

sole their landing, from whence they were repulsed with considerable Loss, one of their Colonels of Foot being killed, whose Regiment and that of *Champaign* were entirely ruined in these Attacks, and Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* being near at hand with a considerable Body of Imperial Troops, will, we hope, give such powerful Assistance to our Forces at *Strasbourg*, that they may be able to force the *French* to repass the *Rhine*. General *Dont* passed by this Place 2 days ago, in his way to *Heldberg*, whither he went to confer with the King of the *Romans*, who has since left that Town, and will be to-morrow at *Aspern*, where the Elector of *Munich* designs to entertain him; and his Majesty will continue his Journey from thence to *Vienna*.

From the Camp of the Allies before Liege, October 16. The 15th Instant, about midnight, we decamped from *Sturzelbach*. The 15th, by break of day, we had passed the River *Jahr* or *Jeker*, and we marched on to this Place, where we arrived by 3 in the afternoon. The Enemy being alarmed with our March, had decamped early that morning from *Ziegenen*, with such precipitation, that they left behind them the Tools where with they were fortifying that Place, and they marched 5 Leagues to *Orp le Grand*, between *Hirsonne* and *London*. Upon our coming thither, we found the Suburb of *St. Willibrord*, which is next to the Citadel, all in Flames, the French Garrison, consisting of 12 Battalions, having set it on fire; after which 8 Battalions of them retired into the Citadel, and the other 4 into the Chartrouffe. The same evening the Chapter and the Magistracy sent out Deputies to his Excellency the Earl of *Marborough*, desiring to treat; and the 14th, three of the Chapter of *Liege*, and as many of the Magistracy, came out, and the Articles being agreed upon, and signed by his Excellency, the Deputies of the States General, and those of the Chapter and Magistracy, a Detachment of our Troops took possession that night of one of the City Gates, as we did yesterday of the whole Town, three English and three Dutch Battalions of Foot marching in to it under the Command of the Lord *Cutts*. Our Artillery came up the *Muse* yesterday morning, and our Troops are all employed in cutting Falcines, and making other Preparations for the Attack of the Citadel, which we hope we shall be ready to begin by to-morrow night. His Excellency has received a Letter from the Margrave *Albert of Brandenburg*, who commands the King of *Prussia's* Forces; It is dated from his Camp at *Ejers* the 12th Instant, and gives an Account, that having been joined by the other Detachments from *Rurmonde*, he marched towards Count *Tallard*, who upon his Approach retired to *Bonn*, where having changed the Garrison, by taking out the Elector of *Cologne's* Troops, and putting in a like number of *French*, he had continued his March together with the Elector, with intent to join the *Marshall de Boufflers*. The Margrave adds, that his Troops being tired with continual Marches, he designed to rest the next day, and on the 14th to march to *Bonn*, in order to bombard that Place.

Paris, Octob. 13. Letters from the French Army in Italy of the 3d Instant say, both they and the Imperial Army continued in the same Posts; and that the King of *Spain* came away from the French Camp the 2d, intending to lie that night at *Cremona*, the 3d at *Lodi*, and the 4th at *Milan*. We have received the Confirmation of the Arrival of the Plate Fleet into the Port of *Vigo* the 22d inst, under Convoy of 23 French Men of War commanded by the Count de *Châteaurenault*; Two Ships belonging to the said Fleet, which were separated from them in bad Weather, are put into *St. Andero*, on the Coast of *Biscay*, under Convoy of 3 other French Men of War. Letters from the Marquis of *Villars's* Camp near *Huningen* of the 5th Instant say, that finding it impracticable to join the Elector of *Bavaria*, he was resolved to march back again towards *Strasbourg*, and to rejoin the *Marshall de Catinar*, in order to oppose the *Imperialists*, who seemed to have a Design of bombarding *Strasbourg* or *Fort Louis*.

Hague, Octob. 17. N. S. According to our last Accounts from the Army of the Allies before *Liege*, they were preparing to attack the Citadel of that Place, and the *Chartrouffe*, of which we hope they will make themselves Masters in very few days. It is discoursed here, that the Forces of the Allies will besiege *Rhinberg*, if the Weather continues fair. The States have ordered a Squadron of Men of War to be fitted out, which is almost ready to put to Sea, but it is not said upon what Design. The Earl of *Winchelsea* arrived here the 14th Instant from England, in his way to the Court of *Hanover*, whither he is going with a Compliment from Her Majesty of Great Britain. The several Provinces have given their Consent to the making of the Earl of *Arbuthnot* Viceroy-General of their Forces, which Choice will be declared in few days.

Dublin, Octob. 6. On Sunday the 27th inst, the Right Reverend Father in God, William Lord Bishop of *Kildare* did consecrate in the French Tongue the French Church of *Port-Arlington* in the Queen's County. The Deed of Consecration was signed by most of the Offi-

ciants of that Place; the whole Congregation was present at the Divine Service; and Sermon; Many received the Communion at the Bishop's Hands, especially Mr. *Dailion*, the French Minister there. In the afternoon, Mr. *Dailion* and the Congregation attended the Evening Service; and the whole Colony made it their earnest Request to his Lordship, in which Mr. *Dailion* himself joined, That his Lordship would be pleased to give them for their Minister the Rev. Mr. *Anthony Boneval*, a French Minister, who is Episcopally ordained, and thoroughly conformable; and his Lordship granted them their Petition.

Falmouth, Octob. 10. Her Majesty's Ships the *Porpoise* and *Hallings* Frigate sailed from hence the 8th Instant with about 50 Sail of Merchant Ships bound to *Wales*, *Brant*, &c. Yesterday was sent into this Harbour a French Prize of about 220 Tons and 15 Guns, from the West Indies, laden with Sugar, Indigo, &c. and is said to have a considerable quantity of Plate on board, which was taken by a Dutch Cutter, after a Fight of 7 or 8 hours. This morning was brought in by a Fishing Privateer another French Ship of about 100 Tons, laden with Sugar, &c. from the West Indies, and another Dutch Privateer of 18 Guns, sent in a French Privateer of 6 Guns and 50 Men, which he had taken, that belonged to *Burit*, and came out from thence to cruise but 4 days before. Our Tin Ships, and several Merchant Ships from *Virginia* and *Portugal*, bound to *London*, are now under Sail, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the *Bedford* Galley.

Kingsfington, Octob. 12. Her Majesty and his Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark* came hither this day from *Windsor*.

London, Octob. 13. This day the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of this City waited upon Her Majesty at *St. James's*, to Congratulate Her Majesty's good Health, and late Return from the *Bath*, which the Recorder did in a most Loyal speech; and invited Her Majesty to honour the City with Her Royal Presence at Dinner on the Lord Mayor's Day; Her Majesty received them very graciously, and was pleased to accept this Invitation: After which they waited upon his Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark*, and made the like Compliments to him, and his Royal Highness was likewise pleased to accept of the same Invitation.
