ROYAL AIR FORCE.

The KING has been graciously pleased to approve the undermentioned awards, in recognition of gallantry displayed in flying operations against the enemy:—

Awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Flight Lieutenant Archibald Ashmore McKellar (90168), Auxiliary Air Force.

This officer has at all times displayed the keenest desire to engage the enemy. In his first large-scale encounter against enemy aircraft he displayed a great sense of leadership and tactics in launching his flight against ninety Heinkel III's. As a result, at least four enemy aircraft were destroyed, of which Flight Lieutenant McKellar destroyed three. He has displayed outstanding leadership and courage.

Acting Flight Lieutenant Peter Malan Brothers (37668).

During an offensive patrol in August, 1940, this officer's flight encountered about one hundred enemy aircraft. He led the flight in attack against them, but before this could be pressed home, he was himself attacked by a number of Messerschmitt 110's. Turning to meet them, he found himself in a stalled position; he spun out of it and immediately sighted and engaged a Dornier 215 which he shot down. Later in the day he destroyed a Messerschmitt 109. Altogether Flight Lieutenant Brothers has destroyed seven enemy aircraft. He has at all times displayed great courage and initiative.

Acting Flight Lieutenant Sidney Robert GIBBS (37776).

In August, 1940, Flight Lieutenant Gibbs, as captain of a Sunderland aircraft, was detailed to carry out a reconnaissance of Tromso. After a long night flight, under bad conditions, he located eight Heinkel 115 float planes, which he promptly attacked. As a result, three of these aircraft were destroyed and the remainder seriously damaged. Flight Lieutenant Gibbs brought his aircraft safely to his home base after being in the air for fifteen and a half hours. Valuable information concerning shipping in
