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Falmouth, July 5.

ON Monday last arrived here two ships of this place from the *Streights*, one of them bound for *Amsterdam*, the other for *Hanborough*, one Flyboat from *Dantzick* bound for *London*, and several vessels from *Norway*.

Plymouth, July 6. Some days since arrived here the *Mary-Rose* with part of the Train and Baggage belonging to his Excellency the Lord *Howard*, who is expected here by Land to embark in order to his Embassie to the Emperour of *Morocco*.

The *Streights Fleet* which entered this Port the last week put to sea on Saturday and Sunday last with a fair wind.

Venice, July 5. This next week they sail from hence another considerable Convoy designed for *Candia*, upon which are to be embarked Three thousand soldiers, some of them being a part of our new Leavies, but the greatest number, soldiers raised by the Dukes of *Mantoua*, *Modena*, and *Parma*, to be commanded in the Expedition by the Duke *della Mirandola*, who has already embarked part of his equipage, and in few days may go on board with many Cavaliers, persons of quality, whose valour and zeal for this service invites them to accompany him as Volunteers.

By the way of *Ragusa* we are advised, that a ship lately arriving there in few days from the *Levant* affirms, that the Visier taking all opportunities upon the besieged, had with much silence drawn his strength together, ordering them to fall suddenly upon the battered and most ruined parts of the Town in the midst of the night, hoping to find the Venetians at such a time indulging themselves with sleep and less careful for their defence, and consequently that an easie way might lie open to his people for the Conquest of the place. The Turks in obedience to his Commands, marched up the breaches with as much silence as was possible, and being ready to assault, fell suddenly on with loud cries and all the Terror imaginable, but to their astonishment they found the Garrison in such readines to receive them, that after some little time spent in a vain attempt, they loon found by their great loss of men, that all their farther obstinacy would onely turn more and more to their own ruine and therefore in some disorder retired themselves within their Line.

This ill success has much discouraged the Visiers Army from making another General assault which was before intended upon the *Sablonera* and *St. Andre*, but that which strikes the greatest terror into the minds of the Turkish soldiers, is an account given them by their spies, that the guard and defence of those places is committed to such soldiers, who some years since had given great proofs of their courage on many occasions in *Hungary* during the late wars between the Emperour and the Grand Signior, to the destruction of the best part of the Ottoman Army.

They farther tell us that several Turkish Saicks have been lately taken by our ships, laden with Provisions and endeavouring to have put into *Candia*, but upon the approach of ours, the Turks left their vessels and saved themselves in their boats, and by swimming; their ships being taken were sent into *Candia* where they unladed their provisions.

A vessel arriving from *Zante* tells us, that the French Fleet had some days since been discovered off that place sailing for *Candia*, where they are before this supposed to be arrived, and that our Gallies were gone for *Suda*, where

they intended to expect the arrival of the French succours with those from the Pope and the Grand Master of *Malta*.

The Members of the Senate Signior *Alusse Mocenigo*, and *Giorgio Morosini*, having been formerly nominated by the Senate to succeed the lately deceased Proveditor General of the Fleet, have since excused themselves from the employment; whereupon, on Wednesday last the Senate proceeded to a new choice, which fell upon his Excellency Signior *Antonio Bernardo*.

We have even now a warm report, that our Garrison in *Candia* have made a vigorous sally upon the Enemy, and have beaten them out of their Trenches with a great slaughter.

Cologne, July 11. Letters from *Nuremberg* inform us, that the unexpected news of the Election of Duke *Wisnienski* to the Crown of *Poland*, hath much surpris'd the Court of the Duke of *Neubourgh*, but upon further confirmation thereof, Order was immediately given for the remaining of several Hor'es with the Dukes Equipage which were order'd to part from *Duseldorp* to the Frontiers of *Poland*, upon the hopes of another event of the Election.

From *Switzerland* we are advised, that the Canton of *Schwitz* has lately publish'd a Manifest, shewing to the world upon what conditions they accepted of the French Pension offered to them by the *Sieur de Mollier*, to the great dissatisfaction of the said Resident, and that the other three Cantons who were prevailed with upon the same account, intend also to publish the reasons of their acceptance of the said Pension.

From *Nancy* we are told, that the Prince *Charles of Lorraine* has not yet by any Courier given the Duke advice of the affairs of *Poland*, which is not a little wondered at in that Court: and that Monsieur *d' Aubeville* is ordered by the Court of *France* to complain to the Duke of *Lorraine*, that the Protestants have some time since opposed the Bishop of *Metz*, and refused to allow him Episcopal Jurisdiction within their Towns, desiring him to use his endeavor to bring them to a compliance.

Hague, July 16. Here is lately arrived the Prince of *Saxony*, who some time since married the Princess of *Dane-mark*, but is yet *incognito*.

Monsieur *Boreel* designed Ambassador to the Court of His Majesty of *Great Brittain*, this day departs hence for *Zealand*, from whence he may in few days transport himself into *England*. To morrow the States of *Holland* may again Assemble, so that in little time we shall see what will be the result concerning the recruiting of the Army.

The Count *de Bentheim's* Secretary has left the Town, and is returning to the said Count his Master, but the resolution of the States-General is not yet known, nor as yet any answer sent about the restitution of his Children, which was the subject of the said Secretaries message.

From *Westphalia* we are informed, that the 2d of this instant happened a great and sudden fire at *Warendorp*, which in the space of a few hours burnt down and consumed above an hundred and threescore houses; they also tell us that Colonel *Foster*, and several other reformed Officers some time since dismiss'd from the States service, have sought employment and are entertained by the Bishop of *Munster* who has in several places got together a considerable number of soldiers who are at his Devotion, but as yet 'tis not known for what employment they are designed.

From *Messrich* we are advised, that the 9th instant in the

the night, a party of 350 Foot and a Troop of Four score Horse were ordered to march thence as a guard to two Sergeants, or Hussars, which were sent to the Castle of *La Rochelle*, seated in the Barony of *Dalhem*, a dependency upon the States of the *Unijica Provinces*. To summon the Prince of *Liege's* Garrison to march out, according to a late agreement made between the said States Commissioners and those of the Prince of *Liege*, but the said Guard with the Sergeants approaching, found between Fifteen hundred and Two thousand of the Countey people drawn together, well armed and in a posture of War, lying about the Castle, sent thither, (as it seems) by the said Prince of *Liege* to hinder the States forces from taking possession of the said Castle, he disliking as it appears the agreement made by his Commissioners, inasmuch as our people unwilling to use violence were obliged to return without their Errand, the consequence whereof we may expect hereafter.

From *Aix la Chapelle* they write, that the Prince of *Eurtemberg* Bishop of *Strasbourg* arrived there the 27th of the last month, and was treated with extraordinary magnificence by Monsieur *Francis* the Popes Nuncio, and that he was again departed thence intending for the *Spain*.

Paris, July 16. His Majesty has been lately pleased to nominate the Sieur de *la Haye*, at present Governour of *St. Venant*, to be sent to *Madagascar* with the Character of Vice-roy, to supply the room of the Sieur de *Montvergues*, who has obtained His Majesties leave to return home from that employment, the said Sieur de *la Haye* is ordered to repair speedily to this place to receive his instructions and to fit himself for his voyage.

By the late return of the *Holland East-India* Fleet we are advised that the French were resolved to quit their habitations at *Madagascar*, and to transport themselves to the Islands of *Mascarenhas*, as places which they suppose to be more convenient for the establishment of their Trade; and that the Sieur *Caron* was at *Suratte* with a considerable Cargo which he intended to embark with the first opportunity for *France*.

The four Companies of His Majesties *Guards* body, which were of late sworn to the number of 11 or 12 hundred men, are to be reduced to their former establishment of 400 onely, viz. 100 in each Company, and care is to be taken by the respective Captains, that a fit choice be made of able and Loyal persons, by reason of the great Trust which is reposed in them.

'Tis believed that the Chamber of Justice may be dissolved on Saturday next by the Chancellor, and tis confidently said, that a Legal Inquiry is to be shortly made into the behaviour of all such persons as have within the space of 30 years been employed as Intendants of Provinces, or the like publick charges, and that His Majesty intends to nominate several Commissioners for that Purpose.

Monsieur de *St. Romain*, His Majesties Ambassador at *Lisbonne* has found a great obstruction in his applications made to that Court for the raising a Regiment of Portuguese for his Majesties service, which they seem unwilling to grant, unless they be commanded by Portuguese Officers.

Paris, July 17. Some late Lettets advise us that the Duke de *Beaufort* was with the Fleet under his Command arrived at the Isle of *Corigo*, the place designed for the Rendezvous of the Auxiliary forces employed for the succors of *Candia*, it being about 25 Leagues from the Isle, and that the said Duke had a prosperous voyage thither, having not made above 10 days sail between that and *Thoulon*.

The Duke d' *Navailles* has also written from aboard his Admirall Gally, being about the height of *Maltha*, that he was with a favourable wind pursuing his voyage, and 'twas hoped might in a few days have a view of *Candia*.

We have not yet any farther news from Monsieur d' *Almeras* or his Squadron, nor any farther account of Monsieur de *la Haye* our Ambassador at *Larissa*, since the sudden departure of our ships from those Coasts.

We have several and differing reports of the Condition of *Candia*, some affirming that the Turks have made them-

elves Masters of the *Sabionera* and *St. Andre*, and reduced the besieged to great straits. But a vessel which came thence about the end of *May* informs that the besieged finding that the Turks pressed hard upon them, especially at the Bulwark of *St. Andre*, resolved to endeavor to remove them, and accordingly made a strong rally, with so much courage and success, that in little time they beat the Turks from their defences, and ruined a Breast-work which they had thrown up at the foot of the Bastion, and forcing the Enemy to observe a greater distance, had time to repair a considerable breach which the Turks had made in their Retrenchment about the neck of the Bastion, but that the greatest confidence of the Defendants is in the arrival of the succors which they expect with some impatience, and that of late the Garrison is much infested with a violent and infectious purple Feaver, which flies up in the head of the diseased, and has carried off some numbers of their people.

On Friday last the Venetian Ambassador, gave a visit to the Count *St. Paul*, and delivered to him Letters from the Senate, taking especial notice of his Courage and Conduct during his stay within the City of *Candia*, and returning him thanks for his good services.

The Troops of His Majesties Household are ordered to be in readiness by the 25th or at the farthest before the end of this month, before which time His Majesty intends to be present in the Palace to settle some Rents upon the Town-house for the satisfaction of the Proprietors of several houses in the Street *St. Honoré* between the *Fueillants* and the *Croix de Tiroir* which are to be pulled down for the enlargement of the *Louvre*, after which His Majesty intends for *Chambourg*.

The Dauphin has been lately much distemper'd with a Feaver, but having been three times let blood, is in a hopeful way of recovery.

The Cardinal *Antonio* is going for *Provence* on his way into *Italy*, having been with much kindness invited by the Pope to *Rome*, the Air of which place is thought to be most agreeable to his constitution.

On Friday last their Majesties did the Dutchess d' *Anguillon* the Honor to sup with her at her pleasant house at *Kuel*, where they were entertained with extraordinary magnificence.

Some days since arrived at *Rouen* a great ship laden with Plate, rich Hangings and other Household-stuff of great value belonging to King *Cisimir* late King of *Poland*.

Whither His Majesty has lately dispatched a person to compliment the new elected King upon his entry upon the Crown; the Army in *Lythuania* seem not yet to be fully satisfied, or to approve of the choice till they can be assured of the payment of their Arrears, but 'tis believed they may in little time be induced to a compliance.

Lyme, July 7. The 5th instant arrived here the *Sarah* of this place from *Morlaix*, several ships ly ready in this Harbor for a voyage, all of them outwards bound, some for the *Canaries*, some for *Virginia*, and others for the coast of *France*.
