Lisbon, August 11. N. S.

THE Body of the late Queen of Portugal having lain two days in State in the Palace, the Funeral was performed on the 6th Instant in the manner following. First marched two Regiments of Foot, their Officers cloathed in deep Mourning, and the Colours and Drums being covered with black Crape; Next came the Clergy of this City, each of them bearing a Wax-Candle in his hand; Then the Officers of the Crown on Horses with black Trappings, attended by their Servants all in Mourning. These were followed by the Clergy-men and Choir belonging to the Queens Chapel likewise on Horseback, bearing Torches in their hands; After whom marched the Officers of the Queens Household, the Chief of them on Horseback. The Duke de Cadaval, Mordomo-Mor or High-Steward of the Queens Household, came immediately before the Hearse in which was the Queens Body, on both sides whereof were her Guards of Halbardiers in close Mourning, carrying their Halbards with the Point downwards. In this Order they came to the Church of St. Vincent, where Mass being said by the Cardinal de Sousa, assisted by several Bishops, the Body was put into a Vault of the said Church, the principal Officers of the late Queens Household breaking their Graves (the Marks of their Offices) according to Custom. Directions are given for making a very stately Tomb over the Place where the Queens Body lies.

Turin, August 30. The Count de Ferger, whom the Emperor sent hither with the Character of his Envoy Extraordinary to make his Compliments to the Duke and Dutches of Savoy on the Birth of the Prince of Piedmont, had his Audience of Leave of their Royal Highnesses on the 23d Instant, and designs in few days to go back to Germany. The Duke and Dutches of Savoy returned hither last night from their Hoase called the Venerie, where they have spent some time in taking the Diversions of the Season. The Regiment of Horse called the Royal Piedmont, marched from hence this week to the Quarters assigned them in the Province of Mondovi.

Lemberg, August 27. The Commissioners appointed by the King of Poland to take Possession of the Places which are to be restored to this Crown by the Port, pursuant to the Treaty of Carlowitz, are gone to Caminiec, from whence the Turks are removing their Artillery, Ammunition;

and other Effects, in order to deliver that Place into their hands. One of the King's Saxon Regiments, and two Regiments of the Army of the Crown, are appointed to be in Garrison there, and will be ordered to march towards that City, as soon as we receive Advice that the Turks are ready to evacuate it; after which the Commissioners of Poland are in like manner to receive from the Turkish Commissioners the other Fortresses in Podolia which are yielded to this Crown by the Peace, and to deliver up to them several Forts on the Confines of Moldavia which are to be restored to the Grand Signior; They are also to confer with the Turkish Commissioners about settling the Limits between the Dominions of Poland and the Ottoman Empire. The Saxon Regiments which are to continue in this Kingdom, and the greatest part of the Forces of Poland, will be put into Winter-Quarters on the Frontiers of Russia.

Dantzick, Septemb. 9. Our Letters from Warsaw give an Account, that the Affair of Elbing is in a manner adjusted, the Principal Matters in Dispute betwixt the Crown of Poland and the Elector of Brandenburg having been settled in several Conferences held for that purpose between the Chief Ministers of Poland and the Baron Werner Resident of Brandenburg. This News is very acceptable here, this City being one of those that would have been most exposed to the Inconveniencies of the War, had the Difference between this Crown and the Elector of Brandenburg been unfortunately widened to a Rupture. The particular Conditions of this Accommodation are not yet certainly known, but 'tis reported in general, That the Elector of Brandenburg is to restore the Town of Elbing to the Polanders, and that they are to put some other Place into his hands till they have satisfied him as to his Pretensions; for the settling of which, Commissioners from his Electoral Highness are daily expected at Warsaw, and the Bishop of Cracow and the Palatine of Mariembourg are appointed to Treat with them, having Orders, as 'tis said, to make some Demands on the part of the Republick of Poland, in consideration of which they expect an Abatement of the Sums demanded by his Electoral Highness. They write likewise from Warsaw, that the Cardinal Primate has the Chief Management of all Publick Affairs in the King's Absence; that the Crown General and the General of Lithuania were in Town, and that there were frequent Conferences between them and some other General Officers about settling the Quarters of the Army; And that Major-Gen. Carlowitz was going to Moscow with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland, to negotiate an Accommodation of the Differences between this

Crown and the Czar concerning the Fortrefs of Czecherin in Ukrania.

Vienna, Sept. 6. The Arch-Dutchefs Mary Magdalen, who has been ill of the Small-Pox, is now perfectly recovered, and will go in 10 or 12 days to Ebersdorf, where the Imperial Court is at present. Count *Owing* intends within a fortnight to be going from hence on his Embassy to the Port, and will meet the Turkish Ambassador, who is coming to this Court, on the Frontier near *Sankemen*. Count *Simonetti*, who arrived here on the 25th past from Hungary, being sent by Count *Marsigli*, the Imperial Commissioner for settling the Limits, to give the Emperor an Account of the Proceeding between him and the Venetian and Turkish Commissioners, and that they were going to settle the Limits between the German and Turkish Territories in *Transilvania* and *Upper Hungary*, is gone back to Hungary with the Emperor's Directions thereupon.

Paris, Sept. 23. N. S. The Court is still at *Fontainebleau*. The Duke of Orleans has invited the King to his House at *Montargis*, about 12 Leagues distant from *Fontainebleau*, which is very well situated for Hunting. The Ministers of this Court have very frequent Consultations about the present Scarcity of Money in this Kingdom, and divers of the most eminent Bankers of this City were sent for the last week to *Fontainebleau*, to give their Opinions what may be the reason of it; 'Tis said, that an Arrest will shortly be published for raising to 13 Livers the old *Lewis d'Or* and the Spanish Pistols, which pass at present for 12 Livers and 5 Sols. And that the new Comptroller-General of the Finances has declared to the Receivers-General of the King's Revenues in this City, that the King expects each of them should lend him a Sum of Money according to his Abilities; And a Loan of 200000 Livers is demanded likewise of the Farmers-General of the Generality of *Tours*, which is reckoned the richest in this Kingdom next to that of *Paris*. The new Converts of this Kingdom have lately presented a Petition to the new Council which the King has appointed for Matters of Religion, complaining of the great Severities that are daily used against them, and particularly in taking away their Children; but we do not hear of any Orders given yet for their Relief: On the contrary every Post from the Country brings an Account of the hard Treatment the new Converts do suffer in *Languedoc*, *Poitou*, and the other Provinces of *France*. The Marquis de *Castel dos Rios*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *Spain* to this Court, arrived here this week from *Madrid*.

Portsmouth, Sept. 14. His Majesty's Ship the *Rockefter* is ready to sail from hence with the first fair Wind for *New-England*.

Yarmouth, Septemb. 15. This day came in here His Majesty's Ships the *Dunwich* and *Shoram*, being appointed to convoy the Vessels that are going out from hence to fish for Herrings.

The Letters from Holland of Tuesday last are not yet come in.
