Observing his plight a boat was lowered and, in spite of the very unfavourable weather conditions, was able to effect a rescue.

conditions, was able to effect a rescue.

Able Seaman Thompson and Able Seaman Sutherland were outstanding in all three incidents and displayed exceptional courage and devotion to duty throughout. They manned the boat on each occasion when it was lowered and were responsible for the saving of 25 lives. In addition, during one attack, Able Seaman Thompson fired the

only machine-gun on board until it jammed. He then went away in the boat to the rescue of survivors from other vessels.
