PRESENT,

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Her Majesty's Declaration, bearing Date the First Day of June last, for the Encouragement of the Captains of Her Majesty's Ships of War, it is Declared, That in case any Ship of War belonging to France or Spain be taken by any of Her Majesty's Ships of War, and after the Capture the same shall be taken into Her Majesty's Service, the Captains shall have Ten Pounds per Gun, and Ten Pounds per Ton, of such Ship or Vessel to be divided between them, for Officers and Men; And Her Majesty taking Notice, that the said Declaration, which would amount to more than the said Ships might be actually built for, has been altered by Act of Parliament, instead of the Allowance intended to be made of Ten Shillings per Ton: Her Majesty is pleased to Order, as it is hereby Ordered, That according to Her Majesty's Royal Instruction herein, Allowance be made of Ten Pounds per Gun, but no more than Ten Shillings a Ton for such Ships of War of France or Spain as shall be taken by any of Her Majesty's Ships of War, and afterwards employed in the Service of the Royal Navy as afloat; And that for the preventing any further Copies, this Order be Published in the Three next Gazettes.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS We have caused Our Writs to be Issued for the Calling of a Parliament, to Meet and sit Holden at Westminster the Twentieth Day of this Instant August, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, Do hereby Publish and Declare, That the said Parliament shall be Proved on the said Twentieth of August, to Thursday the Eighth Day of October next ensuing, And We have given Our Great Seal of Our Great Seal of England to prepare Writs Patent under Our said Great Seal for bringing the same into Execution: And We do hereby further Declare Our Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Eighth Day of October, be Held and sit for the Discharge of several Weighty and Important Affairs: And to the Lord Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses of the House of Commons, are hereby Requested and Committed to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Eighth Day of October next ensuing.

Given at Our Court at Hampton-Court the Sixth Day of August, 1702. In the First Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the QUEEN.

From the Imperial Camp at Montenara, July 24. N.S. The 17th Instant we received an Account, That the Enemy had passed the Po, whereupon Count Bagni was commanded out with 6 Companies of Foot, and a Regiment of Horse, to observe them, but a great Rain fell, which obliged him to put off his March till the next day. Lieutenant-Colonel Regal was also sent out with 300 Foot towards Campidello. The 19th Count Bagni returned to the Camp. The Garrison of Mantua

raised a Battery near the Gate of Ceres, against our Works on that side, but at too great a distance to do us much Damage. The 20th, we foraged beyond the Minio, and met with no opposition. The 21st, upon Advice that the Enemy continued their March on the other side the Po, and were advanced to San-Secondo, Orders were given for the Regiment of Young Daun to march to the River Cressolo. Count Ulfeld marched the same day with the Regiments of Dragoons of Savoy and Herberville to Borgoforte. About midnight we had Intelligence, That the Enemy was advanced to Colorno with 25000 Men, and had been joined by 2000 Men which lay on the other side of the Po; And that General Visconti was thereupon retired with the three Regiments of Cuirassiers under his Command to Santa Vittoria. Lieutenant-Colonel Martini was posted with 300 Horse along the Cressolo near Guastalla, and 700 Horse were left at Bersello. Orders were sent to Count Bagni to be in a readiness to march with his Detachment; to Count Geblen, that he should likewise be ready with his Regiment; and to Count Ulfeld, that he should march with the two Regiments of Dragoons under his Command, towards the Cressolo, and join the Regiment of Young Daun, in order to guard the better the Passage over that River. Several of our small Parties returned to the Camp with some Prisoners, and 44 Oxen, which they had taken. The Major of the Regiment of Dietrichstein was detached with 100 German Horse, and as many Hussars, from the Body commanded by Count Trautson towards Pietole, and marched towards Gaita, and was followed soon after by the Marquis Davia with 80 Horse; and another Detachment of 150 Foot and 100 Horse, under the Command of Major Peppercorn, of the Regiment of Corbeley, was sent out by Count Trautson towards Castelloria, who returned the next day, and gave an Account, That he put his Men in Ambush in two Places, but met only with some Peasants that were carrying Corn to Mantua, which he destroyed, not being able to bring it home; and sent to the Camp the Oxen that drew the Wagons on which it was laden. Then he marched with the rest of his Party, consisting of 80 Horse and 120 Foot, towards Ducastello, near which Place lay a Party of above 100 French Horse, under the Command of a Lieutenant-Colonel, 2 Captains, and 4 Lieutenants, and a Captain and a Lieutenant with 50 Granadiers, which last were posted in a House; The Major not believing it practicable to force them from thence, made a faint Retreat, to draw the Enemy out of their advantageous Post, which took effect, and our Men facing about, charged the Enemy so vigorously, that only the Lieutenant-Colonel, with between 20 and 30 Troopers, and a very few of the Granadiers, escaped; a Lieutenant and 13 Troopers being taken Prisoners, and the rest being all cut down. Our Men took also 30 Horses. We had in this Action 2 Dragoons, a Granadier, and 7 Troopers killed, and 3 Foot Soldiers wounded.

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From the Imperial Camp before Landau, August 10. The 6th Infantry, we sprung 2 Mines, and by the means of one became Masters of a Redoubt, and by the other made 3 Lodgments within the Palisades of the Counter-carap, which advantageous Posts cost us a Lieutenant Colonel and 2 or 3 Captains killed, and about 200 Men more killed and wounded. We carry on our Works with all possible Diligence, and hope to be shortly in a readiness to make a general Assault.

From the Camp of the Allies at Everbeck, August 17. The 22nd Instant, the Army marched from Peci, and came back to this Camp, as lying more conveniently with regard to the present Situation of the Enemy, as well for covering our Convoys from Mattheit and the Bosch as the Siege of Venlo, towards which Place 4 English and 6 Dutch Battalions of Foot, with 17 Squadrons of Horse, were detached this morning under the Command of Lieutenant-General Fagell; My Lord Coote commands the English Foot as Major-General, and Sir Bagditer-General Hamilton under him. The States-General have sent to the Prince of Nassau to repair forthwith thither to command in chief, and Lieutenant-General Couronne is to carry on the Siege under him; the Place is to be invested on the other side of the Mine by the Baron of Heyden, who commands the British Troops, and some Battalions of Nimeghen and the Gate is also to be commanded out upon this Siege, wherein we reckon about 20 Battalions and 50 Squadrons will be employed. The Enemy have divided their Army into three several Camps and he between Bengel and Eynshoven. The 14th in the afternoon, Lieutenant-General Schantz marched with 4 Battalions and 700 Horse and Dragoons to attack Weert, the Governor of which Place defended the Gates for about an hour, and killed us 2 Men, and then retired into the Camp; and our Men having received their Cannon and Mortars the next evening, began yesterday morning to play upon the Castle, and continued to be very vigorously till this day about noon, when the Garrison capitulated, who are to be conducted to Kutenmond. We had but 6 Men killed and 10 wounded in this whole Action. We have received several Convoys of Provisions from Maastricht, and expect one from both the 15th Instant with a considerable Sum of Money for the Army, and for such greater security the Detachment for Venlo has made a Halt near Richmond, to cover their March, having been joined by 10 Squadrons of Horse from our Army, under the Command of the Earl Rivers.

Hydra, August 13. N. S. The Swedish Ambassador went from hence the 15th Instant for Aix-la-Chapelle. We have now a certain Account, That the Duke of Holstein was shot in the Reins with a Cannon Ball, in the beginning of the late Engagement between the Kings of Sweden and Poland, and died in an hour after. They write from Cracow of the 29th past, That the Swedish Army was still near Pinfchoff, about 2 Leagues from the Place where this Action happened; and the King of Poland with his Army near Cracow. There are Letters from the North which give an Account, That a great Army of Muscovites had defeated 10000 Swedes commanded by General Schlippenback, which lay on the Frontiers of Livonia, and had afterwards invested to Dorpad.

Falmouth, Aug. 2. The Spanish Expedition Paquet-Boat arrived here yesterday from Lisbon; The Wind proving Northerly soon after their coming out of that Port, they stood 100 Leagues to the Westward before they met with a fair Wind. Her Majesty's Ship the Edgar came in here this evening with several Merchant Ships under her Convey from the Downes.

Plimouth, August 9. Sir Cloudesly Shovel, Admiral of the White, on board Her Majesty's Ship the Queen, came in here the 7th Instant with Her Majesty's Ships the Nortoik, Russell and Rochester. The same day arrived here Her Majesty's Ship the Mary, with several English homeward bound Merchant Ships under her Convey, when she met in the Soundings, and in her way thither she retook the Thomas and Ann of Bristol, laden with Sugar from Nevis, which was taken by a French Privateer off of the Blasketts. Her Majesty's Ships the Nattau and Dragon arrived here likewise that night, and in their Cruise took a Privateer of St. Malo called the Fortune, of 12 Guns, and retook her Prize, the Catherine Pink of Poole, laden with Fish and Oil, from Newfoundland; as also the Faulkon Brigantine of Bristol, laden with Cotton and Sugar from Antegoa, which was taken by a another French Privateer off of the Island of Lundy.

Windsor, August 9. The Queen having required the Proceedings upon the Trial of Sir John Mordaunt, Rear Admiral of the Red Squadron, to be laid before Her, and having considered all the Circumstances relating to the Expedition to Couronne; Her Majesty finding that Sir John Mordaunt has not done his Duty, pursuant to his Instru-

ctions, does not think fit to continue him in Her Service, and has therefore declared Her Pleasure, that his Royal Highness the Lord High Admiral of England should immediately discharge him from his Post and Command in the Royal Navy, and his Royal Highness has accordingly given the necessary Orders for it.
