Venice, July 28. N. S.

Letters from the *Veronese* give an Account, That a Reinforcement of 2000 Men is come thither, in their march to the Imperial Army, which is now encamped at *Borgoforte*, a Detachment only being left to guard their Fortifications along the *Fossa Mantuana*, and in other Places about *Mantua*. More Troops are marching from the Country of *Tyrol* to join them, and they expect in few days the Forces which the Dukes of *Saxe-Gotha* and *Saxe-Weymar* have lately put into the Emperor's Service, amounting to 2600 effective Men. The *French* have left 20000 Men, most of them *Spanish* Forces, in their Camp at *Rovatta*, under the Command of the Prince of *Vaudemont*, and the King of *Spain* has put himself at the head of the rest of his Army, which is in motion; their Design being, as it is said, to Attack the German Camp at *Borgoforte*.

*Vicenza*, July 29. The Marquis *del Vasto* is upon his departure from hence, and it is said he is going to the Province of *Abruzzo*, in the Kingdom of *Naples*, to put himself at the head of a very considerable Number of the Inhabitants, who have taken up Arms in favour of the Emperor. An Officer was sent from hence this Week to *Italy*, with fresh Instructions for Prince  *Eugene*, and Bills of Exchange for 400000 *Florins*. Don *Antonio Gastano*, who was Secretary to the last Spanish Ambassador at this Court, and the Abbot *Olivieri*, are both seized, for dangerous Practices against the Government. The Princess *Ragotzi*, who was confined in a Nunnery for contriving her Husband's Escape out of Prison, is set at Liberty again.

*Frankfort*, August 2. The Magistrates of this Place have appointed Deputies to compliment the King of the *Romans* on his arrival in the Camp before *Landau*, and they will be going thither in a Day or two. We have an Account, that the very first day of his being there, he continued in the Trenches till 11 at Night, giving great Praises of his Courage and Application, and ordered a Sum of Money to be distributed among the Soldiers and the Pioneers, for their Encouragement. It is said he has brought with him a very considerable Sum in ready Money, and Bills of Exchange. Since his coming, the Siege is carried on with greater Vigour than before, and it is already in such a forwardness, that the *French* themselves give the Town for lost. The Queen of the *Romans* continues at *Heidelberg*. On Accounts concerning the Marshal *de Curina's* Army, say, it is still encamped near *Strasbourg*, and that he seems to have a Design of passing the *Rhine*, and of making a Diversion in the *Brigow*, or in the Territories of Prince *Lewis of Baden*; in the mean time several Redoubts and other Works are raised along the *Rhine*, to hinder the *French* from passing that River, and the Margrave of *Baden Durlach* has got 8000 Men together to defend them, and is shortly to be joined by more Forces. It is said the Enemy expect a Body of Troops from the Duke of *Burgundy's* Army, which Body is to encamp between *Saar-Louis* and *Metz*, in order to reinforce the Garisons of those two Places and of *Dieudonné*, if there be occasion. The Landgrave of *Hesse* arrived last Week in the Imperial Camp with his Forces, as did likewise the Regiment of Foot of *Salm*; the Regiment of *Marsigli* is come into the Neighbourhood of this Place in their march thither. The Regiment of *Horie* of *Wolfenbutzell*, which lately entered into the Emperor's Pay, is marched to *Philipsbourg*,

where it is to be made up to 1000 Men, like the rest of the Imperial Regiments of *Horie*, the Men being already raised for that purpose, and then it is to join the Army before *Landau*, where more Reinforcements are daily expected. The Foot which the Dukes of *Wolfenbutzell* have sent into the Emperor's Service, consisting of 2200 effective Men, have passed the *Main* at *Wertheim*, and are marching through *Franconia* to *Italy*, in order to reinforce Prince *Eugene's* Army.

*Cologne*, August 4. The Elector Palatine has published a very severe Order against carrying any Provisions or Counterband-Goods into *Bonn*. He intends in 3 or 4 days to begin his Journey from *Duffeldorp* to *Heidelberg*, and from thence to the Imperial Army before *Landau*. His Electoral Highness has given a Commission to the Commander of the Garrison of *Siegburg*, to raise an Independent Troop of *Horie*, which is to be employed in making Excursions in the Elector of *Cologne's* Country. There happen frequent Skirmishes between the Parties of the Troops of the Allies which are encamped at *Mulheim*, and those of the Garrison of *Bonn*. The Elector of *Cologne* continues in that Town, but is very much pressed by the *French* to remove to *Liege*. He has sent a Battalion of his Forces to strengthen the Garrison of that Place. Many of the *French* Soldiers desert daily. The Detachment sent from the Duke of *Burgundy's* Army to *Germany*, under the Command of Monsieur *Cosmarville*, consisting of 3 or 4000 Men, advanced the 30th past to *Arkon*, on the Frontiers of *Lorraine*, and were to continue their march in a day or two.

*Hamburg*, August 8. The Account we received by the last Post, of the Death of the Duke of *Holfstein-Gottorp*, met with little Credit, but is now confirmed from several Places. The Forces which lately marched from *Pomerania*, in order to join the King of *Sweden's* Army, lie on the Borders of *Silesia*, waiting for further Orders. The King of *Poland* is at *Cracow*, and his Army lies encamped about that Place; but it is doubted whether the Loss of his Artillery will not hinder him from taking the Field again this Summer.

From the Camp of the Allies at *Peer*, Aug. 10. On Tuesday the 8th Instant a Detachment was made out of each Brigade of Foot, to be employed in demolishing the Walls round this Place, or which an end was made before Night. The same day we foraged with a good Guard about the Villages of *Wichmael*, *Asel*, and *Hocktel* on our Right; several Squadrons of the Enemy's Horse appeared, but durst not attempt to interrupt our Foragers. That day one of our Part came with a small *French* Party, and took their Officer and 12 Men Prisoners. Yesterday the *French* Army marched from *Eggenhorst* to *Mil* and *Bilen*, and we have an Account, that this day they are advanced to *Borghack* in the Mayery of *Bohmer*. This morning 10 Battalions of Foot and 7 Squadrons of Horse joined us from *Mylbach*, with 6 pieces of Cannon and 6 Mortars, to be employed in attacking *Wertz*, and Lieutenant-General *Schulze* is to march to-morrow for that purpose with 4 Regiments of Foot and a Detachment of 2000 Horse and Dragons. This Night 1000 Men are commanded out to repair and enlarge the Roads, and all the Horse and Dragons are ordered to make each a *Falcine* to fill up a Bog which lies between us and the *French*, and as to us as the Roads are made up, the Army will march towards the Enemy, in order to oblige them to decamp.

*Hagen*, August 11. N. S. It is said the Siege of *Venlo* is relieved upon, that that Place will be invested the 14th Instant, and that the States will send for the Prince of *Nassau-Saarbruck* to command the Siege. There are Letters from the Imperial Camp at *Borgoforte* of the 29th of the last Month, which confirm the Defeat of three Imperial Regiments of Horse and one of Dragoons, commanded by the Marquis of *Wifworts*,

conti, of which we had an Account by the way of France, and bring the following Particulars of that Action, That the Germans were surprized by the Enemy, who had seized one of their Advanced Guards; That notwithstanding this Disadvantage, and the great Inequality of the Numbers of both Parties, the French being above 15000 strong, the Germans thrice repulsed the Enemy; That being at last forced to give way, and finding the Enemy had cut off their Retreat, by possessing themselves of a Stone-bridge on the Crostolo, over which they were to pass, 50 of their Dragoons alighted, and with their Swords in their hands made way for the rest of that Detachment; but that the Bridge being narrow and the Banks of the River very steep, many fell in and were drowned. General Vintcontu shewed a great deal of Courage on this Occasion, having 3 Horses killed under him, and was the last Man that came over the Bridge when they made their Retreat. The Germans had in this Action 500 Men killed, and divers taken Prisoners, particularly the Count of Arenberg Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of Darmstadt, and lost 10 Standards, 2 pair of Kettle-Drums and all their Baggage; but the French have no great reason to boast of their Success, for it cost them above 2000 Men.

**Falmouth, July 30.** A Flushing Privateer of 20 Guns came in here last Night, and brought in a French Prize of 140 Tuns, laden with Fish, and bound for Portugal, which she took on the Bank of Newfoundland. This morning came in here a Dutch Vessel bound for Middleburgh, the Master whereof reports, that he met Her Majesty's Fleet commanded by Sir George Rooke 16 Leagues to the Southward of Cape Finister, sailing with a fair Wind.

**Bristol, July 31.** The Lord Mohun and Sir Richard Temple's Regiments of Foot embarked here this Week for Ireland, and will sail as soon as the Wind is fair.

**Chester, August 1.** Colonel Farrington's and Colonel Stringer's Regiments of Foot, being Shipp'd off here, set Sail this day for Dublin with a fair Wind.

**Deale, Aug. 2.** Yesterday came into the Downs Her Majesty's Ships the Weymouth and Mary-Galley, with the Sidney and the Trumbull-Galley from the East-Indies, and several other homeward-bound Merchant Ships under their Convoy.

**Windsor, August 2.** This day Monsieur *Leyontrons*, the King of Sweden's Resident, had publick Audience of Her Majesty, to make the Compliments of Condolence and Congratulation in the Name of the King his Master, upon the Death of the late King, and Her Majesty's happy Succession to the Crown.

After which he had Audience in like manner of His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark. To both which Audiences he was Introduced by Sir Charles Costrell, Master of the Ceremonies.
