WHEREAS by the British Protected Persons Order, 1934 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order"), provision was made for defining in the control of the principal order. Order, 1934 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order"), provision was made for defining in relation to certain territories within which, by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction, the persons who are regarded as belonging to those territories and are known as British protected persons:

And whereas by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction within the Protectorate of Aden:

And whereas it is expedient that the principal Order should apply to the Protectorate of Aden:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in that behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The principal Order shall have effect in relation to the Protectorate of Aden as it has effect in relation to the Frotectorate of Aden as it has effect in relation to the territories mentioned in the Schedule to that Order; and accordingly the words "Protectorate of Aden" are hereby inserted in the said Schedule before the words "Bechuanaland Protectorate".

2. This Order may be cited as the British Protected.

Persons (Amendment) Order, 1944, and the principal Order and this Order may be cited together as the British Protected Persons Orders, 1934 to 1944.

The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal to Geoffrey Riley in recognition of his gallantry in the following circumstances:—

On the 29th May, 1944, a thunderstorm, followed by a cloudburst, broke over the Digley Valley, near Holmfirth, Yorkshire, and the river Holme became agging torrent 80 feet wide and over 15 feet deep raging torrent 80 feet wide and over 15 feet deep, flooding surrounding land and buildings. Geoffrey Riley, aged 14, saw that an elderly woman, aged 76, had taken refuge on a low wall, surrounded by flood had taken refuge on a low wall, surrounded by flood water which was rising rapidly. He first attempted a rescue by walking to her along the wall, but she would not leave her position. He then entered the flood water, rescued her from the wall, which later collapsed, and, though only a moderate swimmer, struggled to bring her to safety through the flood until he became exhausted. His father Donald Riley went to his assistance, but all three were swept away into the river, Geoffrey Riley being the sole survivor. survivor.
