**H**is Majesty having granted a Commission under the Great Seal to several Peers for passing the Royal Assent to the Bills which had been agreed to by both Houses of Parliament, a Message was sent to the House of Commons by Mr. Aston, Deputy Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, That the Lords Commissioned by the King desired that the House would presently come up with their Speaker, to be present at the passing thereof; Accordingly the House of Commons went up to the House of Peers and the Royal Assent was given by Commission to

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty, by laying Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry.

An Act for the further Security of His Majesty's Person, and the Succession of the Crown in the Protestant Line, and Extinguishing the Hopes of the Pretended Prince of Wales, and all other Pretenders, and their open and secret Abettors.

An Act for Enabling Lionel Earl of Orbery in the Kingdom of Ireland, by Sale of certain Lands and Tenements, to raise Money for Payment of his Debts, and settle other Lands to the Uses and Purposes in that Act mentioned.

St. James's, March 8. On Wednesday last Our most Gracious Sovereign King William the Third was seized with an Ague Fit and a Fever, which returning upon him the following days, reduced him to a very weak and languishing Condition; All proper Remedies were applied, but not having the wished-for Effect His Majesty expired at Kensington at Eight a Clock this Morning; Whereupon the Lords of the Privy Council assembling together at St. James's, Her present Majesty made a most Gracious Declaration to them, and caused all the Lords and others of the late King's Privy Council, who were present to be Sworn of Her Majesty's Privy Council; And ordered a Proclamation to be published, signifying Her Majesty's Pleasure, That all Persons in Office of Government at the Decease of the late King, shall so continue, till Her Majesty's farther Directions; And in the Afternoon the Queen was Proclaimed before the Gate of Her Palace at St. James's, at Charing-Cross, Temple-Bar, and the Royal-Exchange, with the usual Solemnity.

**W**hereas it has pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy Our late Sovereign Lord King William the Third, of Blessed Memory, by whose Decease, the Imperial Crowns of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, are now Rightfully come to the High and Mighty Princess Anne of Denmark; We therefore, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of this Realm, being here assisted with those of His late Majesty's Privy Council, with Numbers of other Principal Gentlemen of Quality, with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of London, do now hereby with our full Voice, and Consent of Tongue and Heart Publish and Proclaim, That the High and Mighty Princess ANNE, by the Death of our late Sovereign, of happy Mem-

ory, become Our only Lawful and Rightful Liege Lady Anne, by the Grace of God, Queen of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. To whom we do acknowledge all Faith, and Constant Obedience, with all hearty and humble Affection; Beseeching God, by whom Kings and Queens do Reign, to Bless the Royal Queen Anne with long and happy Years to Reign over us.

## A PROCLAMATION,

Signifying Her Majesty's Pleasure, That all Persons being in Office of Authority or Government at the Decease of the late King, shall so continue, till Her Majesty's further Directions.

ANNE R.

**W**hereas it has pleased Almighty God lately to call unto His Infinite Mercy the Most High and Mighty Prince William the Third of Blessed Memory; And whereas by an Act of Parliament made in the Seventh Year of the Reign of the said late King, it is Enacted, That no Commission, either Civil or Military, should Cease, Determine, or be Void, by reason of the Death or Demise of His said late Majesty, or of any of His Heirs or Successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm, but that every such Commission should be Continued, and remain in full Force and Virtue for the Space of Six Months next after any such Death or Demise, unless in the mean time Superceded, Determined, or made Void, by the next and immediate Successor; to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm, according to the Act of Settlement therein mentioned, is Limited, and Appointed to go, Remain and Descend; The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, in her Princely Wisdom, and Care of the State, is Pleas'd, and doth hereby Signify and Declare, That all Commissions, both Civil and Military, granted by His said late Majesty, and in Force at His Death, shall be,

continue, and remain in full Force and Virtue. And that all Persons that at the time of the Decease of the said late King were duly and Lawfully Possessed of, or Invested in any Office or Place of Authority or Government, either Civil or Military, within this Realm of England, or in the Realm of Ireland, or in any other Her Majesty's Dominions, by Virtue of any Commission or Commissions, Letters Patents, or other Appointment of the said late King, shall be and continue in the said Places and Offices, until Her Majesty's Pleasure be further Declared and Known. And in the mean while, for the Preservation of the Peace, and necessary Proceedings in Matters of Justice, and for the Safety and Service of the State, Her Majesty doth hereby Will and Command, That all the said Persons in Office, as aforesaid, do not fail, every one severally, according to his Place, Office, or Charge, to proceed in the Performance and Execution of all Duties thereunto belonging, as formerly appertained unto them, and every of them respectively, while His said late Majesty was living. And further, Her Majesty doth hereby Will and Command all and singular Her Subjects, of what Estate, Dignity, or Degree they or any of them be, to be Aiding, Helping, and Assisting, and at the Commandment of the said Officers and Ministers, in the Performance and Execution of their respective Offices and Places, as they, and every of them tender Her Majesty's utmost Displeasure, and will answer the Contrary at their Perils. And Her Majesty's further Will and Pleasure, and Express Commandment is, That all Orders or Directions made or given by the Lords of the Privy Council of the said late King in his Life-time, shall be Obeyed and Performed by all and every Person and Persons as fully and amply as they might and ought to have been in the Life of the said late King.

Given at Our Court at St. James's the Eighth Day of March, 1701. in the First Year of Our Reign.

God Save the Queen

Her Majesty's Gracious Declaration at Her First Sitting in the Privy Council at St. James's, the Eighth of March, 1701.

My Lords,

I Am extremely Sensible of the General Misfortune of these Kingdoms, in the unspeakable Loss of the King, and of the great Weight and Burthen it brings in particular upon My Self, which nothing could Encourage me to undergo, but the great Concern I have for the Preservation of Our Religion, the Laws and Liberties of My Country; all these being as Dear to Me as they can be to any Person whatsoever. You may depend upon it, That no Pains nor Diligence shall ever be wanting on My Part to Preserve and Support them, to Maintain the Succession in the Protestant Line, and the Government in Church and State, as it is by Law Established.

I think it proper upon this Occasion of My first Speaking to you, to declare My Own Opinion of the Importance of Carrying on all the Preparations we are making to Oppose the great Power of France, and I shall lose no Time in giving Our Allies all Assurances, That nothing shall be wanting on My Part to pursue the True Interest of England, together with theirs for the Support of the Common Cause.

In order to these Ends, I shall always be ready to ask the Advice of My Council, and of both Houses in Parliament, and desirous to Countenance and Employ all those who shall heartily concur and join with Me, in Supporting and Maintaining the present Establishment and Constitution, against all Enemies and Opposers whatsoever.

And the Lords of the Council did humbly pray Her Majesty, That this Her Gracious Declaration might be made Publick; Which her Majesty was pleased to Order accordingly.

A PROCLAMATION,  
For the better Observance of the Act for laying Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry.  
ANNE R.

Whereas in and by an Act made in this present Session of Parliament, Intituled, An Act for laying Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, it is, amongst other Things, Enacted, That all Maltsters, or Makers of Malt for Sale, and Retailers of Malt, Brewers, Distillers, Imkeepers, Victuallers, and Vintners, and all and every other Person and Persons whatsoever, who, in Trust for them, or any of them, or for the Use of them, or any of them, shall be Possessed of, or have, in his, her, or their Custody, or Possession, or in his, her, or their House, Outward Barns, Granaries, or in any other Place or Places whatsoever, upon the Ninth Day of this present Month of March, any Part or Quantity of Malt whatsoever, shall, on or before the Tenth Day of April, One thousand seven hundred and two, make a True and Particular Entry thereof, at the Office of Excise, within the Limits of which they shall then respectively inhabit, upon Pain to Forfeit the Sum of Fifty Pounds; and the Malt for which no such Entry shall have been made, and that, within Six Days after the said Entry, or they shall have made, or ought to have made such Entry, as aforesaid, shall pay down the Duties thereby Due, or Payable, for such Malt, to the proper Officer or Officers for receiving the same; or within the said Six Days shall give Security to the said respective Officers for Paying the said Duties to our Use within Six Months then next ensuing. And it is thereby further Enacted, That from and after the said Ninth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and two, during the Continuance of the said Act, every Maltster, or other Person making Malt for Sale, or not for Sale, shall, Monthly, and every Month, make a True Entry at the next Office of Excise of all Malt made by him in such Month respectively, on Pain to Forfeit for every such Neglect the Sum of Ten Pounds. And it is thereby further Enacted, That every such Maltster, or other Maker of Malt, shall, within Three Months after he shall make, or ought to have made such Entry, as aforesaid, pay and Clear-off all the said Duties, which shall be due from him or each respectively; and that every such Maltster, or other Person chargeable with the said Duties, who shall neglect or refuse to make such Payment, as aforesaid, shall Forfeit and Lose for every such Offence double the Sum of the said Duty, whereof the Payment shall be so refused or neglected; and that no Maltster, or other Person, after such Default made, shall Sell, Deliver, or Carry-cut any Malt, until he hath Paid and Cleared-off his Duty, as aforesaid, on Pain to Forfeit double the Value of such Malt so Delivered or Carried-cut. And it is thereby further Enacted, That on or before the Tenth Day of April, One thousand seven hundred and two, all Maltsters, and Makers of Malt for Sale, shall give Notice in Writing at the next Excise-Office, of the Number and Situation of all Cisterns, Utensils, Vessels, or other Vessels, or other Places, Rooms, or other Places by them made use of for the Wetting or Steeping of Corn, or Making or Keeping of Malt, or Keeping of Corn or Grain making into Malt, upon Pain of Forfeiting the Sum of Five Pounds for every Cistern, Utensil, Vessel, or other Vessel, Kibb, Floor, Room, or other Place by him or them made use of for the Wetting or Steeping of Corn, or Making or Keeping of Malt, without such Notice as aforesaid. And that from and after the said Tenth Day of April, during the Continuance of the said Act, no Maltster, or other Person making Malt for Sale, or not for Sale, shall Erect or Set-up, Alter or Enlarge, or make Use of any Cistern, Utensil, Vessel, or other Vessel for the Wetting or Steeping any Barley, or other Corn or Grain for the making of Malt, or of a Kibb, Floor, Room, or other Place for the Making or Keeping of Malt, or Keeping of Corn or Grain making into Malt, without first giving Notice thereof in Writing at the next Office of Excise, or shall keep or make Use of a Private Cistern, Utensil, Vessel, or other Vessel for the Wetting his Barley, or other Corn or Grain to make Malt, other than such as are openly known, and made use of in his Common Malt-House, on Pain to Forfeit for every such Cistern, Utensil, Vessel, or other Vessel, Kibb, Floor, Room, or other Place so Erected or Set-up, Altered, or Enlarged, kept Private, or Conceal'd, or made Use of without such Notice as aforesaid, the Sum of Fifty Pounds. And it is thereby further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any Maltster, or Maker of Malt for Sale, shall or Re-

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...of Malt, Brewer, Distiller, Inkeeper, Vi...  
...shall be entituled unto on the said Ninth Day of March,  
...his Custody or Possession, from the Sight or View of the Gau...  
...of Gaugers appointed to take an Account of the same, and  
...give Notice thereof at the next Office of Excise before  
...Tenth Day of April, then, and in such Case, the Person  
...therein shall forfeit and lose for every Bushel of Malt,  
...from the Sight and View of the Gaugers, the Sum of  
...shillings; and the Person and Persons in whose Custody  
...shall be found, who shall not before the Discovery thereof  
...give Notice at the next Excise-Office of the quantity of Malt,  
...his Custody, shall also forfeit and lose the Sum of Twenty  
...for every Bushel, as by the said Act, amongst other  
...Matters, and Things therein contained, more at large  
...appear. And we being willing and desirous that all Our  
...Subjects should have early and sufficient Notice of the Pe...  
...and Forfeitures before-mentioned, to the end they may  
...incurring the same, have, by the Advice of Our Privy  
...Council thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby  
...and Commanding all Persons concerned, to conform  
...to the said Act, and to do and perform all the Mat...  
...and Things thereby required of them respectively: And in  
...we do hereby Require and Command all Person and  
...whatsoever, that shall have, on the said Ninth Day of  
...last Instant March, in his or their Custody any Malt, in Trust  
...for the Use of any Maltster, or Maker of Malt for Sale,  
...or Retailer of Malt, Brewer, Distiller, Inkeeper, Vi...  
...or Vinegar-Maker, forthwith to give Notice thereof at  
...next Office of Excise, to the Place where such Malt is, or  
...shall be, to the Officers of our said Revenue, on pain of incur...  
...the Penalties contained in the said Act, and our highest  
...Command. And we do hereby strictly Charge and Command  
...all Our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bayliffs, and other Officers,

...on the Offenders against the said Act, duly adjsudged and

Vienna, March 1. The Emperor has ratified the  
Treaty lately concluded between him and the King  
of Poland, who thereby engages to send 10000 Men into  
his Service. A Treaty is as good as concluded with  
the Dukes of Saxe Weymar and Saxe-Eyfenach, for  
3000 Men to recruit the Imperial Forces in Italy.  
Orders are given for sending thither several Regi...  
...ments from Hungary and Transilvania. The Dif...  
...course continues, that the King of the Romans will  
...command the Imperial Army on the Rhine next Sum...  
...mer. Commissions are given out for raising 6 Regi...  
...ments of Hussars. Count Koningsleck, who upon the  
Emperor's Avocatoria has quitted the Service of the  
Electoer of Cologne, arrived here two days ago from  
Bon. Letters from Italy say, 18000 Imperial Forces  
were in motion, with a Design, as was said either to  
attack the French Forces lately landed at Final in their  
march towards Milan, or to possess themselves of the  
Town of Placentia. The French had abandoned  
Firenzuola and Monticello in the Country of Plac...  
...entia, into which Places Prince Thomas of Vaude...  
...mont, who commands the German Forces quartered  
on that side, had put good Garrisons. Tis said, the  
Emperor has ordered the Estates of Prince Ragotski,  
and the Persons who were concerned with him in  
the late Conspiracy in Hungary, to be sold, and the  
Money applied to the use of the Publick, which 'tis  
said will bring in 3 Millions of Florins.

Berlin, March 7. The King of Prussia has given Orders  
for a Regiment of Horse, another of Dragoons, and several  
Battalions of Foot, to march to Prussia, which, with the  
Forces already there, will make about 10000 Men, besides the  
Militia; and Commissions are given out for raising several  
new Regiments. The Swedish Forces in Pomerania are or...  
...red to be in a readiness to march, to prevent the sending of  
any Forces from Saxony to Poland. The Troops which the  
King of Prussia is to send into the Service of the States Ge...  
...neral are marching towards Holland, the Princes of Lunen...  
...burgh having granted them Passage through their Territor...  
...ries, and the Margrave Albert, who is to command these  
Troops, prepares for his departure. Letters from Warsaw  
of the 26th of the last Month say, the Senate of Poland  
have resolved to send Deputies to the King of Sweden, to  
desire he will withdraw his Forces out of the Territories of  
Poland, and in case of Refusal, to summon the Nobility to  
mount on Horseback for the Defence of their Country.  
They have also adviced the King to call another Diet; after  
which the Assembly broke up on the 25th, and divers of the  
Senators retired to their Country Houses. The last Letters  
from the Swedish Army say, the King of Sweden had been  
to view Creitengen, Szwieigsten, and several other Towns  
in Samogitia, and was come to Keydan; from whence he in...  
...tended to go to a Piace called Remigola, to give Audience  
there to the Deputies of Poland; and that a Body of the  
Confederated Nobility of Lithuania being got together near  
Grodno, he had sent a Detachment of his forces that way,  
with Orders to attack them.

Frankfort, March 8. Deputies from the Circles of  
Austria, Bavaria, Franconia, Suabia, and the Upper  
Rhine, are shortly to meet at Norlingen, to concert  
together the Measures to be taken in this Conjunction  
for their Common Safety. The Diet of the Circle of  
the Upper Rhine have given Directions for augment...  
...ing their Forces. Count Nassaw Weilbourg, General  
of the Electoer Palatine's Forces, has been to view the  
Lines raised on the other side the Rhine to cover the  
Palatinate, which are almost finished, and he is ex...  
...pected here in a day or two. A Placart has been pub...  
...lished here, to forbid the Supplying of the French  
with Horses, under very severe Penalties. The French  
are making preparations at Strasbourg, Landau, and  
their other Frontier Towns in Alsace, as if they ap...  
...prehended a Siege. The French Envoy at Mentz is  
preparing for his return home.

Cologne, March 10. The Bishop of Raab is gone  
from hence to Dusseldorp, to be present at a great  
Council of War to be held there; the Generals of the  
Dutch and the Prussian Forces in these Parts are also  
gone thither for the same purpose, and 'tis expected,  
the Forces of the Allies will draw together in few  
days, in order to recover the Places the French have  
made themselves Masters of in the Bishopricks of  
Cologne and Liege. The French have lately brought  
some Cannon and Ammunition to Bon; They have  
a Body of Forces near Bruel, between that Place and  
this City, and are drawing more Troops together  
near Nuys. They write from Dusseldorp, That the  
Electoer Palatine has received an Express from Rome,  
with an Account, That the Pope has determined the  
Differences between his Electoral Highness and the  
Dutchess of Orleans, in relation to her Pretentions  
upon the Succession of the late Electoer Palatine,  
which were referred to him by Virtue of an Article  
of the Treaty of Ryfwick, upon the Emperor and  
the French King's not adjusting the same within the  
limited time. The Sentence is, That the Electoer  
should pay to the Dutchess 600000 Florins, in full  
satisfaction of all her Demands, out of which Sum  
is to be deducted whatever she may have hitherto recei...  
...ved in Money or Effects, which amounting to about  
900000 Florins, the Dutchess remains indebted  
300000 Florins to his Electoral Highness.

Hamburgh, March 10. Letters from Warsaw give  
an Account, That the Senate of Poland is separated,  
after having resolved to send Deputies to the King  
of Sweden; It was proposed to them to consider of  
satisfying the Demands of the King of Prussia, who  
presses for the Payment of the 300000 Dollars which  
are due to him from the Republick, according to the  
Treaty concluded between them about 2 years ago  
for

for the restoring of Elbing, and some of the Senators offered to advance the Money, but no Resolution was taken therein. Most of the Senators were retired to their Country Houses. The Discourse still continued, that the King of Poland intended shortly to go to Cracow. Letters from Courland say, the King of Sweden was at Keydan in Samogitia, and that his Forces continued their March towards Warsaw. The Queen of Prussia intends to go to-morrow from Hanover to Cell, and from thence to Berlin.

*Hague, March 14.* A Demand was made some days ago by Monsieur Hulst, the Dutch Resident at Brussels, in the Name of the States-General, of the Principal and Interest due to them by the Crown of Spain, upon the account of the Expences they have been at for the Defence of the several Towns in the Spanish Netherlands, from the beginning of the late War till the time of their being delivered up to the French, declaring, That if the same be not paid within a month's time, the States will be obliged to make use of Force to possess themselves of the Places and Countries which are engaged for the Payment of this Money, by the Treaties and Conventions made for this purpose between Spain and Holland; In Answer to which, a Memorial was delivered to the said Resident, containing in substance, That upon the Prospect of a War, the Revenues assigned for the Payment; of the Interest of what is owing by Spain to the States, had indeed been applied to other uses; but if the Dutch were for a Peace, the Account should forthwith be stated, and Care taken for the Payment, if for War, it would be great Imprudence in the Spaniards to part with this Money; And Monsieur Puiffegure, the French Intendant at Brussels, immediately went Post for France, to acquaint the French King with what had passed. The Dutch Generals who came hither to be present at the Council of War lately held here, are all returned to their several Commands; The Forces of this State are ordered to be in a readiness to march by the 20th Instant, in order, as 'tis said, to form three several Camps, the one between Breda and Rosendall, the other near Maffricht, and the third on the Lower Rhine. General Dopff, who lately came to this Place from Maffricht, is gone to Duffeldorp; The French had formed a Design to seize him in his Journey hither, and for this purpose had ordered a Party of 80 Horse to way-lay him between Maffricht and Bosledue, but the General had timely Notice of it, and took care to avoid them; 'Tis said, he is to have a Commission from the Emperor to be Commander in Chief of his Forces on the Lower Rhine. Baron Spar, who is to command our Forces on board the Fleet, is made a Major General; two Regiments of Foot are appointed for this Service, which, together with the Marines, make 5000 Men. Three Regiments of Horse, being part of the Forces which the King of Prussia sends into the Service of the States, are arrived in the Dutchy of Cleves.

*Paris, March 15.* The French King has appointed the Marshall de Catinat to command his Army in Germany. A Draught is made of 150 Men out of each Company of the Guard of Musketers to be sent to Flanders. The Letters from Italy give an account, that the Duke de Vendosme arrived there the 26th of the last Month, and that he was in great danger, of being taken by a Party of Germans, who lay in Ambush expecting him; but he having notice of it, went another way.
