Naples, Sept. 10. N. S.

THE Duke de Medina Celi, our Vice-Roy, has received Orders from the Court of Spain, to give out Commissions for the raising of a Regiment of Foot, which is to be sent to Catalonia. Directions are also given, for recruiting the Spanish Forces in this Kingdom, and for repairing the Fortifications of the Frontier Places. The Count de Lemos, General of the Gallies of Naples, has given Orders, that the said Gallies be fitted out to Sea. They have begun here to put in Execution the King of Spain's late Decrees, for the suppressing of all Pensions, and supernumerary Offices; The Letters from Sicily say, the like is doing in that Island; and add, that they are at work at Messina and Palermo in fortifying those Places.

Milan, Sept. 22. The Prince of Vaudemont, our Governor, went from hence yesterday towards Final, to visit the Fortifications of that Place, and other Frontier Towns. The Garrison of Final has lately been reinforced with 300 Soldiers. Count Carlo Archinto, Nephew to Cardinal Archinto, the Count d'Aguilar, and Count Borromeo, whom the King of Spain has lately made Knights of the Golden-Fleece, are to receive the Order on the 29th Instant from the hands of the Prince of Vaudemont with the usual Ceremony.

Venice, Sept. 25. A Convoy is preparing here for the Levant, which will be ready to put to Sea in few days. The Senate have made several Regulations concerning the Militia of the Terra firma, to render them Serviceable upon occasion, and have appointed experienced Officers to Exercise them in the Use of Arms. The Spanish Ambassador is to have his publick Audience of the Senate in few days. The last Advices from Rome say, the Pope continued very weak, and that a Courier, who was dispatched to Florence to have the Advice of a very famous Physician in the Great Duke's Service concerning the Pope's Illness, was returned, and brought an Account, that 'twas his Opinion the Pope's Indisposition proceeds from a Decay of Nature, and that he can receive little Assistance from any Medicines. Divers Cardinals have already given Directions for preparing the Furniture they shall have occasion for in the Conclave. The Cardinals who are looked upon as likely to come in Nomination are, Barberini, Carpegna, Accaioli, Mariscotti, Panciatici, Durazzo, Nerli, Coloredo, Spinola, Bichi, Castagni, Norris, Rodolovich, and Serelli; but of these, Carpegna seems to be liable to the least Objections. The Imperial Ambassador at Rome is removing to the Pa-

lace of Mansfron from that of the Cardinal de Medicis, who is shortly expected there from Florence. The Letters from Dalmatia give an Account, that Signior Grimani, Commissioner from this Republick for setting the Limits, is very much Indisposed.

Corunna, Octob. 2. The Spanish Expedition Pacquet-boat arrived here yesterday in eight days from Falmouth, and is now going to sail again with a fair Wind. The last Letters from Madrid bring an Account, that the King of Spain is in good Health. They write from Cadix of the 13th past, that the French Squadron commanded by the Marquis de Nesmond, consisting of 11 Men of War and 2 Tartanes, sailed from thence 4 days before in order to return to Thoulon, leaving only one French Man of War in the Port of Cadix belonging to Monsieur Pointi's Squadron, who returned to Brest some weeks ago. Two Spanish Ships were fitting out in the said Port, to be sent with Stores and Ammunition to the West-Indies. Capt. Munden, with the English Men of War under his Command, was daily expected there from Algiers.

Dantzick, Sept. 29. The Deputies appointed by this City began their Journey to France three days ago, and they are to wait upon the King of England at the Hague. There is an Account come by Shipping from Neruss, that an Army of 25 or 30000 Muscovites were advanced near to that Town with a design to besiege it, whose unexpected approach had put the Inhabitants under great Consternation; And they had secured their best Effects on board the Merchant Ships then in Port; and the Governor had caused the Suburbs to be burnt, and was putting himself in the best Posture he could for the Defence of the Place, but the Garrison is said to be weak. They write from the King of Poland's Camp before Riga, that he is resolved to keep that Place blocked up during the Winter, and had sent a strong Detachment to attack Kockenhuysen, a Fort on the Duna about 15 miles from Riga. Letters from Lithuania say, the Differences between the Houses of Sapieha and Oginsky are not yet adjusted. They write from Samogitia, that the Standard-Bearer of that Province having prevailed with a great number of Gentlemen to assemble, in order to join the King of Poland's Army; the Castellan dissuaded them from it, which has bred a great Quarrel and Animosity between these two Officers, and may engage the whole Province in such Feuds, as will not easily be appeased.

Vienna, Sept. 25. 'Tis said, the Emperor has resolved to take into his Service 7000 Men of the Elector Palatine's Forces. A Commissioner is come hither from the Cham of Tartary, to treat about the Ransom of the Germans that were taken Prisoners by the Tartars during the late War, to the number of about 5000. Count Aversberg being appointed to go with the Character of Ambassador from the Emperor to the Court of Spain in the room of Count Harrach, who is recalled from that Employment, will begin his Journey in few days. The Turkish Ambassador prepares for his return to Constantinople, and intends to depart from hence in a fortnight or three weeks at farthest; And Count Otting, the Emperor's Amba-

Ambassador, will leave *Constantinople* about the same time, that they may meet and be exchanged on the Frontiers in the usual manner; And the Letters from *Esbeck* say, Count *Guido* of *Staremberg*, and several other German Officers, are come thither to be present at this Ceremony. They continue to work with great Application on the Fortifications of *Arath*, and Directions are given for the putting of good Garrisons in this, and the other Frontier Places in those Parts. There is a Report, that the Grand Signior has given to Count *Teckley* a large Tract of Land near *Widin* on the *Danube*, and that he is coming to live there, which the Imperial Ministers complain of as being contrary to the Treaty of *Carlowitz*. The Imperial and Turkish Commissioners for settling the Limits have renewed their Conferences near *Peterwaradin*, and have already made a good Progress in that Affair. The last Advices from *Constantinople* say, that the *Turks* having prolonged the Truce with the *Muscovites*, and being now in Peace with all their Neighbours, seem resolved to employ their Forces for suppressing the Rebellion in *Asia*, and are sending thither from *Constantinople* a good number of Troops, and a great quantity of Provisions and Ammunition; At the same time 'tis said, the number of the *Arabs* who are in Arms encrease every day, and that they flatter themselves with the hopes of being Protected by the *Sophy* of *Persia*, who 'tis probable may make use of this favourable Juncture to break with the *Turks*.

Dresden, Sept. 28. *Monsieur Bauchling*, Great Chancellor of the Elector of *Saxony*, is returned hither from *Lipsick*, where he has borrowed a considerable Sum of Money for the King of *Poland*. The Prince of *Furstenberg*, Governor of this Country, has been dangerously ill, but is at present perfectly recovered. Major-General *Bankendorf* arrived here yesterday from *Litonia* with a Letter from the King to the Prince of *Furstenberg*, who upon receipt of it ordered the said Major-General to be seized, and committed Prisoner to the Castle of *Semmerstin*, but the reason of it is not yet known. The Diet of *Upper-Lusatia* assembled at *Bentzen*, is broke up, and has granted to the King of *Poland* a Subsidy of 100000 Dollars.

Frankfurt, Octob. 3. *Monsieur Hop*, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General to the Emperor, arrived here the 1st Instant from *Vienna*, and will in a day or two continue his Journey to the *Hague*. *Baron Mullern*, Envoy from the King of *Sweden*, is gone from hence to the Court of the Elector of *Triers*. The Elector and Electors Palatine arrived yesterday at *Augsbourg*, and are expected the 5th Instant at *Heidelberg*.

Cologne, Octob. 5. The Elector of *Cologne* went last Friday from *Bon* to *Briuel*, where he intends to continue about a Fortnight. The *Heer Cockenheim*, who assisted on the part of the Bishop of *Munster* at the late Conferences at *Nuremberg*, passed by here yesterday in his Return to *Munster*. Deputies from the several Princes and Cities of the Circle of *Westphalia* are shortly to meet here, to regulate several Matters relating to the Coin.

Bristol, Octob. 2. The *Carolina* Merchant, *John Skelch* Commander, from *Carolina*; the *Elizabeth* and *Ann*, *Thomas Payne* Commander, from *Lisbon*; and the *Faithful Prize*, *Tho. Cox* Master, from *Virginia*; and three belonging to this Place, arrived here the 29th past. Yesterday came in, the *Increase* of this Port, from *Antigua*; the *Esper*, from *Newfoundland*; and the *James* and *William* of *Dublin*, from *Bilboa*. This day arrived, the *Ezekiel* of *Bristol*, *John Jones* Commander, from *Newfoundland*.

Dunk, Octob. 5. Yesterday and this day came in to the Downs, the *Amity*, Capt. *Saxon* Commander, from *Guinea*; the *Cedring* on, Capt. *Tudway*, from *Antigua*; and the *Jacob*, Capt. *Recey*, from the *Strait*.

They are now in the Downs, about 12 Merchant Ships bound to the *Streights* and other Parts, which will set sail with the first fair Wind.
