Frankfort, Dec. 30. Our Letters from *Affice* say, the demolishing of the Bridge of *Brisac* over the *Rhine* is in such forwardness, that 'tis hoped this Work will in few days be quite finished, and the French Forces in Garrison there have already begun to send away their Effects, in order to evacuate that Place. The French continue to work with great application on the Fortifications of *New-Brisac*, which they design to make very strong. The Elector *Palatine's* Forces have discontinued the repairing of *Heydelberg* and *Manheim* till next Spring.

Hamburg, Jan. 3. N.S. The Danish Forces that were quartered in our Neighbourhood being marched towards *Rensbergh*, the Senate have given Orders for discharging the Companies of Soldiers that were lately raised to reinforce our Garrison. The Senate have likewise writ to the King of *Denmark*, to thank him for the late Assurances he has given them of his Friendship. Monsieur *Lenthe*, Envoy from the King of *Denmark* upon the occasion of the Birth of the young Prince of *Denmark*, has given a splendid Entertainment to the Foreign Ministers, the Magistrates of this City, and other Persons of Quality here. The Conferences for adjusting the Affair of *Holstein* are continued, and the Mediators do very much press the Danish Ministers to declare their acceptance or refusal of the Articles proposed by them by way of Preliminaries in order to begin a Negotiation, which the said Ministers have not yet done in express Terms. In the mean time the Danish Troops seem to prepare to attack the Forts newly built by order of the Duke of *Holstein*, whose Forces have orders to defend them till the last extremity; and it's said, that besides the Swedish Regiments that are already in the Dutchy of *Holstein*, a Body of the Troops of that Crown are shortly expected there from the Dutchy of *Bremen*, and that the Duke of *Celle* will also send some Troops to the Duke of *Holstein's* Assistance; and the Count of *Guldenstern*, Governor of *Staden*, is daily expected at *Tonningen*, being to have the chief Command of all the Forces in his Highness's Service.

Plimouth, Dec. 31 The *Marseilles Merchant*, John Campayn Master, arrived here the 27th Instant from *Alicant*. Yesterday His Majesty's Store-Ship the *Catherine* sailed from hence to *Spithead*. The *Mary of London*, Richard Perry Commander, came in yesterday from *Sevill*.

Bristol, Jan. 1. On the 28th past came in here the *Redemption* Brigantine of this Port from *Cadiz*, and the *Mary Ketch* from *Dublin*. The *Sufanna* of this Place, John Vicary Commander, arrived here the 29th, being come in 9 weeks from *Jamaica*; And yesterday the *Mary of London*, James Abjeet Master, bound home from *Antegoa*, put into this Road by stress of weather, and will sail again as soon as the Wind is fair.

Deal, Jan. 2. The *Peter*, Captain French Commander, arrived in the *Downes* on the 30th past from *Barbadoes*, and this morning came

into the *Downes* the *Samuel*, Captain Lee from *Malaga*. About 20 Sail of Merchant Ships bound to the *East-Indies*, the *West-Indies*, the *Streights*, and other Parts, lie at present in the *Downes*, and will sail on their respective Voyages with the first fair Wind.
