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Cadiz, Jan. 18. N. S.

ON the 11th Instant came into this Port the Ship commanded by Don Martin de Zavala from the West-Indies, to the great Satisfaction of our Merchants, who feared this Ship was lost; The other Ships that came in her Company from the Havana arriving here above five weeks ago; Her Cargo is valued at above 600000 Pieces of Eight, of which 200000 were fished out of a Spanish Ship, that foundered in sight of the Havana about two years ago. The Straford Frigate, Capt. Thompson Commander, and several other English Ships, are lately arrived here from the Northward, as also the Convoy from Ostend, and another from Hamburg. The Chamber Frigate, Capt. Thomas South Commander, sailed from hence this week for the East-Indies, and the King William, Capt. John Braddill Commander, will sail in 4 or 5 days. The English Men of War, commanded by Capt. Munden, are gone out to cruize against the Ships of Saltee, except the Lyme, commanded by Capt. Trevanion, who will sail to-morrow. The Squadron of French Men of War, commanded by Monsieur Relingue, continues on this Coast, but 'tis said they will shortly be relieved by another Squadron from France. The Almirante of Castile is still at St. Lucar.

Coruna, Febr. 8. The Spanish Alliance Packet-boat arrived here yesterday from Falmouth; The Thomas of Falmouth, Felix Cradock Master, is come into this Port from Spain, and will sail for England with the first fair Wind. The last Letters from Madrid say, the King of Spain continued in very good health, and frequently diverted himself with hunting. The weather is at present colder here then is usual in these Parts. The Almirante's return to Court is still very much discoursed of. They write from Lisbon of the 30th past, that 10 Portuguese Merchant Ships were lately sailed from thence for Brazil, having on board a Regiment of Foot that are sent to reinforce the Portuguese Troops in those Parts; And that five other Merchant Ships would follow in few days.

Venice, Jan. 29. The Duke of Mantua has been very ill here, but is now pretty well recovered. The Princes Alexander and Constantine Sobiesky, who came hither lately from Poland, intend to continue in this City during the Carnival, and afterwards will go to Rome to make a Visit to the Queen-Dowager their Mother. The young Princes Sapietka and Lubomirsky are also come hither from Poland. An Order has been published by our Magistrates, forbidding all Persons whatsoever upon very severe Penalties to wear any Arms during the Carnival. About 120 Galley-Slaves were brought hither this week from Parma, and other Parts, and are ordered to be sent to the Morca by the Convoy which now lies ready to sail. Our last Letters from Dalmatia give an Account, that Signior Grimani, the Com-

missioner from this Republick for settling the Limits, was still at Cast-Inovo, the weather not permitting at present the renewing his Conferences with the Turkish Commissioner, which are usually held in the open Field; besides, the Turkish Commissioner expects further Orders from the Port concerning the Dispute about some Villages in the Dependency of Castelnovo; Signior Sinobaldy, who was accused of having delivered the Castle of Zuerograd, of which he was Governor, to the Germans, (when they came before it the last Summer.) without making any Resistance, has been tried for the same by a Council of War, and having justified his Proceedings, is accordingly discharged. The Oliver, Capt. Richard Lacy Commander, arrived here this week from Yarmouth.

Warsaw, Jan. 24. The Starost Schemberg arrived here yesterday from Dresden, with the King of Poland's Ratifications of the Treaty lately concluded for accommodating the Affair of Elbing, and the same will be exchanged in a day or two with those of the Elector of Brandenburg. Monsieur Werner, Resident from his Electoral Highness, is gone from hence to Elbing, to take care that all Things be ready for the restoring of that City to the Poles on the first of the next Month, as is stipulated by the Treaty; And the Commissioners, who are to take Possession thereof in the Name of the King and the Republick of Poland, are gone to Mariembourg, and have carried with them the Jewels of the Crown, which are to be delivered to the Brandenburg Commissioners the day before the Evacuation, and are to remain in the Elector's hands till the Sum of Money agreed on in lieu of his Pretensions on the City of Elbing, is paid. The King of Poland is expected here in 5 or 6 weeks, and Preparations are making for the Meeting of the General Diet soon after his return, though the Courier who was lately sent to Dresden by the Cardinal Primate with the Universalia or Circular Letters is not yet come back. The Commissioners that met at Radom to examine the Accounts of the Army having settled the same, are separated, and the Crown-General is shortly expected here with the said Accounts, which are to be laid before the General Diet at the next Meeting. The Palatine of Mariembourg has sent to the Crown-Treasurer a Protest, signed by himself and some other Senators, against the delivering of the Jewels of the Crown as a Pawn to the Elector of Brandenburg, because they were not present at the Senate when this Resolution was taken, but the Cardinal Primate does not think fit to take notice of it.

Dantzick, Jan. 30. The Brandenburgers have already sent to Koningsberg all the Cannon and Ammunition they brought into the City of Elbing, and they are demolishing the new Works they added to the Fortifications of that Place, that every thing may be ready for their evacuating it on the First of the next Month.
