- To be an Additional Member of the Civil Division of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire:—
- Pius Muscat Azzopardi, Temporary Local Clerk, Sea Transport Office, Malta.

Mr. Azzopardi's fearless work on board ships during air raids on Malta has done much to inspire the stevedores. During the attacks which followed the arrival of a convoy, his conduct was exemplary and, by remaining at his post on board a ship during a very heavy air attack, he probably helped to save several lives.

Awarded the George Medal:-

Kumode Bhandu Chatterjee, Station Master, Kiul, East Indian Railway, Bihar. The railway station at Kiul was attacked

by a riotous mob several thousands strong. The station buildings were looted and set on fire as were two wagons containing live ammunition. Mr. Chatterjee drove an engine to the burning wagons, then hauled them to a watering column where he extinguished the During the operation there was a fire. probability that the ammunition wagons would blow up. Mr. Chatterjee displayed outstanding gallantry and devotion to duty, with a complete disregard of his personal safety, and as a result of his courageous action, the ammunition was saved.
