

Andrew Rouse Boughton-Knight and his successors in title shall have the second and the fourth turns and the said Mary Custance and her successors in title shall have the third turn.

"7. That after the union referred to in Clause 2 of this Scheme has taken effect the patronage of the united Benefice of Wigmore with Leinthall Starkes shall belong wholly to the Bishop of Hereford.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from making any other recommendations and proposals relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Measures, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England, or of any Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Measures, and Notices have been transmitted to the persons or bodies entitled under the said Measures to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Measures:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Hereford has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas an appeal against the said Scheme has been made to His Majesty in Council by Mr. C. A. Boughton-Knight, and such appeal was referred to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council on the 1st day of January, 1940:

And whereas the Lords of the said Committee, having taken the said appeal into consideration, reported to His Majesty in Council that the appeal ought to be dismissed and the said Scheme be approved:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council by Order of the 9th day of May, 1941, to approve the said Report:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the date when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measures.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Hereford.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the 15th day of May, 1941, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the Parish of Aldborough, the Parish of Kirby on the Moor and the New Parish of Boroughbridge, all in the Diocese of Ripon:

"Whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to be desirable that the boundaries of the said Parishes and New Parish should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the Bishop of the Diocese and the Incumbents of the Benefices concerned consent to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof they have signed this Scheme):

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said Parish of Aldborough, the said Parish of Kirby on the Moor and the said New Parish of Boroughbridge, shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedules of and delineated on the map or plan annexed to this Scheme.

"THE SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"*The First Schedule.*"

"The territory (shown by pink colour on the map) to be annexed to the Parish of Kirby on the Moor in the County of York and in the Diocese of Ripon being:—

"All that portion of the Parish of Aldborough in the said County and Diocese which lies to the north of the middle of the River Ure.

"*The Second Schedule.*"

"The territory (shown by green colour on the map) to be annexed to the New Parish of Boroughbridge in the said County and Diocese being:—

"I. All that portion of the said parish of Aldborough (being a portion of an isolated part of the said Parish) which is bounded upon the west by the New Parish of Roecliffe in the said County and Diocese, upon the north by the said Parish of Kirby on the Moor, upon the east by the said New Parish of Boroughbridge and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Boroughbridge from the said isolated part of the Parish of Aldborough at a point in the middle of the road known as Aldborough Gate and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said road for a distance of 32 chains
