The Letters from Dalmatia give an Account, that Signior Grimani, Commissioner from this Republick for settling the Limits, was still at Cassova; The Turkish Commissioner was come to Misar, and daily expected the return of a Courier he sent some time ago to Constantinople, for further Directions touching the Differences between the Turks and Russians concerning some Village, in the Dependencies of Cassova; and as soon as this Courier is arrived, the Conferences between them will be renewed. The Viscount Marbach, commanded by Capt. The Honble, arrived here this week from Lodow; and the Swan, Capt. John Carr Commanded, from Denmark.

**Vienna, Feb. 5.** The Turkish Ambassador will have his Publick Audience in a few days. The Prince's Dowry of Naples, Wife of Prince Charles of Saxony, is come hither from Olmutz in Styria, the place of their usual Residence, to make a Visit to the Emperors her Sister, and to avoid all Disputes as to Matters of Ceremony, she intends to be two days curing her stay here. A Courier arrived here this week from Vienna with the Order of the Golden Fleece, a Court Jewellery, the Emperor's Ambassador at the Court of Rome, and Count Winstigk, Deputy for the House of Austria at the Imperial Diet.

**Hambourg, Feb. 6.** The Danish Ministers for accommodating the Affairs of Holstein returned hither six days ago from Rantzburg: They have once visited the Sinec Commissioners sent from the States-General, and the Conferences will be renewed immediately after the arrival of the Swedish and Brandenburg Ministers, who are daily expected. Major General Timp is arrived here from Copenhagen, giving with the Character of the King of Denmark's new Expedition to Poland. Annual Passages continue to this City, and has taken several Gunners and Ships: It is to be King of Denmark's Service, who is ordered to depart forthwith to Copenhagen; Divers Sea-men have offered him their Service, but he has not yet list any. It is concluded, that the Danes intend to form a Camp of about 12000 Men near Olmutz, between this Place and the City, to prevent any Success coming to the Holsteiners from Bremen, while the rest of their Forces are employed in attacking the Duke of Holstein's new Forts: but the opening of the Success about the said Forts, together with the rainy Weather we have had for a long time, renders the execution of this Design impracticable or profuse. The Duke of Wirtemberg has been ill at Rantzburg, but is now pretty well again. Our Letters from Dresden say, the King of Poland intends to return to Warsaw after the Carnival, and that the Count of Casselberg was gone from thence with the Character of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Vienna.

**Hague, Feb. 12.** The Elector of Brandenburg's Residence has yielded to the States General, the Marriage of his Elector's 12th Daughter to the Prince of Hesse, Elector of the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel. An Envoy from the Pope and Government of Tunis is lately arrived here, with Proposals for making a Peace with this State. The Envoy of Morocco will have Audience of the States-General in a Day or two. The Baron of Spindleroff left this place on the 10th Instant, being appointed by the King of Sweden to go as his Envoy Extraordinary to the Courts of Harver and Gall.

**Paris, Feb. 13. N.S.** Meneur Corneille, Attorney-General of the Parliament of Metz, is made President of the Sovereign Council of Aunis. Monsieur Marin, Surveyor General of the King's Buildings, returned hither from Nancy, where he has given the Military Orders for building a very fine Palace for the Duke de Lorraine. The King's Declaration was registered in the Parliament of Paris on the 10th Instant, by which the Execution of a former Declaration, whereby the Goods and Estates of all the New Converts, who being Sick, shall refuse to receive the Holy Sacraments after the Popish manner, or shall refuse on their Death-bed that they are Protestants, shall always be confirmed. The Letters from St. Petersburg to Vienna and Amsterdam, which contain the new Ceremonies, have been taken notice from them, and put into Manuscript. And the Holy New Converts, whose Conversion are great in the Kingdom, are daily threatened with Imprisonment, unless they make them in return.
