Flying Officer Robert Leonard Cowey (126097), Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, No. 206

Squadron.

This officer, who has completed a large number of hours flying on anti-submarine patrols, is a determined and enterprising captain. In October, 1942, he successfully attacked a U-boat, whilst on patrol over the Atlantic. Recently he sighted on patrol over the Atlantic. Recently he sighted a lifeboat filled with survivors from a torpedoed ship and was instrumental in their subsequent rescue. During a patrol some days later, he pressed home a vigorous attack on a U-boat on the surface. In spite of heavy anti-aircraft fire, Flying Officer Cowey succeeded in straddling the vessel with depth charges. It immediately sank, leaving several of its crew in the water.

Flying Officer John Mercer Hartley (100579), Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, No. 58 Squadron. This officer, who has completed many sorties, has rendered excellent service. Recently he has has rendered excellent service. Recently he has executed 3 attacks on U-boats, pressing home these operations with great skill and vigour. Flying Officer Hartley has invariably displayed high courage and great determination.

Flying Officer John Knox Moffat (114920), Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, No. 120 Squadron.
Whilst engaged on convoy escort duties, Flying Officer Moffat executed a successful attack on a U-boat. In the face of anti-aircraft fire he straddled the vessel with depth charges. It sank almost immediately, leaving some of the crew in the water. Flying Officer Moffatt displayed great skill and determination. skill and determination.

Distinguished Flying Cross.

Pilot Officer Gordon William Young (Can/J.16906), Royal Canadian Air Force, No. 90 Squadron.

Distinguished Flying Medal.

977509 Sergeant Wilfred Howard DAVINE, No. 90 Squadron.

Pilot Officer Young and Sergeant Davine were pilot and rear gunner respectively of an aircraft detailed to attack a target in the Ruhr one night in May, 1943. During the operation the aircraft was attacked by an enemy fighter. Sergeant Davine was wounded in both legs, while his turret was put out of action. Although in great pain he was put out of action. Although in great pain he continued to give his pilot a commentary on the attacker's movements. The fighter made repeated attacks but, displaying great skill, Pilot Officer Young eventually evaded it. His aircraft was badly damaged and became difficult to control. Despite this Pilot Officer Young flew it to base and made a safe landing. By his skill and determination he was undoubtedly responsible for the safe return of the aircraft and its crew. In spite of his severe injuries, Sergeant Davine displayed great fortitude and devotion to duty. great fortitude and devotion to duty.

Conspicuous Gallantry Medal (Flying).

In April, 1943, at night, these airmen were avigator and wireless operator/air gunner respectively of an aircraft the pilot of which was navigator killed by anti-aircraft gunfire. Displaying great killed by anti-aircraft gunfire. Displaying great promptitude and resource Flight Sergeant Kempster pulled back the control column, while other members of the crew were removing the pilot from his seat, and succeeded in regaining height. His immediate action undoubtedly saved the aircraft from crashing. Sergeant Blackwell then took over the controls and flew the aircraft to base where the remaining members of the crew were enabled to leave the aircraft by parachute. All landed safely. During the return flight Sergeant Blackwell displayed exceptional leadership and captaincy which inspired his comrades in Flight ship and captaincy which inspired his comrades in trying circumstances.

Distinguished Flying Medal.

1380768 Flight Sergeant Alwyn Berriman Downing, No. 600 Squadron.

In April, 1943, this airman piloted an aircraft engaged on patrol over an area of the Mediterranean Sea. Shortly before dawn he observed 5 enemy transport aircraft. Flight Sergeant Downing immediately attacked and, within 4

minutes had shot 4 of them down into the sea. He then engaged and destroyed the remaining aircraft. In achieving this spectacular feat, Flight Sergeant Downing used only half of his ammunition. He displayed great skill, courage and determination.

1312369 Sergeant Roy Jack Hubert Hussey,

No. 72 Squadron.

In operations in North Africa, this airman took part in a very large number of sorties, including attacks on airfields and road transport. He has invariably displayed fine leadership and great tenacity and has destroyed at least 4 enemy aircraft in combat.
