DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACTS, 1894 to 1937.

Notice is hereby given in pursuance of Section 49 (3) of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, that the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries has made the following Order:—

Order No. 6192.

(Dated 1st June, 1942.)

Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) (Temporary Modification of Restrictions) Order of 1942.

Permits the movement of animals, under licence, out of the Infected Area around Wanborough, Wilts., direct to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse in the Infected Area around Gloucester.

To all to whom these presents shall come, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England send greeting:

Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the power or authority in that behalf contained in the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, and in the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling us in the same behalf, do by this Instrument under our Common Seal, with the consent (testified as herein-after mentioned) of the said Leslie, Bishop of Sheffield, and of the said Robert Cecil Battie-Wrightson and the said Herbert Chaplin Raison hereby declare that the said new Church of Saint Peter situate within the said Parish of Warmsworth and duly consecrated as aforesaid, shall be and the same is hereby substituted for the said old parish church of the same parish, and that such new church shall henceforth be the parish church of the said Parish of Warmsworth in lieu of the said old parish church of the same parish as fully in all respects as if the said new Church of Saint Peter so hereby substituted had been originally the parish church of the same parish; and we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in further pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities aforesaid, and with such consents as aforesaid (testified as herein-after mentioned), do hereby transfer all the endowments, emoluments, and rights of or belonging to the said old parish church of the said Parish of Warmsworth or of or belonging to the Rector or Incumbent thereof, to the said new Church of Saint Peter (now being by virtue of these presents the parish church of the said Parish of Warmsworth) and to the Rector or Incumbent thereof and his successors for ever.

In witness whereof to these presents we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have set our Common seal, and the said Leslie, Bishop of Sheffield, has set his hand and affixed his Episcopal

Seal, and the said Robert Cecil Battie-Wrightson and the said Herbert Chaplin Raison have respectively set their hands and affixed their seals, this fourth day of June in the year One thousand nine hundred and forty-two.

Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the power or authority in that behalf contained in the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 70, and in the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 55, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling us in the same behalf, do by this Instrument under our Common Seal, with the consents of the said Edward, Bishop of Lichfield, and of the said Winston Leonard Spencer Churchill and the said Charles Kirkup Lane (testified by their respectively executing this Instrument) hereby declare that the said new Church of Saint Paul situate within the said Parish of Edensor and duly consecrated as aforesaid, shall be and the same is hereby substituted for the said old parish church of the same parish, and that such new church shall henceforth be the parish church of the said Parish of Edensor in lieu of the said old parish church of the same parish as fully in all respects as if the said new Church of Saint Paul so hereby substituted, had been originally the parish church of the same parish; and we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in further pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities aforesaid, and with the same consents, do hereby transfer all the endowments, emoluments, and rights of or belonging to the said old parish church of the said Parish of Edensor or of or belonging to the Vicar or incumbent thereof, to the said new Church of Saint Paul (now being by virtue of these presents the parish church of the said Parish of Edensor) and to the Vicar or incumbent thereof and his successors for ever.
