In the face of intense anti-aircraft fire, Captain In the face of intense anti-aircraft fire, Captain Taylor flew over the encampment at a height of only 50 feet to complete his reconnaissance. He returned to base and afterwards led a bomber force to the target which was attacked with great success. Captan Taylor displayed outstanding gallantry and devotion to duty and his example was worthy of the highest praise. Flying Officer John Charles Kennedy FABIAN (N.Z.413720), Royal New Zealand Air Force, No. 75 (N.Z.) Squadron.
