to give orders for the following award of the British Empire Medal and for the publication in the London Gazette of the names of those specially shown below as having received an expression of Commendation for their brave conduct.

Awarded the British Empire Medal (Civil Division):—

TAROSI of Sio, New Guinea.

Tarosi at the outbreak of War with Japan was in charge of the Government school in Madang. He was subsequently employed on forward watching and air warning activities. When the post was withdrawn Tarosi remained alone and intercepted survivors from Rabaul and diverted them to Bogadjim away from enemy areas.

Tarosi took part in several patrols and was a member of a patrol sent out to search for survivors of a crashed Allied aircraft. This patrol was out for a period of five weeks in a trying swamp forest area which was covered by enemy patrol activity. It was largely due to Tarosi's courage and endurance that the native party persisted until the job was done.

Later he volunteered to join a glider landing expedition in unexplored and wild country in order to establish an American aerodrome.

Tarosi proved to be courageous and willing and his loyalty during the years of occupation was unquestioned.
