the Seal and Purple thereof respectively; Her Majesty,

late Majesty for Losses by Fire, or otherwise, and yet
unpaid, or the Collections made thereupon not com-
menced, be read in the several Parish Churches where the

read in according to the Tenor of the respective Let-
ters patent in that behalf: And of this Her Majesty's
Agents, or Persons, Picars, Curates, Churchwardens,
Treasurers of the Poor, and all other Her Majesty's Officers
and Clerks, whom it may concern, are to take Notice,
and give themselves accordingly.

by Grace the Duke of Bolton.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

*Exemplar Address of the Mayor, Burges, Aldermen,
and Inhabitants, at Your Majesties Brough of St. Ives
in the County of Cornwall.*

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Obedient Subjects, humblye beg Levee to Conside the Death of King of ever Beſt and Gloriouſ Memory, as an ample Law not only to thefe Kingdoms, which he delivere from Popery and Arbitrari Power, at a time when we are in a manner reduced to Slippur, but to all the Europe, where the Protestant Interest or the Commonwealth is laid to Heart.
At this time we do m^e heartily and sincerely Commende Your Majesties Errance on your Reign; which may God may be long and prosperous. We ente to you, in your Heart, the Hazard to which you expref a Royal Person. (In Concurrence with His late M^rij^t)
Your Laws and Religion were upon the point of being废^{abolished}; and our Hearts are touchid in the most ſinuall way with your Gracious Declarations ſince your coming into Town, of your Reſolution to maintain the Government in Church and State, the Succession in the Prince Line, and the Alliances entered into for Releasinc the exorbitant Power of France.

Have the most promising Prospect of enjoying under
Your Majestys Government all that good Subjects can hope
from Gracious Queenz; and we beg Your Majestys to
see, that we will never be wanting in any thing that
we can expect from the most truly loyal Subjects.
For Your Majestys we will, to the hazard of our
Lives and Fortunes, defend your Rightfull and Lawful
Government, and the Succession of the Crown in the
House of Hanover, by Law established, against the pretended
King of Wales, and all his adherents, and will be ready
to contribute to enable Your Majestys to make
thee advances, for the Support of the protestant
In-
terior Defence of the Liberties of these p[ro]p[ri]es, against the
last invasion of France. We remain very desirous and
Your Majestys long and happy, & Years to come after us.

Diocese of Derry, at a General Visitation and Synod
held at Londonderry, May 6, 1792.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Naples, April 25. N. S. The King of Spain arrived here the 17th instant, being come from Toulon on board a French Squadron of Men of War commanded by the Count d'Estrees. The Nobility met him several miles out of Town, and the Cardinal Cantelmi, Archbishop of this Place, and the Vice-Roy, attended him, on his Arrival at his Palace. The Pope's Nuncio had Audience of him this week. The Constable of Colonna, and several other Persons of Quality residing at Rome, who have Estates in this Kingdom, are come hither to wait upon him. The Count de Lemos is made Vice Roy of Sardinia, and Don Siniscali Corrafa Proveditore of the Galleys of Naples. There has been a Discourse that the King would go to Rome, to demand the Investiture of the Kingdoms of Naples and Sicily; but it is now said, that the Pope persisting to decline it, the King has put off that Journey, and intends to go about a Month hence by Sea to Final, and from thence to Milan.

W^m May 9. The Cardinal Primate and several other Senators came to Town last wee^r, and the King of Poland having called the Senate together, represented to them, the Danger to which his Pe^rson and the whole Kingdom are exposed by the Motions of the Swedish Forces; who have possessed themselves of C^osziland, Semigallia, and Lithuania, and are coming towards this Place; upon which the Senate took the following Resolutions, That unless the Swedes do forthwith retire out of the Territories of this Republick, the Forces of the Crown shall be drawn together by their Lieutenant General Potocki, (the Office of Crown General being vacant) and that since they are not sufficient to make head against the Swedes, the King of Poland shall, in pursuance of the Peace Concluded, send for 4000 Saxons to join them, upon Condition that their Saxon Forces shall be under the Command of the said Lieutenant General. That the King shall maintain them at his own Charge, and that he shall send them home as soon as the Peace is made; That the King, if
