On 8th May, 1946, Mr. Farid was in charge of a Japanese Tug which was towing a Japanese submarine due to be sunk at sea. A sudden storm overtook the Force concerned, and the tow parted. Mr. Farid thrice re-passed the tow, but the submarine had finally to be cut adrift and the tug herself sank with the loss of four hands. Mr. Farid showed a fine example of courage and determination in trying to save both tug and tow, and only survived by reaching another submarine and climbing aboard. Rasul was Mr. Farid's Signalman in the Tug, and proved himself of the greatest help throughout the operation, including the difficult boarding of a drifting submarine and during the night which was spent upon it.

Leading Seaman Kelman was in charge of a working party in the towed submarine. He obeyed the order to cut the vessel adrift without hesitation, and was swept away into the gale and darkness, with the vessel rolling 60 degrees either way. He encouraged his working party during the night which followed, and was still cheerful when picked up five hours later.
