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From the Imperial Camp at Carpi, July 11. N. S.

THE Imperial Artillery and the last Regiments of Horse that were expected from Germany, being arrived, the 8th Instant Prince Eugene, instead of marching to the Po where he had caused a Bridge to be made, ordered his Forces, which were separated in several Bodies, to draw together, which being done with all possible diligence and secrecy, they began their march in the evening in two Columns; the Left Column commanded by Prince Commerci filed off towards Tresento on the River Tartaro, and Prince Eugene with the Right Column marched about a German mile lower towards Castel-Guilemo. The two Columns arrived on the Banks of the Tartaro about 11 at night, and found there Boats and other things necessary for making each a bridge, which were finished in a very short time. Several Battalions commanded by the Count de Thaur were poited on the Canal Bianco, and were to have passed in on Boats made of Canvas of a new Invention, and part of our Artillery were placed on the Banks of the said Canal to support them; but these Boats proved unserviceable. General Berner was poited with the rest of the Artillery on the other side the Adige, to fire upon the Troops which the Enemy might send there upon the Banks on this side the River, (where there is a great Road) to succour their Forces at Carpi, and the several Detachments they had poited on the Canal Bianco. The 9th, at one in the morning, our two Bridges were finished, and the two Columns passed over the Tartaro, and marched by three several ways. The Right Column took the shortest way on the Banks of the Canal Bianco, and the Left advanced by two other ways much longer and more difficult; This was the reason that Prince Eugene with the Right Column arrived before the Left at Castagnaro, where he ordered the Regiment of Foot of Old Staremberg, supported by the Regiment of Foot of Bigut, and his own Regiment of Dragoons, to attack 300 French who were intrenched in the Church-yard, and several other Detachments of the Enemy who were poited in the fortifications they had made, and they were all beaten from their Poits after defending them for some time. Prince Eugene did very much expose himself in this occasion, and was slightly hurt in the Knee, and had his Horse shot under him; This did not hinder him from mounting again on Horseback, to give Directions to attacking 200 Dragoons who were poited at the Place where the Adige flows into the Canal Bianco; The Enemy made one Discharge, and then retired before our Men came up. Soon after Prince Eugene had Intelligence, that the Enemy were still poited at the head of our Camp at Carpi with 3 Regiments of Dragoons and 2 of Horse; Upon which he made the necessary Dispositions for attacking them, and caused the Regiment of Neuburg to advance towards them by the great Road, where they were attacked by the Dragoons of Als; The Germans received the said Dragoons, and charged them so bravely, that the Chevalier d'Albret was killed, and almost all their Officers were killed, wounded, or taken Prisoners, and the Regiment entirely routed. The other 4 French Regiments suffered also very much, and the Sieur Cambout, Brigadier-General of the French Horse, received several Wounds, of which he died soon after; The Regiment of Neuburg, with a Detachment of 60 Men of the Regiment of Vaudemont, and two other Detachments of the Regiment of Old Staremberg, were the only Troops that fought and defeated these 5 French Regiments. Count Thurheim, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of Neuburg, was wounded in several places, and died on the spot. If the Country had not been too deep and so full of Ditches and Morasses, few of the French had escaped. Prince Eugene caused them to be pursued a good way beyond Carpi, where our foremost Troops poited themselves to stay for the coming up of the Left Column which had not the least part in these Actions. Count Guido of Staremberg was poited at the head of the Foot of the Right Column, and Prince Charles of Vaudemont at the head of the

Horse. All this was ordered by Prince Eugene with great Secrecy, and executed with great Vigour, Conduct, and Diligence. This Action so alarmed the French, that they retired the same night from their Camp at San Pietro di Legnano in great Disorder and Confusion, breaking down the Bridges behind them. Marshal de Catinat was gone the 8th to Ostiglia, not doubting but we would have passed the Po. The Sieur Frberg, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of Taff, being sent out with 200 Horse after the Enemy, charged the last Troop of their Rear, and killed several of their Men, and brought away some Prisoners, and this in sight of their Infantry, without the loss of one Man on our side. We hear, the Enemy are drawing all their Forces together, and intend to poit themselves on the River Mincio; They have abandoned all the Poits they had on the Adige from Legnano to Verona, and we shall soon have a free Communication with the Country of Tirol, which will be a very great Advantage to us. Just now we receive Advice, that the Enemy have abandoned their Camp at Rivole; Count Guttenstein, who was poited with a Detachment of Imperial Forces at Hyla, is marching to join the Imperial Army; and Monsieur de Vaudemont, who is poited with another Body of Imperialists on the other side the Po, has Orders to do the like.

Venice, July 15. Prince Eugene having made a Feint of marching to the Po, and passing that River, and thereby drawn Marshal de Catinat that way, the Germans made a sudden Countermarch on the 8th Instant, and the day following attacked the French Forces at Castagnaro and Carpi, and made themselves Masters of those Poits, which has given them a great Reputation, as well as Advantage; The French have quitted Rivole, and all their other Poits on the Adige; so that the Germans have now a free Communication with the Country of Tirol, from whence they may be supplied with Men, Ammunition, &c. by the River Adige, which is what the French have hitherto endeavoured to hinder; who had poited themselves, so as that they thought they could not fail of Success. The Emperor's Ambassador received an Exprels from Vienna; upon which he had Audience this day of the Senate. Cardinal Petrucci is lately dead, which makes a 7th Vacancy in the College of Cardinals.

From the French Camp at Goito on the River Mincio, July 19. After the Imperialists had made themselves Masters of the Poit of Carpi, their whole Army advanced along the Adige towards Verona. Marshal de Catinat drew his Forces together, which were dispersed in several Places, and marched to the Plains of Verona, where he encamped on the 14th on a large Heath not far from a Place called Villa Franca. The Imperialists advanced the next day in sight of our Army, and possessed themselves of Villa Franca. The 15th, in the evening, the French Army was drawn up in order of Battle, and every body expected we should have fought the next day; But the Germans kept within their Camp, and the 16th, about 4 in the afternoon, the French Army decamped, and marched to the Mincio, and having passed that River, encamped near Goito, which is a very convenient Poit to hinder the Germans from passing the same, and entering into the Country of Brescia, where they would find Plenty of Provisions and Forage. The French have still a Bridge on the Po at Ostiglia, guarded by 7 Battalions of Foot, and 6 Squadrons of Horse.

Vienna, July 13. The Imperial Court continues at the Palace of Brera. An Exprels was dispatched from thence this Week to Prince Eugene of Savoy, with further Instructions. 'Tis said, the Emperor has sent to the Electors of Bavaria and Cologne, to know positively their Resolutions in this Conjunction, that he may take his Measures accordingly. Several Persons who were Apprehended in Hungary on Account of the late Conspiracy, are to be brought this week to New-Bat, to be Examined by the Imperial Commissioners appointed for that purpose.

Frankfort, July 21. The Emperor's Forces which are to be employed on the Rhine, have Orders to draw together, and Prince Louis of Baden is daily

the Officers are to be at their respective Commands by the 15th, on pain of being struck. The Marquis *de Athènes* is gone from *Ajaccio* towards *Flandre*. It is said, there are to be 3 Flying Camps upon the *Rhône*, commanded by the Marquis *d'Uxelles*, Count *Tallard*, and Monsieur *de Lutande* Governor of *Nor-Brisse*.

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From the *Sax Van Grent*, July 25. On Saturday the 23d Instant, early in the morning, the King left *Bruck*, and about a league short of *Bergenopzoom*, found the Garrison of that Place, with some other Regiments of the Neighbourhood, drawn out, to the number of 14 Battalions of Foot, and 16 Squadrons of Horse, all in very good order; His Majesty was above 3 hours on Horseback seeing them file off, and then came into the Town, where he was entertained by Count *Noyelles*, the Governor, and in the evening went on Horseback round the Works which are now finishing. Yesterday His Majesty went to review Colonel *George Hamilton's* Regiment at *Steenberg*, and returned to *Bergenopzoom*. His Majesty embarked about 3 in the afternoon on board one of His Yachts, and landed at the *Polder Van Nijmen*, from whence he came to *Hulft* about 10 at night. This morning His Majesty reviewed the Garrison of *Hulft*, consisting of Colonel *Adam Muller's* Swiss Regiment of two Battalions, with the Prince of *Birkenfeld's* Regiment, and viewed all the Fortifications. In the evening His Majesty came to this Place, and to-morrow intends to go to *Sluice*, and to return on Friday next to the *Hague*.

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Hague, July 26. The Earl of *Macclesfield*, who is appointed by His Majesty to Companion the Princess *Sophia*, and to carry the Garter to the Duke of *Hannover*, is arrived here in his way to that Court, having been to wait upon his Majesty at *Bergencepzoom*. Count *d'Avaux*, Ambassador from *France*, presented this day a Memorial to the States, to acquaint them, That the Conferences here having had so little success, the King his Master has thought fit to recall him. The Emperor's Envoy has received an Express from Prince *Eugene*, with a particular Relation of the Defeat of the *French* at *Carpi*, which he communicated to the States. The Battalion of Guards who were quartered here, are marched to *Doersburg*. The States *Van Niebuigh*, *Duyts*, and *Hop*, are gone by Order of the Council of State to the Provinces of *Gelderland* and *Overijssel*, to view the Magazines on our Frontier Places.

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Paris, July 27. N. S. A Courier arrived here the 25th Instant, with Letters of the 19th from Marshal d'Artur's Camp at Goira upon the River Minio, which give an Account, That the German and French Armies were the 15th Instant in sight of each other in the Plains of Verant; and 'twas expected they would have come to a Battel; but the 16th, early in the morning the French Army retired to Goira, leaving the German entire Masters of the River Aage, and the Lake a Garda. 'Twas believed, Prince Eugene would advance directly to the River Minio, in order to pass that River and so advance towards the Milanese. Here is a talk of raising more Forces; The Foot the several Parishes will be obliged to raise, as formerly; But 'twill be very difficult to find Horses for the Cavalry; The Regiments Horie of the late new Levy not being yet completed 'Tis said, the Duke of Burgundy's Journey to Flanders appointed for the 5th of the next month, and that a
