Falmouth, July 19. He 16th instant arrived here the Virgin of this place, laden with Salt from Rochelle, where the lest lading several Swedes. Hamburgers, and Ostenders, but sew or no Dutch vessels

Madrid, July 10. The continuance of the good understanding between the Queen Regent and Don Juan of Austria, has given much satisfaction to this Court, which is not a little encreased by the confirmed health of the

King and Queen Regent.

On Sunday last marched into this City three hundred of the old and expert Militia from Gallicia, which are most of them to be incorporated into the new Regiment of Gnards, which has been lately mustered and exercised in the Patk in presence of the young King, who much beyond his years seemed to be delighted with that Martial exercise; by St. James's Feast tis believed the whole Regiment may be perfected.

Don Fuan is arrived at Sarragossa, where he was rereived with extraordinary Honout, the people filling the Air with their shouts, giving their welcome to kim with much heartines, as a person who has made it his business to interpose for their benefit, and by whose activity they

have been eafed of a great part of their burthens.

Vienna, July 14. The Pope continuing still zealous for the assistance of the Republick of Venice in their war for the defence of Candia, has ordered his Nuncio in this Courts to follicite for a new Levy of 1200 men for that Service, who has already conferred with several Officers, taking Orders for Moneys to be advanced for the encouregement of the work, and cloaths to be provided for fuch persons as shall list themselves for the emploiment.

The Regiment of Portia is upon its march, and is supposed by this to be arrived upon the frontiers, and con-lists of three thousand Oldiers, for whose pay the Em-perour was pleased to allow the Taxes arising from Stiria, Carenthia, and Carniela which Provinces have been prevailed with to a ready compliance, so as to advance the sum before the time in which it would become due.

The 12th instant was observed with much solemnity at the Court, as being the Empresses Birth-day, on which Her Imperial Majetty was attended and complimented as usually by the Nobility and great persons of the Court and also by the Spanish Ambassador and other forreign Ministers.

The Nobility of Hungary having not, made their appearance here according to the time prefixed by the Emperour, His Imperial hajesty has ordered new Letter's to be dispatched to them to hasten their coming hither, where

they are expected the 16th instant.

Upon intelligence from Hungary of the arrival of three thousand Turks at Newhausel under the Command of a new Bassa, Orders have been sent to the Governour of Raab, to reinforce the Garrison of Leopoldstadt, the new Fort built upon the River Waag, that the weakness of the place might not encourage the Turks to Violate the peace by attempting somewhat upon it.

Hambourg, July 16. Here are lately arrived two of our Greenland Fishers, which were sent out about 10

weeks before, and the reft are faily expected.

From Magdeburg we are ir formed, that the Marquis of Brandenbourg's forces, confiding of about eight thru-land men, having marched within few miles of Berlin on their way for Pruffia, are countermanded, and ordered to return to their old Quarters, and that his Electoral Highnels intends in few weeks to be at Clever. +

From Holftein they write of prodigious Tempests, with fuch violent Thunders and Lightnings, as frighted the Cattle out of the fields, and drove some hundreds of them

into the less, where they were all drowned.

From Methienburg they also tell us of several fires which have happened in several parts of the Country,

occasioned by the Lightning.

From Ratisbonne we are informed, that five Circles of the Empire have confidered of, and confented to the proportion at which they have been Rated for the railing of an Army of 30 thouland men to be always in readiness for the fecurity of the Empire, and that onely the Circle of Lower Saxony had hitherto demuired, their Deputies being not fully instructed in that affair, but demanded onely a weeks time for farther confideration.

Paris, July 17. Letters from Monsieur de St. Andre Monibrun bearing date the 9th past, inform us, that the Turks applying all their force against the Bulwark St. Andre, had reduc d the Town on that fide to an extremity; and although the belieged had by the springing of a Mine b'own up 200 Turks, that were possess of the East of the Bastion St. And, e, yet had this opened so wide a breach, that had the Tu.ks made use of or known their advantage, they might with little difficul y have made their way into the Town: but that the Turks were fince emploied in raising, a Battery upon the ruines of the Bastion, whereupon they had planted four guns, with which they had began to play upon the Retrenchment, andby their Granadoes stones from their Stings, and Mortar-pieces, much annoyed the Defendants within their Retrenchments, infomuch, that for 15 days the service has been so hot, that they have lost by the Enemy and Dileases, near 1000 men.

We are farrher told from the same place, that the Town being thus streightned, had obliged the General to dispatch away a Bark with all diligence to the Duke de Beaufort, to acquaint him with the present state of the Siege, and to preis him to use what speed he could for their as-fistance, and that the said Bark happily met with him at the Cape de Sapienza, who immediately lent back the Bark with promises that the would suddenly appear for their defence, which news added fo much courage to the Garrison, that they made a stout sally upon the Turks, and forced them our of the Baltion with much flaughter, in which service Monsieur de St. Andre Montbrun received

A Back lately arriving at Marfeilles from Constan inquies, as brought some dispatches from Monsieur de la Hay, our Amballs for ar Lars ff the Malter informing, that pass g the 20th pass by the Cape de Spada in the Mand of Candla, he heard much fluoring from suda about 7 miles distant from area, but passing on to Cerigo, he there met with 12 we tetran ships, who informed him, that the Lid shooting was on by alutes upon the arrival of the French Fleet at Suda, from whence the said Venetian ships had been sent by the Dake de Beaufort to meet with the Auxiliary Gallies on the way from Zanie, and to hasten them on their way with Or ers to attend him ar Suda; farther faying, that the Sieur d' Aln.ergs was with three men of war joyned with the French Fleet; and that the said Sieur d' Almeras, having during his stay no Milo, sens à Bark to Larissa for intelligence, and to sound the Grand Segulors pleasure, had from theric te-ceived the Sultans Order to sail to Napeli di Romania, where an Ambiliador should be ready to come abourd him and pass under his conduct to the Court of France, but that the Sieut d' Almeras being jealous of some farther design, had sent onely his Fireship to receive him, if any fuch were there attending.

Paries Faly 24. A week fince the Baron de Lerode, the Duke of Neubourgs Envoy, had his last Audience from His Majelly, in which, in the name of the Duke his Mafler, he gave His Majesty thanks for his good will and inrtention to promo e his interest in Paland, although they had been of light effect; but that he could not but remonstrate that His Majesty could approve of the behaviour of the Bishop Aresiers, H s Ambassador in Poland, who had copenly espoused the interest of the Prince of Conde, contrary to the Treaty at Berlin and His Majelties instructisons, and had to ill referred the exclusion of the Prince of Conde that he afterwards refused to come to an Audience to which that R publick had invited him, to which His Ma etty obligin ly answered to this purpose, that he was much afflicted at the ill successof those Negotiations in Poland, in which he wanted not any good will to advance the Duke his Musters interest, and that he did not at all approve of he Bi hop of Befiers refusal of Audience, nor was he latisfy'd with any reasons he had yet alledged for the same and that he had therefore recalled him to render him a bet-

ter calon, and account of his actions.

On Sunday following, the faid Envey departed hence on his way for Liege, where he is to continue for lome time. Paris July 27. On Sunday last His Majesty was pleafed to fend for Chevalier de Fourilles, to whole care and

Relignation of the Duke Mazarin.

From Ma seilles we are advised by a ship lately arrived from the Levant, that some Privateers of Mattha had met with the Turkish Convoy from Alexandria, and that the Chevalier Mariey of Marseilles, who commanded as Captain in one of these Maltha ships, being grapled with a Turkish ship of 70 Guns, which took fire and perished in the dispute, had received much prejudice by the flames, but got off again, whillft the other Privateers feiled upon another great ship of 50 Guns, and four Saichs, which they carries off as Prize.

From Spain they write, that the new Regime it of Guards is much advanced, and already contitts of 700 men, who have been mustered, and are to receive their Colours with much Ceremony on the feast day of st. 7 ames.

Brusels June 25. The Constable of Castille is still at Antwerp 3 from whence is returned hither the rance de Ligne, having with the Chancelout of Brabant been mugnificently treated in that Citty at the Election of their new

Migistrates. The Marquis d' Humieres is at Aeth, from whence he is Ordered not to move till the French have furnished themselves with a sufficient quantity of Lime and Coaless we apprehend nor any hostility as formerly from them, but the Constable has for prevention of any sudden attempt teinforced the Gariffons of Mons, St Gillaine and Conde, and given order for the reparation of the fortifications.
