firmine i in tikle parts, all the Jews being in a kinde of diffradian upon the arrivat of Sabadai, a prophetical Jew, a Smirnone born, lately come from ferufalem; who in few cayes has preached fuch opinions into these people, that having periwased them the number of years is accomplished, all of them are hig with expectation of their Meffas, and the full reframmition of the Jews; above two hundred men, womenand children are hereupon turned Prophets, and their Assembles grow to numerous, their all the Neighbour Nations have their eves upon them. The Turks do not yet orposte them. Schalasi their chief Prophet (leaving behinde him in Gazzane of his Prophets, called Nathan, with full Industrians in his absente) is embarqued for Constantinople, in Company of two Salaks; as they key, to demand the Land of Premise from the Grant Stephion.

Brigels, March 16. The Durch seem to be in despair of sering out their Fiet, for want of Seamen, and are little fatisfied in the courage of those they have. De Rugter hath not we above Seamen for his own Ship; anding is very low, and great complaints of its leadness in all rates. Several Houles in Amfardam are to be let, and at half rates. His Majesty of England hath gained strange admiration of His Willom and Generousness, even amongst the Durch themfores, by his Declaration against the French, intomuch, that very many of Amsterdam of the richest and greatest Manufactors, are recoved to make tile of His Majesties offer, on condition they may have liberty of settling themselves, and working steely in any place near London, if not in it.

A Course from Spain brings advice, that a Suspension of Arms was commanded the next day after the arrival of the Lord Fanscam at Lieben.

The French King hath appointed a Rendezvous for all the Funces designed for those parts at Roy, seven Leagues from Peronne; though it is said his 15000 which he expected, will want 7000 upon the Muster.

D' particular command, a farther notice is hereby g ven unto all Perions owing any Rent or Suris of Money for Wine Decembes, That if they do not fortheigh pay the fame into His Royal Highner's Committioners for that Revenue, using in Darbam-yard, Lardan. And also renew the rincenses ending at Larday day next, Process will like out of the Exchequer against them for the same; which all Pe. Sins concerned, are to take notice of, that they may avoid the charge and trouble which otherwise will emise.

Bourdesux, March 15. We are informed from Rochel, That the Dextroue, a Merchant ship, Captain Martin Compander, laden with Pilchards, was set upon by a Datch Caper of 10 Guns from Flushing; but having not strength enough for a close fight, after all the resistance that could possibly be made, the Captain having received 22 wounds, his Company being so sar over-powered, was forced to yield, and was brought into Rochel; where the men were immediately, raw as they were, in their blood and wounds, thrown into Prison, onely by the charitable care of some of his Countrey-men, leave was obtained that the Captain might be lodged in a Chirurgions house, where all care is taken for his recovery; of which, they are not without some hopes. Nine or ten small Durch Capers very much miest the Seas hereabouts; their usual stations being between Cape Cleare in Ireland, and St. Vincent in Spain.

Whitebal, March 14. His Majesty had Letters from Sally, Decemb. 10, which informs, That Mr. Warren having made a Peace, and settled Commerce with Sanda Cruz, same since to this place; and a little after his arrival, sent his Letters of Credence to the Governor, who communicated them to City Gayland, who as the Governor says, hath given or set to conclude a Peace with Mr. Warren on behalf of His Majesty; but he was purout of the Road by soul weather before the Order came to him.

There are in this Town Six Men of War, all small ones, the biggest of star Gains, whereof one was cast away four days since upon the Bar: There was lately a Prize brought in, coming stone Brazil, worth 50 or 60000 Duckars, but in passing the Bar, was put on thore, and lost half the value of her goods. She had 33 Christian Captives, and but 2 Gains, with onely one single shot of Powder and Ball for them both.

Barnsiable, March 9. Yesteriay arrived here three Vessis from Lubon, viz. The Fellowship, the John and andrew, and the Susan, that came in company of Five Bristol ships, and were convoyed by the Fox horsait.

Plymouth, March 9. Wednellay last there came in here a Vessel from Lubon, who came in company with eleven

Merchant thirs, who are all lafely returned.

Eristel, March 10. Captain Ofgood, Commander of the Fox Fregar, having Conveyed home the Meichants from Lubon, which are all lasely arrives, gives this account of his Veyage, That he took a Ship of 100 Tuns from under the Commani of Garlands Cattle of Arzilla, after eight hours clipme with the Caitle; in which he killed about 50 Moors in the Town, and as many of more in the Brigandines, that endeavored, by issuing our, to retake the Ship, with the log of onely one man, and another wounder; the Ship he brought into Tangier.

In Sazeta Cruz Bay he mer with a Dutch Caper of as Guns, and 150 Men, with whom he exchanged several Broad-sides, but the Dutchman receiving two strounder Water, with the loss of some sew men, randway; the Fox ma having menencugh to board her: He confirms the success of Mr. Warrenat Sally, and the great probability of the like a Morocco, whither he went about the like Negotiation.

Harmish, March 10. On Thursday, towards the Evening, came in here Captain Peach of the True-live, who had convoyed fixteen Colliers from Tinmouth to the Mouth of the Thanes. He was saluted by the Colliers at Brilling on-Ray, who with their Convoy, lay expecting a wind. About Tamouth Roads, he perceived the Sansia Maria and Toung Liss, and he believes one or two Fregets more Convoving of above 200 Sail of Colliers bound for Newcastle 5 the Coasts every way clear.

Dover, March 10. This day past by sor Ossend, 15 Sal, Fourteen Merchants, and one Convoy, from Baurdeaux. It is reported here, by one that came from aboard of one of the Ships, that they had met with two of the Kings ships off of Beeshy, which have taken six of their Ships and one Convoy, which belonged to the Fleet. The fifteen are gone clear away

to Oftend.

Litto, March 11. This morning arrived the Frenchard Flanders Packet-Boats; by whom we found, that His Maje. fities Declaration hath wrought great effects upon the people, both in France and Amsterdam. Here are above twenty persons come over from France, under the notion of Protestants, and many more they say will follow. One from Helland tells us, that the Dutch are much inclined to a Peace with England, since they beard of His Majesties Declaration.

Hull, March 11. This day is arrived a small Vessel simple Prussia, laden with Flax, she came from thence in Novemblast, and Wintered in Copenhagen: She came from Essence it is of January, and put into Mossiane in Sweden, near Gottenburgh, and came from thence the 26 of Februss, she tells us that before she came from thence, the Swedeshal the News of the League between Denmark and Holless, to which it was there generally said, that they should be put very suddenly upon action against them both; she met no ship at all in her passage, till she saw the Cole-Fleet in Brittington Bay, on Friday last with their Convoy.

Plymouth, March is. The Oxford sent in hither aprile laden with Summ'd Wines, who reports that the Earl of Sandwith past this Port on Monday last, and it is boped, he hath by this time attaqu'd his Port, the Wind having con-

tinued fair ever fince.

The Nightingale is returned hither from convoying the Streights Fleet towards London.

The Forresters Prize is come hither from Torbay, laden

with Beef, &c.

This day, two Vessells arrived here from St. Malo's, laden with Linnen Clock and Sope, who report that the Duke de Beaufors was expected home from Thoulan, with a considerable number of Men of Warr, and Merchant ships, but feared much least he should meet with Sir Fereny Smith.
