Rome, Octob. 2. N. S.

THE Pope's Body was opened the 28th Instant, and being Embalmed, was the same evening carried to St. Peter's Church, where 'twas publicly exposed the next day. The Cardinals have met several times, and have made Choice of the Cardinals *Orsini*, *Altieri*, and *Barberini*, to be Superintendants of the Conclave; *Montignone Borgheze* to be Governor of the City and Conclave, and the Marquis *Lancelotti* to be Cehnel of the People of Rome. The Office of General of the Church being found very chargeable, the late Pope made a Bull to suppress it, so there is none elected at this time. This morning the Ambassadors of *France* and *Venice* had Audience of the College, and recommended to them the Choice of a fit Person to succeed in the Popedom; And the *Imperial* and *Spanish* Ambassadors being yet *incognito*, had private Audiences to the same effect. When the *French* Ambassador had Audience, Cardinal *de Bouillon* was absent, but on all other Occasions he acts as Dean of the College, and the usual Congregations are held at his House. The Cardinal *de Medicis* arrived here the first Instant from *Florence*. The Conclave will be opened the 9th Instant. Signior *Tratti*, who was Chamberlain to the late Pope, and was thought to be one of the Cardinals reserved *in Petto*, is lately dead, and 'tis believed he took this Disappointment so much to Heart, that it did not a little contribute to his Death. A severe Edict is published against Pasquinadoes, which yet is not able to prevent them.

Genova, Octob. 3. The Squadron of *French* Gallies, commanded by the Bailly of *Nauilles*, failed from hence the 28th of the last Month to *Marsilles*. The Republick of *Lucca* has sent an Envoy to this State, to desire their Assistance in case Matters should come to a Rupture between them and the Great Duke of *Tuscany*; upon which the Senate have resolved to send them some Forces, but upon condition, that they shall be employed only in defending the Territories of *Lucca*, and shall not enter into those of the Great Duke. In the mean time we hear, that the Prince of *Parma* and the Governor of *Milan* do offer their Mediation for composing this Difference.

Venice, Octob. 8. The Letters from *Rome* give an Account, that the Cardinals were preparing to go into the Conclave, which would be opened on the 9th. That the Cardinals, who call themselves the Zealots, are like to have a great Influence in the next Election, and that Cardinal *Negroni*, who is in great Credit amongst them; has declared that he will not accept the Papal Dignity, and is very much counted by the several Parties for his Interest.

Vienna, Octob. 6. Orders are given for recruiting the Imperial Forces, and mounting the Chevalry. The *Turkish* Ambassador prepares for his Departure; And the Count of *Boha* is appointed to conduct him to the Frontiers. Cardinal *Lambert* has taken his Leave of the Emperor, and is gone from this Place to his Bishoprick of *Passaw*, intending after a short stay there, to repair to *Rome*: Yesterday Count *Storsberg* went from

hence on his Embassy to *Spain*. The Count *de Gallisch* is appointed to go to *England* with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor. Letters from *Constantinople* of the 19th of the last Month say, Count *Osting*, the Imperial Ambassador, would have his Audience of Leave of the Grand Signior the 22d, and of the Grand Vezier the 23d, and would come away from thence about the middle of this Month.

Stockholm, Octob. 7. Several Expresses are arrived here with an Account, that the Czar has declared War against this Crown, and that an Army of about 30000 *Muscovites* are come before *Nerua*, and that the Czar is marching thither with more Forces, with a Resolution to besiege that Place. Upon this News, Orders are given for preparing Transport Vessels to carry Succours to that Place, which will sail with the first fair Wind with a Reinforcement of about 1800 Men, and Supplies of Provisions and Ammunition. A Transport of 20000 Men will be made to *Livonia* from *Schonen*, and the King of *Sweden* intends to go with them; 'Tis said, they will be ready to sail in few days.

Mittaw, Octob. 3. In Letters from *Livonia* give an Account, that the King of *Poland* had sent a strong Detachment to reinforce the Troops commanded by Duke *Ferdinand* of *Courland*, which are to attack the Fort of *Cockenhusen*, and marched himself with another Body of Troops, each Horseman having a Foot-Soldier behind him, with a design to fall upon the *Swedish* Forces commanded by Count *Willing*, leaving the rest of his Army to continue the Blockade of the Town of *Riga*; But Count *Welling* having timely notice hereof, caused the Bridges of several Rivers which the *Saxons* were to pass to be broke down, and all the Boats to be sunk, and intrenched himself in an advantageous Place, which is covered by the *Riber Pernau*. 'Tis said, that the King intends to take *Wenden*, and some other Places in *Livonia*, and to put his Forces into Winter Quarters in that Province, and so near one another, that they may be drawn together in 24 hours time when ever there shall be occasion. We have Advice, that the Czar of *Muscovy* has published a Declaration of War against the *Swedes*, and that he went from *Moscow* on the 4th of the last Month to his Army, which was marching to join those Forces that have already besieged *Nerua* under the Command of the Duke *de Crox*; And 'tis said, that another Body of his Forces are ordered to join the *Saxons* in *Livonia*.

Copenhagen, Octob. 12. The King of *Denmark* is perfectly recovered of his late Illness, which did not a little add to the Rejoicings at Court yesterday upon the occasion of his Birth-day; entering then into the 30th year of his Age. The Queen is still indisposed. The *Sieur Van Jessen*, who lately resigned his Place of Secretary of State, and was nominated to go with the Character of Ambassador from this Crown to *Vienna*, is discharged from this and all other publick Employments. There is Advice from *Schonen*, that 17 Transport Vessels are sailed from *Stettin* with Soldiers to reinforce the *Swedish* Troops in *Livonia*.

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Hamburg, Oct. 15. Letters from Carlisle say, that upon the News of the Muscovites advancing towards Nerwa, the King of Sweden had increased the Forces to be sent to Lichen, to 20000 Men; which would delay the sailing of this Convoy for a few days, but in the mean time several Vessels would be sent away with Succours to Nerwa. The King of Sweden was still at Carlshoven, and continued his Resolution of going to Livonia.

Loz, Oct. 18. The King hunted the Stag the 9th Instant, and went that night to Dieren, and the 11th His Majesty diverted himself with Shooting, and returned to this Place in the evening. A Prince of the House of Saxe-Gotha is come hither to wait on His Majesty. The King intends to go from hence next Wednesday to S. Jyke; To be the day following at the Hague; And to embark within few days for England.

Hague, Oct. 19. Sir George Rothe is arrived in the Maef with the Squadron of English Men of War and Yachts that are to attend His Majesty in his return to England. The Electors of Brandenburg and the Electors of Hanover are expected here the next week from Brussels, as is likewise the Electoral Prince of Brandenburg, who is now visiting the principal Towns in the Netherlands. The Prince of Hesse, eldest Son to the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, and the Princess his Wife, set out from hence the 14th Instant in order to return to Germany. The Baron of Lillierost, Ambassador from Sweden, has lately presented a Memorial to the States-General, to acquaint them, that the King his Master being attacked by the Czar of Muscovy, finds himself obliged to demand their Assistance, according to what is stipulated by the Treaties of Alliance between them.

Brussels, Oct. 19. On the 12th Instant an Express arrived here from Madrid with Letters of the 30th past, giving an Account, that the King of Spain was in a very dangerous condition, and had received the Extrem Unction; But another Courier arrived this morning from Madrid, by which the Elector of Bavaria received a Letter dated the 5th Instant from the Secretary of the Universal Dispatch, who writes, That he had been that day a long time in the King's Chamber; That His Catholick Majesty was much better; He rested very well the night before, and his Fever had almost left him. The Electoral Prince of Brandenburg came to this Place the 6th Instant from Holland, and parted from hence the 15th in order to return thither. The Elector's his Mother, and the Elector's Dowager of Hanover, arrived here the 13th from Aix-la-Chapelle, and they are entertained by the Elector and Electors of Bavaria with Opera's, Contents of Music, and other Diversions; They intend in two or three days to go from hence to the Hague.

Paris, Oct. 20. N. S. We have an Account from Fontainebleau, where all the Foreign Ministers now are, that the Spanish Ambassador received the 14th an Express, with Letters from Madrid dated the 6th Instant, in the morning, which gave an Account, that the King of Spain was much better; And Count Zinzendorf, the Emperor's Envoy, received Letters by the same Courier to the same effect. But this Court has for several days received no Express from Spain. The Marshal de Boufflers is going to the French Flanders, to assemble the States of that Country. The King has resolved to borrow 18 Millions of Livres upon the Credit of the Town-house of Paris. The Dutchess de Chartres fell ill the 15th Instant, upon which the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, and the Duke of Chartres, came hither that day from Fontainebleau, intending to stay here till she is brought to Bed, and afterwards to return to Fontainebleau, where the Court will continue till the 15th of the next Month. The Duke and Dutchess of Bourbon, and the Prince of Conti, came to this Place the 18th Instant to

see the Prince of Conti, who is ill of the Gout. The Count de Montyon, who is lately made Director-General of the French Cavalry, has obtained a Pension of 16000 Livres a year; and one of 8000 Livres a year is given to Monsieur Magnan d'Amolfin, who succeeds him as Inspector-General.

Notwithstanding frequent Publications have been made, of the Frauds and Abuses of the Collectors of the Duties upon Marriages, &c. and also upon Widows; yet two Collectors of Waltham-Stow in Essex for the year 1699. have been lately found Guilty of Concealing and Detaining to their own Use the Sum of 11 l. 17 s. for which Fraud one of them hath been fined to the King 20 l. and the other 10 l. and compelled to pay the same accordingly.

Also several Persons in Middlesex and Westminster that ought to have tendered and paid according to their Qualities within 20 days after the Duties on Marriages, Births, &c. or as Batchellors and Widowers, became due, but have neglected or refused so to do, have been compelled to pay double the Duty, according to the late Act of Parliament.
