

and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such Order the patronage of the said benefice of Sandwich, Saint Peter, shall be transferred from Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors, to and become vested in the said Alexander Sargent, Archdeacon of Canterbury, and his successors in the same Archdeaconry for ever, and in exchange for the same the patronage of the benefice of Lympe in the said diocese shall be transferred from the said Alexander Sargent, Archdeacon of Canterbury, and from his successors, to and become vested in Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors, and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the said William Allen, Viscount Jowitt, or other the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being, to the intent that the patronage of the united benefice when the union which is hereinbefore recommended and proposed shall take effect shall belong wholly to the said Alexander Sargent, Archdeacon of Canterbury and his successors in the same Archdeaconry.

"7. *Alteration of Boundaries.* With the consent (testified as aforesaid) of the said Geoffrey Archbishop of Canterbury, as the patron of the benefice of Worth, in the said diocese and with the consent also (testified by his signing this Scheme) of the Reverend Harry Trotter as the incumbent of the benefice of Worth all that portion of the parish of Worth known as Sandwich Bay which is bounded by the line shown in red upon the map or plan annexed to this Scheme and is shown by the pink colour thereon shall be severed from the remaining part of the parish of Worth and united for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of the united benefice."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 to 1930, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty by and with the advice of His said Council is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 7th day of October, 1948, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Wotton Underwood with Ashendon in the diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas we are satisfied that Michael Wentworth Beaumont of Harristown House, Brannockstown, Co. Kildare, Eire, a Major in Your Majesty's Army (Retired) is the patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice:

"And whereas the said Michael Wentworth Beaumont desires to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Archdeacon of Buckingham for the time being and is consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof he has executed the same):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Robert Milton Hay, Bishop Suffragan of Buckingham, as Archdeacon of Buckingham, and the Right Reverend Kenneth, Bishop of Oxford, as the Bishop of the diocese within which the said benefice is situate (in testimony whereof they have executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council

ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said Robert Milton Hay as Archdeacon of Buckingham and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Archdeacon of Buckingham for the time being."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Oxford.

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853 (16 & 17 Vict. c. 134) as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that for the protection of the Public Health, burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in the undermentioned places of burial in the City of Manchester:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 5th August, 1948, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 20th day of September next, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Burials shall be discontinued in the following churchyards and graveyards, viz.:—

*Manchester.*—(i) St. Barnabas' Churchyard. Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of Saint Barnabas, Openshaw.

(ii) Blackley Methodist Churchyard. Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of the Blackley Methodist Church, Exchange Street, Blackley.

(iii) Chorlton Methodist Church Graveyard. Forthwith and entirely in the Graveyard of the Chorlton Methodist Church, Beech Road, Chorlton-cum-Hardy.

(iv) Blackley Unitarian Chapel Graveyard. Forthwith and entirely in the Graveyard of the Blackley Unitarian Chapel, Chapel Lane, Blackley.

(v) Christchurch Churchyard. Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of Christ Church, Bradford-cum-Beswick.

Provided that—

In the earthen grave now existing in the Churchyard of Christ Church, Bradford-cum-Beswick, in which the remains of Robert Fishwick are interred, the burial may be allowed at her decease of the body of Elizabeth Alice Fishwick subject however to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a less depth than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (Manchester) Order, 1948.
