The KING has been graciously pleased to approve the award of the British Empire Medal (Military Division) to:—

939506 Sergeant William Allan Thynne, Royal Air Force.

This airman was the air gunner of an aircraft engaged in dive-bombing enemy transport on the Addis Ababa-Dessie road. Following a loud report, a fire was observed along the starboard side of the fuselage. Sergeant Thynne immediately attempted to

beat out the flames with his scarf but was unable to do so. The flames were close to the reserve ammunition and spreading fiercely. Sergeant Thynne secured a fire extinguisher and returned to the fire, which he managed to combat and eventually subdue. It was solely due to the bravery of this airman that the aircraft was saved from destruction. During the operation his right hand was burned and he was wounded in the leg by machine-gun fire.
