

whom the Emperor has appointed to go with the Character of his Envoy to the Court of Sweden, has received his Dispatches, and will begin his Journey in few days. They write from Peterwaradin, that there has happened a Fire at Belgrade, which consumed the greatest part of the Suburbs of that City; And that the Turkish Commander at Belgrade had sent to the Governor of Peterwaradin, to desire him to permit the Turks to buy Timber in the Dependencies of his Government to rebuild the Houses destroyed by this accident, which was granted. Letters from Constantinople of the 12th of March say, the Muscovite Ambassador had made as yet but very little Progress in his Negotiation for prolonging the Truce between the Czar his Master and the Grand Signior, and that it was believed, he would shortly return home, the Grand Signior having referred the further Treaty of this matter to his Ambassador at this Court.

Reimsburg, April 19. The Duke of Württemberg having taken *Friedrichstadt* by storm, demanded of the Town a Contribution of 4000 Dollars, which the Burgers, who he pretended from being plundered, readily consented to give. And Colonel *Mardewelt*, and the Garrison that were in it at the Duke of Hesse, are sent Prisoners to *Reimsburg*. Major-General *Fuchs* marched from *Friedrichstadt* with a Detachment of Danish Forces on the 12th Instant, and on the 16th began to attack the *Schwabstetter* Fort, which was defended by 300 *Hessians* under the Command of Colonel *Medera* till the 16th, when they capitulated, and could obtain no other Conditions, than that the Officers of the Garrison should have liberty to retire whither they pleased, and the Soldiers should be made Prisoners. Major-General *Fuchs* having taken this Fort, marched to attack General *Banner*, who is posted under the Walls of *Tönningen* with a Body of 3000 Men, but found him so strongly intrenched, that he thought fit to give over this Design, and he is now marching to attack the *Rheinischer Schans*. The King of Denmark is shortly expected here from Copenhagen; And in the mean time all things are getting ready for the Bombarding of *Tönningen*.

Hanover, April 17. The Duke of Cella came hither on the 11th Instant from Cella, and having spent some days at this Court, went to *Wexhausen* to confer with the Prince Christian of Hesse, who is lately arrived from Sweden. The Electors of Brandenburg, who has been here some time, returned to Berlin the 14th Instant. The Forces of this Electorate are in readiness to march, and are ordered to take Quarters near the *Elbe*, but it is believed, they will not pass that River before the Danes do actually attack *Tönningen*. And it is reported, that a Treaty is on foot for adjusting the Differences between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Hesse, and the Kings of Sweden and Poland; And that all Parties appear so well inclined thereto, as to give great hopes of a good Success of this Negotiation. The King of Prussia's Envoy to the Elector of Hanover has taken his Audience of Leave, and is returned to *Warsaw*.

Frankfort, April 18. A Courier who passed through this City going to Brussels reported, that Prince Lewis of Baden died on the 12th Instant at *Stuckworth* in Bohemia. The Letters from Cassel say, the Landgrave and Landgravine of Hesse-Cassel intend to go next week to Berlin, to be present at the Marriage of the Prince of Cassel their Son with the Electoral Princess of Brandenburg.

Hamburg, April 20. The Letters from Copenhagen of the 17th Instant give an Account, that the King of Denmark was crowned at *Friedrichsburg* on the 15th Instant with great Solemnity; And that he intends on the 22d to begin his Journey to Hesse. They write from Stockholm of the 9th, that the Swedes are fitting out their Fleet with great diligence, and have laid an Embargo on all Ships in their Ports, except those that are employed in fetching Corn from *Russia*; And that Shipping was preparing for transporting Troops to *Livonia* to relieve *Riga*; The Duke of Hesse is suddenly expected in these Parts from Sweden.

Hague, April 23. The Baron of Lillieroot, Ambassador from the King of Sweden, is frequently in Conference with other Foreign Ministers residing here, and his said Negotiation is carrying on by them for adjusting the Differences in the North. Mr. Stanhope arrived here yesterday from England with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great-Britain to the States-General. General *Cockburn* came hither some days ago, and has been several times in Conference with the Deputies of the States-General, about repairing and augmenting the fortifications of some of their frontier Towns.

Paris, April 21. N. S. Orders are sent to Marseilles for fitting out several Gallies.
