The KING has been graciously pleased to approve the following awards in recognition of gallantry displayed in flying operations against the enemy:-----

Distinguished Service Order.

Acting Wing Commander Guy Penrose GIBSON, D.F.C. (39438), No. 106 Squadron. Since being awarded a Bar to the Distinguished Flying Cross, this officer has completed many sor-Flying Cross, this officer has completed many sor-ties, including a daylight raid on Danzig and an attack at Gdynia. In the recent attack on Le Creusot, Wing Commander Gibson bombed and machine-gunned the transformer station nearby from 500 feet. On 22nd October, 1942, he partici-pated in the attack on Genoa and, two days later, he led his squadron in a daylight sortie against Milan. On both occasions, Wing Commander Gibson flew with great distinction. He is a most skilful and courageous leader whose keenness has skilful and courageous leader whose keenness has set a most inspiring example.

Acting Wing Commander Kenneth Phillips SMALES, D.F.C. (39764), No. 44 Squadron. This officer, who has completed a large number

This officer, who has completed a large number of sorties, has displayed outstanding skill and leadership. He has at all times shown the greatest determination to reach and bomb his objective. On the night of 22nd October, 1942, he piloted an aircraft detailed to attack Genoa. Despite engine trouble, which developed on the outward flight, he continued his mission and, dis-playing fine airmanship, reached his objective and bombed it. Engine trouble persisted on the return journey but he flew the aircraft back to base safely. His great courage and fine qualities have set an example worthy of the highest praise. Since being awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross in February this year, Squadron Leader Yule has displayed untiring devotion to duty, fine fighting spirit and excellent leadership which have been an example of the highest order. He has participated in many operational sorties and in the combined operations at Dieppe. He has destroyed several and damaged a number of other enemy aircraft. enemy aircraft.

enemy aircraft. Acting Flight Lieutenant Ernest Alfred DEVERIL, D.F.C., D.F.M. (45546), No. 97 Squadron. Since being awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, this officer has taken part in 30 sorties, including many attacks on targets in the Ruhr area. In the daylight attack on the transformer station near Le Creusot, Flight Lieutenant Deverill bombed his objective from a height of 500 feet. He also participated in the recent raids on Milan and Genoa. This officer has invariably en-deavoured to press home his attacks with great vigour. vigour.

Flying Officer Edward Robert BUTLER, D.F.C. (107923), Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, No. 97 Squadron.

As navigator Flying Officer Butler has taken part in many successful sorties against the most heavily defended areas in Germany, including the heavily detended areas in Germany, including the daylight attack on Augsberg. Recently he par-ticipated in the daylight attacks on Le Creusot and Milan and a night attack on Genoa. His navigational standard has always been exceptional whilst his keenness and courage have materially assisted in the successes achieved by his squadron.

On many occa-sions he has flown low over heavily defended areas of invaluable assistance. On one occasion, although attacked by 3 enemy fighters, he flew over Palermo at 5,000 feet and located a large enemy tanker destined for North Africa.
