The s.s. "Copeland," "Fastnet," "Melrose Abbey," "Perth," "Rathlin" and
"Zamalek," sailed regularly with North Atlantic convoys throughout the Battle of the Atlantic, and faced great hazards and hardships with convoys to North Russia. During their employment in these ships the Officers and men were responsible for saving a very large number of survivors from Merchant ships sunk by the enemy.

The s.s. "Empire Unity" was sailing in

convoy in the North Atlantic when she was torpedoed. The first torpedo struck her on the starboard side forward of the engineroom. Fire broke out but it was quickly got under control. The engines had stopped however and the vessel listed heavily to port. A second torpedo struck her under the

and the ship was extensively As the weather was good, the damaged. crew stood by in the boats. Early the following morning the Chief Engineer Officer, together with a volunteer party reboarded the "Empire Unity" and carried out an inspection of the engine-room.

Temporary repairs were executed and, in spite of the rapidly deteriorating weather, the ship was brought safely into port.

The Chief and Second Engineer Officers displayed great courage and initiative and succeeded in getting the engines into working

order and the ship under way.

Apprentice Campbell showed initiative and skill in transferring ballast to correct the ship's list as soon as he returned on board. He also assisted in steering her safely to anchorage.

The s.s. "Riverton" was sailing in con-

voy from Antwerp to Swansea when she was torpedoed. The ship was badly damaged, two of the holds and the engine-room being Abandonment flooded. completely ordered but the Master and a volunteer party remained on board until the vessel was towed

to safety in Swansea Bay.

Captain Morris displayed outstanding courage and great devotion to duty in bring-

ing his badly damaged ship into port.

The Chief Engineer Officer, the Second Engineer Officer and Apprentice Bell remained on board with the Master throughout the hazardous passage which resulted in the saving of the ship. They all acted with great courage and devotion to duty.

The s.s. "Mandasor" was sailing indefound that she was being shadowed by a

German raider. During the hours of darkness the vessel put on all possible speed in an endeavour to escape but early next morning she was spotted and attacked by an aero-plane from the raider. Its fire carried away the main wireless aerial as well as the emergency aerial. The raider appeared on the horizon and a running chase ensued, whilst the enemy aircraft continued its attack. Fire from the "Mandasor" drove off the aeroplane and so badly damaged it that it sank before it could be recovered by the raider.

The enemy continued the chase and closed steadily. A shell hit the vessel and set fire to the hold, while a second salvo registered hits on the bridge. The attack continued but the Master did not abandon ship until the vessel was burning furiously. Whilst abandonment was taking place, the raider continued to fire causing further casualties. The "Mandasor" was seen to sink while the survivors were being taken aboard the raider. They were later landed at Bordeaux and taken to a prisoner of war camp in Germany.

The master displayed great courage and determination in the face of heavy odds. He did not abandon his ship until she was completely crippled and sinking, thereby depriving the raider of stores and provisions which were badly needed by the Germans.

Quartermaster Steele acted with outstanding courage during the action and, after being knocked into the sea by gunfire, he refused to be picked up from the shark-infested waters until a badly wounded shipmate had been rescued.

Ali Ahmed x Jalal Ahmed, by his example, inspired the Indian engine-room crew to remain at their posts and to get the best possible speed out of the ship when she was being chased by the enemy.

Abdulla x Ghalam Hossein acted with courage and coolness throughout. Indian deck-hands aloft to rig a fresh emergency aerial in spite of the machine-gun fire from the enemy aircraft. His brave leadership under shell fire inspired the Indian deck hands to give the Master their fullest support throughout the action.

To be an Additional Member of the Civil Division of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire:—

Miss Odette Sansom, First Aid Nursing Yeomanry.

For services in France during the enemy occupation.

Awarded the British Empire Medal (Civil Division):—

Albert Brown, Farm Labourer, Northampton. Harry Richardson, Farm Labourer, Hardingstone, Northampton.

An aircraft, with a crew of seven on board, crashed in a field. The violence of the impact broke off the rear portion of the fuselage and the remainder of the aircraft disintegrated and burst into flames. Brown immediately rushed to the tail of the aircraft and, single-handed, extricated the rear-gunner. Richardson, then joined Brown and together they entered the burning wreckage and rescued the badly injured mid-upper gunner whom they removed to safety. They returned to the

blazing aircraft and, with help, searched and found the bodies of the remainder of the crew.

Brown and Richardson showed courage and determination without thought for their own safety.

Morven Ritchie Taylor, Junior Porter (Dyce), London and North Eastern Railway Company.

An aircraft crashed into a goods train. Six wagons were derailed and three of these were overturned. The nose of the aircraft was jammed in the wreckage which caught fire within a few seconds. Taylor, a 16-year old porter, saw a member of the crew trying to get out of the burning aircraft. Without the slightest hesitation, and amidst a hail of exploding ammunition, Taylor pulled himself on to a burning wagon and lifted the injured airman out of the wreckage. With help, he then lowered him to the ground and immediately returned to attempt the rescue of a second member of the crew. Taylor was forced back by the intense heat and there was then no hope of a further rescue. Shortly afterwards a petrol tank exploded, scattering burning debris in all directions.

Taylor showed courage and, by his prompt action, saved the life of the airman.
