A PROCLAMATION,
 For a General FAST.

WHEREAS for the Reasons mentioned in Our Declaration, Dated the Fourth of this Instant May, We have Declared War against France and Spain, on the Success whereof the Common Safety of Our Kingdoms doth, under God, wholly depend; And putting Our Trust in Almighty God, that He will vouchsafe a Special Blessing to this Our so Righteous Undertaking, We have, out of Our own Religious Disposition, Resolved, and do hereby Command, That a General and publick Fast be Observed, throughout this Kingdom, in such manner as is herein after Directed and Prescribed, viz. so both We and Our People may Humble Our selves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon for Our Sins, and may in most Devout and Solemn manner send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on the Arms of Us and Our Allies, and Our and Their Naval Forces, and for Restoring and Perpetuating Peace, Safety, Honour and Prosperity to Our Kingdoms and Dominions, and the Nations and States in Alliance with Us. And to the End that so Religious an Exercise may be Observed at one and the same time, We do hereby, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, Publish and Declare to all Our Loving Subjects, and do strictly Charge and Command, That on Wednesday, being the Tenth Day of June, this Fast shall be Religiously kept and Observed throughout Our Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed. And for the more Religious and Orerly Observing the same, We have given Directions to the Arch-Bishops and Bishops of this Kingdom, to Compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be Used in all Churches and Chapels, and other Places of Publick Worship, and to take Care for the Timely Dispersing thereof through their respective Dioceses. And We do strictly Charge and Command, That the said Publick Fast be Reverently and Decently Performed by all Our Loving Subjects, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly Inflict on all such as shall Contemn or Neglect the Performance of so Religious a Duty.

Given at Our Court at St. James's the Fifteenth Day of May, 1702. In the First Year of Our Reign.

WE humbly beg leave to Console with Your Majesty, as becomes us, the Death of His late Majesty, in which Loss (with others Your Majesties Subjects) we do very sincerely declare our selves conformed and supported by Your Majesties happy Accession to the Throne of our Royal Ancestors, whose Lawful Title we shall defend against the pretended Prince of Wales, and all other Opposers whatsoever. Your Majesties Gracious Declaration in Council, and your Speech to your Parliament, confirmed us what we before steadfastly believed, That Your Majesty's Heart was entirely English; whereof Your Majesty hath since pleased to give us very ample and undeniable

Testimonies, by the Satisfaction Your Majesty expressed upon your giving the Royal Assent to the Bill for taking the Publick Accounts, and by that unparalell'd Grace and Goodness which moved Your Majesty to contribute so largely as you have done to the Ease and Relief of your Subjects, which must make us all the more cheerfully submit to their great and heavy Taxes, that the Preservation of the Liberties of Europe, and Reducing the Exorbitant Power of France, may at this time require. May God long preserve Your Majesty a Blessing to your People, and may they ever make Your Majesty these Returns of Duty and Gratitude that become Loyal and Obedient People, to the most Glorious and Best of Sovereigns.

Dread Sovereign,

AS we received the News of the late King's Death, with due Regard to the Loss of so great a Prince, so our Grief was presently allayed, when we considered that the Crown of your Royal Ancestors was to descend to Your Majesty, whose Rightful and Lawful Title we shall defend with the last drop of our Blood, against the pretended Prince of Wales and all other Opposers whatsoever.

From Your Majesties Happy and Glorious Reign we promise to our selves all imaginable Felicity: We rest assured that a Heart entirely English will always consult the Good of England; And by the Gift Your Majesty has lately made to your People of so large a Proportion of your own Revenue, Your Majesty has given an early and noble Instance how much your Royal Mind does compassionate the heavy Taxes this Nation now labours under, through the Negligence and Corruption of past Times: As your Wisdom will lead you to look into and correct those Abuses, so we remain in certain Hopes, from your Piety and Education, that the Church of England, as by Law Established, will hereafter meet with that Encouragement which the National Religion might justly expect. That all the good Ends which Your Majesty proposes to Your Self in your future Government may be brought to pass, shall be the constant Prayers of us your faithful Subjects.

Lisbon, April 25. N. S. An Express is sent from hence to the Envoy of this Crown in England, with the King of Portugal's Letters of Condoleance and Congratulation to the Queen of Great Britain, upon the late King's Death and Her Majesty's Succession to the Crown, and Letters of Credence to Her Majesty. Our outward-bound Brasil Fleet will sail in few days.

Cadiz, April 23. An Advice-Boat arrived yesterday at St. Lucar from the West-Indies, which came from the Havana about the middle of February last; the Master gives an Account, That the Plate Fleet was then at Vera Cruz; that they neither had their Cargo nor their Complement of Seamen on board, and no Preparations were made for their Sailing; and that there was a Sickness at Vera Cruz, which had destroyed a great number of the Inhabitants: He adds, That the Spaniards had begun to build a Fort at Darien, but the Indians rose against them, and killed all those who were employed in that Work, and remained Masters of the Place. Here is a Discourse, that the Galeons are
