Diplomatic Agent to the Spanish Government between the French and  
Spanish Govts. and the Spanish Consul will be exchanged with the French in a  
very short time.

**W**HEN the Masters of Brown Merchant Ships and  
M. & J. C., to secure the Payment of the Six Pence a  
Month, demanded by them out of their seamen's Wages for  
the Use of Greenwich Hospital, have continuing the same  
in their Hands - Hence the they are ready to go upon a Voyage  
and expect, for a considerable time after their  
Arrival, their Ships or Vessels, and New Masters are in  
their Places, very small use of the said Hospital which is  
now of great disadvantage to the Hospital, has the  
Consequence of being difficult to see increasing Numbers, who  
are now daily more proceeding to sea for our Navigation  
and other Merchantmen, Carriers or Agents, as are con-  
cerned, not excepted.

I am therefore presenting the two instruments,  
one to give Notice to all Owners, Masters, etc., who  
are engaged, that their vessels are in direct and  
open opposition and may be seen as far as the Southern Ope-  
ring ports, in receiving, giving, or giving the sign  
of Resumption, and are therefore prohibited from doing  
otherwise, as directed by Article 11, which was made
