thence towards *Dalmatia*, to encourage the war which he intends to make on that side upon the Venetians, the better to divert them from the defence of *Candia*.

*Hambourgh, Mar. 22.* The Earl of *Carlisle* Ambassador from His Majesty of *Great Britain* to the Crown of *Sweden*, having from hence given a Visit to the Dukes of *Lunenburg* at *Celle*, where he was received with much kindness and civility, departed hence yesterday for *Stockholme*; from whence we are told that the King and Queen, with the Senators which usually attend that Court, having for some time diverted themselves in the Country, are again returned to *Stockholme*, and the Count Tot the Governour of *Livonia*, assigned Ambassador into *Poland* about the Concernments of the future Election, intended in few dayes to set forwards on his Voyage, and that Orders were sent from the Court of *Sweden* to the Sieur *Mareshall*, a Member of the Council established in the City of *Bremen*, to transport himself with all diligence to the *Hague*, there conjoyntly with the Sieur *Appelboon* to conclude the Garranty according to the Tenor of the Triple Alliance.

From *Dresden* we are told, that the Solemnity of the Baptisme of the young Prince *John George* the fourth Son to the Prince Elector of *Saxony*, being ended with much Magnificence, the Grandees and several Ambassadors have taken their leaves and are returning home.

Letters from *Warsaw* inform us, that the General Land-day for *Prussia* is quietly ended, and their Deputies dismissed with full instructions to assist at the General Assembly.

They farther tell us, that an Ambassador is lately arrived at *Warsaw* from the Tartars, and another from the Cossacks: The former assuring the States of *Poland* of their resolution to maintain the Treaty of Peace made with the Poles: The latter promising to continue their Allegiance; but both of them earnestly pressing that the young Prince of *Moscow* may not be chosen to succeed to the Crown of *Poland*.

The Duke of *Lorrain* has lately written to the Senators of *Poland* a Recommendatory Letter in the behalf of the Prince of *Lorrain* his Nephew; but the Senators disliking the Address, as not giving them their due Titles, and as little pleased with the stile of the Letter, have sent it without Answer to the Prince his Nephew.

From *Bialacierko* they have this account of the Affairs of those parts in a Letter from Colonel *Cobel* the Governour of that place, to this purpose;

The Sultan is retreated into his own Countrey, and hath taken with him his Field-Marshal *Suchowitz*, and *Dorosensk*; hath disposed of his Army into several Quarters. These parts of *Ukraina* are not yet released by the Tartars, but expect their coming in the Spring. I do with much impatience expect supplies both of Money and Provisions from *Poland*, being wholly destitute of both; in which if I fail, I shall shortly be necessitated to sell the
