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Plymouth, June 29.

This day arrived here a Fleet of 26 sail of English Merchant ships from *Gallipolis* and other places within the *Streights*, bound for *London*, *Yarmouth*, and other parts; this morning they left two ships belonging to this Harbour off the *Start*, homewards bound from *Smirna*, with several others bound to the Eastwards.

Vienna, June 23. The 16th instant the Emperour received Letters from his Ambassadour in *Poland*, giving him an account of the Audience he there received from the States, to which he was followed by near 20 thousand persons, and amongst them near 5000 of the Nobles and Persons of Quality, accompanied and introduced by the Archbishop of *Gnesne* and Primate of that Kingdom.

We daily expect a Confirmation from *Rome* of the Emperours late Nomination of his Vice-Chancellor to the Bishoprick of *Vienna*. The Emperour has been pleased to prefer the Count *de Oetingen* to the Vacant Charge of Vice-Chancellor of the Empire.

From *Waradin* they give us an account out of their Letters both from *Constantinople* and *Larissa*, that the Grand Signior being willing to remove all those grievances which in this conjuncture of time might provoke the Christians within his Territories to give him some disturbance, has ordered Commissioners to be sent to all the parts of his Empire, to make enquiry how the Christians have been dealt with by the several Bassa's and other Officers of the respective Provinces and Countreies, empowering them to punish such Officers as shall be convicted of any unjust proceeding against them, the Sultan desiring they should in all places be as civilly dealt with, as the Turks themselves, and has given Order to all his Bassa's who have any Charge or Government upon the Frontiers, to take care that the Peace with the Emperour of *Germany* be not any point violated or infringed.

From *Presbourg* we are advised, that the Hungarians having wholly refused to permit the Turks to buy or take any materials out of their Territories for the reparation of their Fortifications or rebuilding of their ruined City of *Buda*, and for keeping Guards upon the Walls, to hinder the transportation of any such necessities to others, the Turks have in revenge threatened to interrupt all Commerce had been forced in, many Christians as they lay upon with to work at their Fortifications, and have killed several of them, who have since refused that Employment, or been found so neglect it, when employ'd. *Stockholm, June 24.* On Saturday last arrived here the Countess of *Castile* in 12 days from *England*, which is her Excellency the Earl of *Garrick*, was also returned from his Visit made to the Court of *Spain*. His Majesty is lately also expected here, upon whose arrival the said Ambassadour may appear in publick Order to the performance of the Ceremonies of His Majesties Installment in the Order of the Garter.

Venice, June 28. On Sunday in the Evening arrived here a ship from *Candia*, bringing home the Body of the lately deceased Provokedor Extraordinary Cavalier *Catrin Cornaro*. This Vessel departed from *Candia* about the 21th of *May* last, so fitting to us the former News of the Assaults made by the Visier upon the Town; telling us, that the Captain General *Morghini* is within the

Town, by his Courage and Vigilancy encouraging the Garrison to continue their defence; visiting all places with much diligence, and ordering and taking care for all due reparations; changing the Guards as he finds occasion, the better to prevent any under-hand dealing, and private intelligence with the Enemy.

Adding that upon the arrival of the *Brunswick* succors, the said Captain General entertained the Captains and Officers with much respect and honour, disposing of the soldiers into convenient Quarters for their repose, and ordering them to be well furnished with all necessary refreshments after their Voyage; that the soldiers seem with impatience to desire to show their Valour upon the Enemy, by some sally or other attempt, for which the General has promised to give them a fair occasion; and that with this additional force the Garrison is said to consist of about 14 thousand able soldiers; a sufficient number (as 'tis hoped) to entertain the Visier upon any assaults he shall make upon it.

They farther inform us, that the Turks have much triumphed upon the late death of Cavalier *Cornaro*, and that the Visier is resolv'd to make use of this opportunity to encourage his Army to another general assault upon the *Sabionera* and *St. Andre* with the choicest soldiers of his Army, intending if they succeed and prove victorious, to put himself into the Town and to new fortifie it; but if they fail in the attempt, then to withdraw to a greater distance from the Town, and to put the Army into the best posture he is able to attend the landing of the forces designed thither from the Christian Princes for the raising of the Siege; for which end and purpose he has ordered the soldiers to be paid their arrears, and has made choice of *Mustapha Bassa* a person of great Valour and Conduct, with 12 thousand men to be in readiness for this service; with promise of great rewards if they behave themselves like men of Courage in this last attempt.

A considerable Squadron of our ships are cruising about the Isle of *Cyros*, attending the motion of the Captain Bassa, who with several Gallies and Men of War is there in Port, waiting for an opportunity to transport into *Canea* some numbers of *Morandi* quantities of Provisions, formerly sent thither from *Constantinople*, and now lying ready in that Island to be embarked.

Yesterday arrived Letters from *France* advising, that His Most Christian Majesty had ordered 20 of his Men of War to be sent out from *Brest* and other places to be sent into the *Mediterranean*, to cruise about *Tunis* and *Algier*, to prevent those Affairs from the further assistance of the Grand Visier.

From *Zante* we are advised of the safe arrival there of 400 Horse designed for *Candia*, with several Engines and Materials for the War, and that Signior *Vilier* Provokedor General of the *Three Islands* intended to take care for their farther transportation by the first good opportunity. The same Letters inform, that the Grand Signior is at *Tricola*, situate about the midst of *Macedonia*, having only 4000 Turks about him for his Guard; himself passing his time in Hunting; and that some Gallies belonging to *Zante* had taken a Turkish Ship and about 80 Slaves, giving chase to another, which with some difficulty escaped.

Hambourgh, June 29. The Assembly of the Hans-Towns lately held at *Lubec* is separated, having amongst other thing made choice of the Sieur *Brouer* an Advocate of *Lubec* for their Syndic, and the Sieur *Hucken*

now Resident from Bremen at the Hague, to appear there as
Resident from the Hans Towns.

The Coyner of False Monneys in this City lately made
his escape out of prison, but the person who assisted him in
it being Jessad, again discovered him; who is re-com-
mitted, and may be speedily brought to his Tryal.

From Nieubourgh upon the Danube, we are informed,
that the Duke of Nieubourgh was with a Train of 24 per-
sons passing in post by that place, bending his course to-
wards Poland.

From Bavaria they write, that the Duke of that Name
has made a considerable Reformation amongst his Officers,
and has bestowed the Government of that Province upon
the Count de Furstembergh, and the Charge of Marshal
upon Monsieur de Kleist, has employed Monsieur Haslang
to Amberg, conferred the Command of his Guards up-
on the Count de Montfort, and the Charge of President
of his Council of War upon the Count d'Arch Governour
of Ingolstadt.

Genovis June 26. The five Gallies which were sent
out by this State upon a Rumour of severall Gallies and
Bisantines of Algiers being upon the Coast, returned a-
gaine the 22 into harbor: having upon inquiry found it
to be a false alarm, the report arising by reason of some
Fishesmen which were in the night sitting up their nets
near Anibo, upon whom the Fort not knowing them dis-
charged some Guns, leaving a misapprehension in the neigh-
bourhood of the approach of the Turks.

Yesterday arrived here the Tunis Merchant from the Ri-
ver, and went off again immediately for Leghorne, in hopes
to meet with the English Regents in that Port.

To morrow these States Gallies intend to put to sea again
as a Guard to the Coasts, and to attend the motion of the
Turkish Corsai. The States Convoij intends in few dayes
to return for Spain. Signior Hippolito Centurioni's Squa-
dron are employed to take in provisions and to attend the
French Fleet in their Expedition for Candia.

Brussels, July 9. The Constable of Castille continues
as yet at Antwerp, where he was extended by the States of
Haynault, whom he admitted not to their Audience, but
deferred it till his return hither, which is yet uncertain,
the Commons seeming not as all inclinable to a compliance
with his desires for the payment of 50 thousand Livres to-
wards quartering of the Garrison, which is a notion they
are not willing to understand, and to which the depart-
ment of the soldiers (or of such as pretend themselves
so to be) does not at all encourage them, scarcely a
Night passing without severall Robberies and Murders.

'Tis said the Constable has strongly solicited to be recal-
led from his Charge, and that the Queen Regent has given
him leave to return in October next for Spain, before
which time she will send some other Person to take upon
him the Government of these Kingdoms.

On Sunday morning arrived here an Express from our
Commissioners at Lille, who was immediately dispatche
hence to the Constable of Castille at Antwerp, to acquaint
him, that the French were marching with 5 or 6000 Horse,
about 3000 Foot, and 2000 Carts and Waggon, to lade
Coals and Fuel upon the Spanish Territories near
Mons, whose motion caused the Duke d'Archev
Governour of Haynault to leave his House at Enguien,
and repair to the Constable for Orders; who seems
not over forward to give them any disturbance in their
attempt.

Paris, July 10. From Marseilles we are told, that
our Fleet designed for Candia have been attended on their
Voyage by such favourable winds, that 'tis believed in few
dayes we may have News of their appearance before that
Island.

By the same way we have intelligence from Candia, that
the Turks use their utmost diligence in carrying on the
Siege, and have by their Mines and frequent assaults by
degrees possess'd themselves of all the Bastion of St. Andre,
and are now applying themselves with as much eagerness to
make themselves also Masters of the New Port; but that

the besieged being encouraged by the late success of the Lan-
zenbourg Regiment, but more with the hopes of the
great Fleet designed for their assistance, make a vigorous
 defence.

Orders are given for the fitting up of six Gallies more, to
be employed for the defence of the Coasts, and to secure our
Trade in the Mediterranean.

His Majesty has entertained a design of reducing the
Guards of his Body to the number of 400 men onely, which
are to be chosen out of the greater body; intending to re-
duce the rest onely to two Regiments of Horse.

Upon several Complaints made of the insolency of Lac-
queys, His Majesty ordered yesterday his Command to be
made publick, that no Lacquey should for the future be per-
mitted to carry any Staffe or Truncheon in his hand, under
a severe penalty.

A Courtier passing by the way of Thoulouse from Spain
into Italy (according to the late Establishment of the Posts)
informs; that the young King of Spain is fallen lately into
a great distemper with frequent Vomiting, though at the
Court they talk hopefully of his condition; that since the
establishment of Don Juan in the Regency not only of Ar-
ragon and its Dependencies, but also of Sicily and Naples,
he is much complemented by the Grands of Spain, and as
a testimony of his favour with the Queen Regent, has pre-
vailed with her for the conferring the Inquisitionship Gen-
eral of Spain, vacated by the absence and recess of Father
Nithard; upon the Bishop of Malaga, as also for the pre-
ferment of the Duke d'Albe to the Charge of Governour to
His Majesty; she has also admitted several persons of his
nomination into the Council of State, and has consented
that nothing of general concernment shall pass in the Coun-
cil of War without his advice.

Letters from Naples advise us, that the Viceroy having
sent some Companies of Foot into Sardinia to assist the
D. de St. Germain the Viceroy of that Island, in reduc-
ing the tumultuous people of that place to better obedience,
the said Duke; who was till then forced for his security to
retire himself into the Castle of Cagliari; immediately took
the Field, and to prepare his way for success, had proclaim-
ed pardon to all such as should testify their Obedience to
the Crown of Spain, by repairing immediatly to their
houses, which he hoped would in few dayes have an issue
suitable to his expectation and hopes.

On Sunday last the Archbishop of this City went in a so-
lemn Procession, followed by great numbers of people, to
take possession of his spiritual Jurisdiction of the Fan-
bourg St. Germain; the Streets being all the way hung
with Tapistry, for the greater Pomp and Solemnity there-
of: which power he enters on by virtue of an Edict of
Parliament, but not without some opposition from the Reli-
gious of the Abbey.
