mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 3rst and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure of Brailes (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') in the County of Warwick and in the Diocese of Coventry:

"Whereas we are satisfied that the Honourable Henry Arden Adderley of Fillongley Hall, in the said County of Warwick, is the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said Benefice in case the same were now vacant:

"And whereas the said Henry Arden Adderley desires to transfer the Advowson of the said Benefice to the Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Michael, Coventry, and is consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof he has executed the same):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the said Chapter and of the Right Reverend Mervyn, Bishop of Coventry (in testimony whereof they have executed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this without any conveyance Scheme and assurance in the law other than such duly Order the whole Advowson perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice shall be transferred to the said Chapter and their successors and shall thenceforth be absolutely vested in and shall from time to time be exercised by the said Chapter and by their successors for ever.'

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Coventry.

Whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 17th and 18th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 84, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 6th day of November, 1941, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 17th and 18th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 84, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice of Camberwell, in the County of Surrey and in the Diocese of Southwark, between that benefice and eight other benefices, namely the benefices of Saint Saviour with Saint Peter, Southwark; Saint Peter, Saint Helier; Saint John, Southend, Lewisham; Saint Andrew, Earlsfield; Saint Michael and All Angels, South Beddington; Saint Paul, Herne Hill; Saint Luke, Well Hall, Eltham, and All Saints, South Lambeth, all in the said County and Diocese (hereinafter called the said eight benefices '):

"Whereas the patronage of the said benefice of Camberwell and of the said eight benefices is vested in the Bishop of Southwark for the time being:

"And whereas we are of opinion that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the parishes of the said eight benefices by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Camberwell which is hereinafter recommended and proposed, and that the said benefice of Camberwell will thereafter still be sufficiently endowed:

"And whereas the said benefice of Camberwell is now vacant, the late Incumbent thereof being the Reverend Humphreys Peare Lindsay in whose favour an annual pension of £750 is payable out of the income of the benefice:

'Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of Canterbury, as Archbishop of the Province within which all the said benefices are situate and with the consent of Richard, Bishop of Southwark, as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of all the said benefices (in testimony whereof they have executed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same (first) as from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any such Order a sum of £6,666 13s. 4d. £3 per cent. Redemption Stock, shall cease to form part of the endowments of the said Benefice of Camberwell and shall be held by us in trust for and as part of the endowments of the said Benefice of Saint Saviour with Saint Peter, Southwark, and (secondly) as from the day of the date on which the aforesaid annual pension of £750 shall cease to be payable to the said Humphreys Peare Lindsay all those separate sums of Stock which are specified in Column II of the Schedule to this Scheme appended shall be transferred by us from the said Benefice of Camberwell to the Benefices mentioned in Column I of the said Schedule
