Genova, Jan. 16. N. S.

THE Duke de Sesto, Son to the late Marquis de los Balbases, having received the News of his Father's Death, intends to repair forthwith to Madrid. Signior Philip Cattaneo is chosen by the Senate to be their Resident at the Court of Rome, and left this Place two days ago on his Journey thither. Our last Advices from Milan say, the Swiss Troops in the Service of that State are marching to Arona, in order to return home as soon as their Arrears, which amount to 15000 Crowns, are paid them, pursuant to the Orders that are lately come from the Court of Spain.

Rome, Jan. 17. The Pope is so well recovered, that he has this week given Audience to Cardinal Spada, Cardinal Sacripante, and the other Cardinals of the Palace, and has signed several Dispatches, and disposed of the vacant Offices; The Foreign Ministers residing here have thereupon desired to be likewise admitted to Audience, but were answered. That the Pope is not yet in a condition to see them. He has given the Bishoprick of Ancona to Cardinal Aspi, and that of Visso to Cardinal Santta Croce, who is now returning thither from Vienna, and there being no other Bishopricks vacant, he has ordered 5000 Crowns to be given to each of the three other new Cardinals, viz. Radolavich, Sperelli, and Gabrieli, towards enabling them to maintain their Dignity.

Count Lamberg, who is to reside at this Court as the Emperor's Ambassador in the room of Count Marinitz, arrived here the 13th Instant; he has since visited Cardinal Spada, the Pope's Chief Minister, and delivered to him a Copy of his Credentials, and his Excellency is now busied in paying the usual Visits to the other Cardinals. Count Marinitz prepares to return home in few days. The Prince of Monaco intends shortly to make his Publick Entry. The Duke d'Uceda, Ambassador from Spain, went this day to Fmudi, to confer with the Vice-Roy of Naples.

Venice, Jan. 23. The Diversions of the Carnival were begun here the 20th Instant by a very fine Consort of Musick, at which were present the Duke of Mantua, the Princes Alexander and Constantine Sobiesky, Sons to the late King of Poland, (who arrived here some days ago from Warsaw,) and divers other Persons of Quality. The Convoy with Stores and Provisions for the Levant is ready to sail with the first fair Wind. The Count de Berka, Envoy from the Emperor to this Republick, is daily expected from Vienna, his Equipage being already arrived.

Vienna, Jan. 27. The Emperor has lately made the Counts Schlick, Palfi, and Furstenberg, Lieutenant Generals; and the Counts Marfagly, Sreni,

Raventlan, and Glockelsberg, Major Generals. The Grand Signior's Ambassador arrived two days ago at Schwehet; where he will continue till every thing is ready for his Publick Entry here. Count Straszman's departure for Copenhagen, where he is appointed to reside as Envoy from the Emperor, is put off by reason of the new Regulations made by that Court, about the manner of the Reception of the Ministers sent thither with the Character of Envoys. Prince Eugene of Savoy is made one of the Emperor's Council, as is likewise Count Zedlinsky, the Emperor's late Envoy at Warsaw; who upon this account is excused from returning to Poland. The Bishop of Gujavia, who has resided here some time as Envoy from the Crown of Poland, will take his Audience of Leave in a day or two, and intends to go to Rome before he returns home. The Cardinal Santa Croce, the Pope's late Nuncio at this Court, began his Journey to Rome two days ago. They write from Peter Waradin, that a Turkish Officer was come thither to Treat of the Exchange of the Prisoners taken during the War, and that the Turkish Prisoners that were in that City had been accordingly exchanged for a like number of Germans.

Francfort, Febr. 3. The Count of Boinebourg is gone from hence to Mentz, to be present at the Election of a Provost of that Cathedral, which Place is lately become Vacant. The Count of Lewenstein is appointed by the Emperor to succeed him as his Envoy in this City, and is already arrived at Bamberg; He has a Commission from the Emperor to assist on his part at the Treaty for settling the Dutchess of Orleans Pretensions on the Palatinate, and 'tis believed, this Negotiation which has been Interrupted for some time, will be renewed upon his Arrival. Baron Mullern, Envoy from the King of Sweden, went last week from this place to the Dutchy of Deux Ponts, from whence he is to proceed to Nanci, to Compliment the Duke and Dutchess of Lorraine in the name of the King his Master upon the Birth of the Prince their Son. The Bishop of Augsburgh passed through this place two days since going to Dusseldorp.

Cologne, Febr. 5. The Elector of Cologne is gone to Brussels. The States of this Archbishoprick met yesterday in this City. The Baron Saffgh, Envoy from the Elector of Triers, went from hence some days ago to Dusseldorp, and after a short stay in that place, is to proceed with the same Character to the Court of the Elector of Hamou. They write from Dusseldorp, that 'twas discoursed there that the Elector Palatine has thoughts of taking a Journey in the Spring to Vienna, and from thence to Florence and Rome. The Bishop of Augsburgh is arrived at Dusseldorp from Augsburgh. The Baron Potzelaer, Envoy from the Elector of Brandenburg, and his Plenipotentiary at the Imperial Diet, is still at the Court of the Elector Palatine.

Palatine, and has presented two Memorials in Favour of the Protestants in the Palatinate.

Hamburg, Febr. 5. Admiral Paulsen is lately come hither from *Copenhagen*, with Orders, as is said, to Lift Seamen to serve in the Squadron of Men of War which the King of *Denmark* has ordered to be fitted out against the Spring. They write from *Denmark*, that the new Levies for increasing their Land Forces are continued with great Diligence. And 'tis said, the King of *Denmark* continues his Resolution of taking 8000 Men of the King of *Poland's* *Saxon* Forces into his Service. and upon this account has sent a considerable Sum of Money to *Dresden*. The Advices from *Sweden* say, several Regiments of the Forces in that Kingdom are marching towards the Province of *Schonen*, where they are to lie in a readiness to be Transported to *Pomeran*, or to the Dutchy of *Holslein*, as there shall be occasion. The four *Swedish* Regiments which came lately to *Wisnar*, do still continue there, except one which is marched back to *Pomeran*; And 'tis reported, they are shortly to be joined by a Body of Horse, but that they are not to enter into the Dutchy of *Holslein*, unless the *Danes* come to open Hostilities against the Duke of *Holslein*.

Brussels, Febr. 5. The Elektor of *Cologne* came hither yesterday from *Bon* to pass the Carnival at this Court. The Count of *Wallenstein*, Envoy from the Emperor to the King of *Portugal*, arrived here last week in his way to *Lisbon*. The Council of this City have had some Meetings to consider of the Means to raise their part of the Subsidy of 1200000 Crowns lately granted to the King of *Spain* by the States of *Brabant*. They write from *Luxemburgh*, that the States of that Dutchy are assembled to consider of the Supplies demanded of them by the Court of *Spain*.

Hague, Febr. 9. The *Muscovite* Ambassador had Audience of the States-General on the 4th Instant with the usual Ceremonies; He has been visited by the Baron of *Lillieroot*, and by several other Publick Ministers. The Envoy of *Morocco*, who has been some time at *Amsterdam*, returned hither last week; he has since been in Conference with some Deputies of the States, and intends shortly to take his Audience of Leave, and to return home. The several Colledges of the Admiralty have sent Deputies hither to confer with those of the States. The Heer *Van Haren* is gone from hence to *Lewarden*, to assist at the Assembly of the States of *East-Friseland*, who are shortly to meet there.

Paris, Febr. 10. N. S. The *French* Court returned last Saturday from *Marly* to *Versailles*, where there have been several Balls and Opera's on account of the Carnival. The Dutchess of *Nemours* continues at her House at *Colombieres*; 'Tis reported, she has lately made a Will, by which she leaves all her Estate to the Chevalier de *Soissons*, and appoints the Prince of *Carignan* to be her Executor. Monsieur *Pointis* is preparing to go in a day or two to *Brest*, to command the *French* Squadron that are to cruize this Spring against the *Moors* of *Sallee*.

Plymouth, Jan. 30. This day came in here from the *Downes* the *Panther*, Robert *Robinson* Commander, the *Colchester*, Capt. *Benjamin Rouse*, and the *Somersetts*, Capt. *John Douglas*, all three bound to the *East-Indies*. The *Amity*, John *Miller* Commander, for *Guinea*; the *Charles*, John *Strowde* Master, for the *Streights*; and several other out-

ward-bound Merchant Ships, making in all about 14 Sail, and they will proceed on their several Voyages with the first fair Wind.

Cowes, Jan. 31. The *Providence* of *London*, John *Cooler* Master, bound to *New-York*; the *Provident*, *Richard Morpew* Master, for *Bilboa*; and the *Prudence* of *London*, John *Daniel* Master, and the *Friendship*, John *Rose* Master, both bound to the *Isle of May*, put in here yesterday from the *Downes*.
