Wheres We have been Informed, That many Pepilh Priests and Jesuits have presumed to come into this Priest and Jesuits have presumed to come that this kingdom, and to continue therein contrary to the Laws and significant of the Realm; We have therefore thought fit to command all popish Priests and Jesuits, to depart out of, and not to riturn or come into this Our Kingdom under such this Our Rendem under such this Our Reyal Proclamation (Issued by the Advice of Our Privy Council) strictly Charge and Command all jesuits and priest whatsecure, who have taken Orders from the Sut of Rome, or by the Authority is pretended Authority theref, and not being under Restraint by Imprisorment, That they do forthwith dispart out of this Our Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Twent; And that they or any of them, or any other such priests or Figure do not presume to continue, come, or return two Our sad Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, or Imposed Berwick, upon Pain of hoving the Laws and Stabuts of this Our Realm put in Execution against them.
