**W**E cannot but deeply Condole the Loss of our late King, of Glorious and Immortal Memory, which will be ever precious as long as either the Flourishing State of true Religion, or the just Liberties of Europe, are thought fit to be contended for.

We beg leave humbly to Congratulate Your Majesties happy Accession to the Crown, being assured of your constant Zeal and Affection (even from your early Years) to promote Piety and Virtue, and assert the Protestant Religion as Established by Law amongst us, as appears by your Royal Promises on all Occasions, and particularly by your late Proclamation against Vice and Immorality, and that you are fully resolved to support our Liberties, and check the Exorbitant Power of France, your unparalleled Grace and Generosity in easing the Publick Burthens, is an ample Demonstration.

We do assure Your Majesty, That we will unite and use our utmost Endeavours to defend Your Sacred Person from all Attempts whatsoever, support your Government, and continue the Succession in the Protestant Line as Established by Acts of Parliament: And we do give Your Majesty these Assurances, out of Regard to our Religion, out of Love to our Country, and out of known Principles of Loyalty, testified by our Zeal and Affection to our late King, which are not in the least extinguished, but entirely transferred from him to you, our most Gracious Queen, whom God preserve to Reign long and happily over us.

*Tientsin, April 22.* The King of the Romans's Equipage will be ready by the beginning of the next Month, and he intends to go about that time to the Upper Rhine, to take upon him the Command of the Imperial Forces. A great number of Recruits, both Horse and Foot, are sent to Italy. The 6 Regiments of Horse and 10000 Hufars, lately ordered to be raised, are complete, and have begun to march, some towards the Rhine, and the rest to Italy. The French Frigates which cruise in the Adriatic Gulf, have Orders to seize all such Ships as they shall meet with, having any Provisions on board for the use of the Imperial Army. The last Advice from these Parts say, a Commissary of the Emperor's Customs on the Coast of Dalmatia, having got together some Country People, surprised one of the Frigates, which was put into the Island of Lissa, killed the Captain, with most of the Ship's crew, and took the Lieutenant and 10 Men Prisoners.

*Frankfort, April 30.* Prince Lewis of Baden continues encamped at Langenkandel, where his Army daily increases by the coming up of more Imperial and Palatine Forces. The Forces of the Upper Rhine, which were drawn together at Wisbaden, are ordered to join the Imperial Army; And the Forces of the Circles of Swabia and Franconia, and of the other Circles, that lately entered into the Grand Alliance, are all marching to do the like. Prince Lewis of Baden having Advice, That a Body of French Forces were marching by the way of Weissenburgh and Lauterburgh, to reinforce the Garrison of Landau, he sent out a Detachment to Weissenburgh, upon whose Approach the French retired to Haguenau with such Precipitation, that they left behind them their Forage and Ammunition. The German Forces have also taken post at Belchenam, Belheim, Reilheim, and Herlheim, so that Landau is quite blocked up. The Imperialists have ordered the Inhabitants of the Country of Alliance to bring in a certain quantity of Forage for the use of their Forces. The Bridge of Boats at Spire is to be removed to Lauterburgh, and the lying Bridge to Philippsburgh. Several Officers belonging to the Imperial Artillery passed by here this week, with 400 Horses for the use of the said Artillery, going to the Imperial Camp. Marshal Caminat is daily expected at Strasburgh. We hear, the Saxon Forces which the King of Poland has put into the Emperor's Service, are marching towards Italy. Count Stryum, General of the Imperial Horse, came hither 3 days ago from Vienna, and the next day went on towards the Lower Rhine.

*Cologne, May 2.* The Elector of Cologne marched from Bon the 28th inst with about 6000 Men, 9 Pieces of Cannon, and some Mortars, and 7 Wagons laden with Bombs, towards Siegburg, in order to attack the Palatine Forces posted there; but not being able to pass the River Sieg, which was extremely swelled by the late Rains, they contented themselves with plundering several Villages in the Country of Berg, and to return to Bon; their Troops have likewise plundered Rhynmagen and Oberwinter, two small Towns above Bon, on this side the Rhine, which belong to the Elector Palatine. Count Tallard is shortly expected at Bon. A Party of the French Forces in Gelderland has plundered Stolberg, near Aix la Chapelle, belonging to the Elector Palatine. A Party of his Electoral Highness's Forces has taken the Counts of Aspremont and Linden, and several other Prisoners. The Diet of the Circle of Westphalia, which is met here, resolved yesterday to enter into the Association lately made between the Circles of Austria, Suabia, Franconia, and the Upper and Lower Rhine; and they intend likewise to enter into the Grand Alliance, which they are to consider of this day.

*Hamburg, May 2.* The King of Sweden, according to our freshest Advice, continues his March directly to Warlaw, which has greatly alarmed the Court there. The Swedes disperse in the Countries through which they march a Placart, by which the King of Sweden exhorts all the Inhabitants to remain in their Houses, promising his Protection to all that shall do so, and threatening to destroy the Houses of all that shall forsake them. The Ambassadors of the Republick of Poland are to have Audience of the King of Sweden at Grodno; but 'tis said he will not give an Answer to their Proposals before he is come with his Army to Warlaw. Letters from Lithuania say, a strong Detachment of Swedes was marching to attack Prince Wicnowsky, who lately defeated one of their Parties; and some Letters from Koningsberg say, the Swedes had defeated his Troops, and taken him Prisoner. The Swedish Forces in Pomerania begin to move towards their Camp near Stettin; the Forces of Holstein are likewise drawing together in order to join them. They write from Copenhagen, that the King of Denmark has ordered 4000 Men to be sent to Holstein, who will shortly be followed by 5000 more; and that he intends to take a Journey thither about the beginning of next Month.

*Wesel, May 2.* The Army of the Allies before Keyserwaer has lately been reinforced by several Battalions of Foot drawn out of this Place, and of several other Garrisons; Their Batteries fire constantly, and have made a considerable Breach; and now the Rains (which have proved a great hindrance to them) are ceased, we daily expect to receive an account of their having assaulted the Counterscarp. The Marshal de Boullers continues at Zanten; he has sent a Detachment of his Forces to Burick, a small Town on the other side the Rhine, a little above this place; upon which our Bridge of Boats on the Rhine is taken away, and several pieces of Cannon are placed along the Rhine. We hear the French have plundered several Places in the Dutchy of Cleves, which lie on the other side the Rhine. The King of Prussia has appointed Monsieur Tetteau, his Chamberlain, and Monsieur Blaspiel, to receive in his Name the Homage of the States of the Country of Meurs.

*From the Earl of Athlone's Camp at Clarenbeck, May 2.* Major-General Dompere being sent out from hence last night with 1000 Horse, met this morning a Party of about 600 French Horse, whom he attacked, and totally defeated, killing 200 of them on the spot, and taking near as many Prisoners, among whom are a Lieutenant-Colonel who commanded the French Party, and 5 or 6 other Officers; On our side, not above 30 Troopers and Dragoons were killed. Eleven English Battalions, which were encamped near Rosendaal, joined us this morning.

*Paris, May 6.* A great many Privateers are fitting out in the French Ports, and 'tis said, about 100 Commissions are already dispatched for this purpose. The Chevalier John Bart died at Dunkirk the 27th inst; and 'tis said, Monsieur Pointis is to command the Squadron which is fitting out there in his place. The Sieur Jordan, Envoy of the King of Poland, being recalled, left this Place 3 days ago, in order to return home. The Venetian Ambassador has been several times in Conference with the Ministers of this Country concerning the French Frigates that cruise in the Adriatic Gulf, which gives great Offence to the Republick, as being a Violation of their sovereignty over that Sea. This Court is not very well satisfied with the Duke of Savoy, who would send this Year but half the number of Forces to the Assistance of the French in Italy he did the last, and yet in-

hits to have the same Subsidies continued. Letters from the Duke of Vendosme's Quarters at Nazaro of the 28th inst give an Account, That he intended to march the 2d Instant, and to repulse the Po at Cremona, with the French Forces quartered in the Country of Piacenza, which consist of 25 Battalions, and 12 Squadrons, and to advance towards Sestione, in order to supply that Place with Provisions. The French reckon they shall have in the Field in Italy this Campaign an Army of 62 Battalions of Foot, and 101 Squadrons of Horse, besides the Spanish Forces, and those of Savoy. The Germans continued to intrench themselves along the Po and the Oglio; they had received from Germany a Reinforcement of 4000 Men, and expected shortly 10000 more. Prince Eugene had sent a Message to the Prince of Vaudemont, Governor of Milan, to acquaint him, that he had received Orders from the Imperial Court to agree upon a Cartel for the Exchange of Prisoners. Here has been a Report of Prince Eugene's Sickness and Death, but it proves altogether groundless.

*Portsmouth, April 24.* Yesterday being St. George's Day, and the Day of Her Majesty's Coronation, it was observed here with great Demonstrations of Joy; at Two in the Morning the Bells began to ring, and so held all day; the Standard was displayed from the Magazine and Town-Hall; also Four other Flags at each corner of the Town-Hall, and a Pendant upon each Pinnacle of the Church-Tower, and a Flag in the middle; the Ships at Spithead were adorned with Flags, and Pendants of all sorts, which made a very Noble Show; About Three a Clock the Ships at Spithead discharged their Guns, (as did those in Harbour) and Volleys of Small Shot from the Ships every minute: Between Four and Five in the Afternoon Sir Stafford Fairbairn, with most of the Captains of the Fleet, came ashore, and the Commissioner of the Dock, and his Officers, came to Town, and went all to the Town-Hall, where the Mayor, Recorder, and the rest of the Corporation, being ready to attend them, the Mayor gave them a very splendid Treat, and after Supper Her Majesty's Health was drank, the Guns of the Platform being at the same time discharged. The People, who were got together in great Crowds in the Streets, repeated their Acclamations of Long live Queen ANNE. The Night ended with Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and Illuminations in every House. The Ships at Spithead made a very Glorious Show at Night, hanging out Candles as thick as possible; they could be hung, and some firing several Sky-Rockets.

For making up a true Record of the Claims at Her Majesty's Coronation, all Persons who claimed to perform any Service in Westminster-Hall at or about the time of Dinner, are to return to the Herald, or to Lawrence Cromp Esq; their Deputy Register, at the Herald's Office near Doctors-Commons, London, a true Account how and by whom their several Services were performed, on or before Monday Evening the 4th of May next, to the end the same may be drawn up in Form, and presented to the Court of Claims at the next sitting, which will be on Wednesday the 6th of May.
